2012 WEED SMACKDOWN

fun, community events to control non-native, invasive plants!

In conjunction with Alaska Invasive Weed Awareness Week in 2010, Alaska's first Weed Smackdown event helped contain the spread of non-native, invasive plants in Fairbanks. Since then, awareness of the problem (and the number of events) has grown, with four Weed Smackdown events scheduled for 2012. Each offers a fun, friendly competition among teams comprised of members from community organizations, businesses, and unaffiliated individuals who all have one thing in common: the desire to spare Alaska the economic and ecological impacts of invasive species. Participants will not only enjoy fresh air, exercise, fun, free food, and fabulous prizes, but will also help control or eradicate these weed invaders.

The introduction and spread of invasive species can cause economic and environmental harm, and harm to human health. Invasive plants spread aggressively and out-compete natives for growing space. Some plants (including European bird cherry, reed canarygrass, and white sweetclover) can harm native wildlife, while others (such as Canada thistle and giant hogweed) can harm people with thorns and cause painful rashes. Aquatic invasive species, like Elodea (a genus of waterweed that can overtake lakes and slow moving rivers and sloughs) have been shown to harm salmon and their habitat. Unfortunately, some of the major cities in Alaska have provided "base camps" for invasive species that are poised to spread across the state and damage Alaska's valuable natural resources.

You can help prevent the spread of invasives by attending one of the 2012 Weed Smackdown Events! If you can't make it, help by spreading the word. If you plan on visiting Alaska, be sure to bring felt-free wading boots and rid your shoes/clothing/gear of hitchhikers (like seeds) before you arrive!

First up, the Anchorage Weed Smackdown: Last year, over 120 participants controlled ~30 cubic yards of European bird cherry (an estimated 20,000 pounds)...The tallest tree pulled out of the ground was 36 feet tall, and the longest root was 9 feet long (right).

When: This Saturday, June 16, from 10AM-1PM

Where: Valley of the Moon Park (along Chester Creek near 17th & E)

What: Help the native flora and fauna of Chester Creek by pulling invasive European Bird Cherry along the creek; then enjoy free Moose's Tooth pizza for registered participants!
