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# ACL Administrator Greenlee Announces Adoption of the United Nation's Economic Commission on Europe Ministerial Declaration

Health and Human Services (HHS) Administrator for the Administration for Community Living and Assistant Secretary for Aging, Kathy Greenlee, who served as the Head of the U.S. Delegation, announced the adoption of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) Ministerial Declaration, "Ensuring A Society for all Ages: Promoting Quality of Life and Active Ageing." This declaration was negotiated and agreed to by the assembly of member countries at the 2012 UNECE Ministerial Conference on Ageing held in Vienna, Austria, September 19-20, 2012.

The declaration reaffirms the commitments made in the Ministerial Declarations in Berlin in 2002 and in Leon, Spain in 2007 to implement the Regional Implementation Strategy of the Madrid International Plan of Action on Ageing (MIPAA) adopted at the Madrid World Assembly on Ageing.

Assistant Secretary Greenlee provided the U.S. statement during the ministerial session of the closing day of the assembly. In her statement, she indicated that under the leadership of President Obama, the U.S. reaffirms its commitment to the themes addressed by the MIPAA. Ms. Greenlee reported that ten years following the adoption of the MIPAA, the U.S. has continued to make significant progress toward addressing the objectives of MIPAA. Of

particular note, are the successful reforms of the health care system made possible by the Affordable Care Act.

In addition, Greenlee highlighted the importance of focusing on elder abuse, neglect and exploitation as a means of protecting vulnerable seniors and assisting them to maintain health and financial security; the goals of the National Alzheimer's Project Act to dedicate resources to research and services to address the issues faced by many older individuals and their families; and the creation of the Administration for Community Living within DHHS to further enhance community living opportunities for older individuals and people with disabilities. Further, Ms. Greenlee spoke about the wide diversity of people living in the U.S. and the importance of forums like those sponsored by the U.N. to enhance learning and to collaborate as we strive to address and to be sensitive to the cultural differences and uniqueness of our diverse populations.

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# Through the Affordable Care Act, Americans with Medicare Will Save \$5,000 through 2022

5.5 million seniors saved money on prescription drugs and 19 million got free preventive care in 2012

Because of the health care law – the Affordable Care Act – the average person with traditional Medicare will save \$5,000 from 2010 to 2022, according to a report today from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. People with Medicare who have high prescription drug costs will save much more – more than \$18,000 – over the same period.

Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius also announced last Friday that, because of the health care law, more than 5.5 million seniors and people with disabilities saved nearly \$4.5 billion on prescription drugs since the law was enacted. Seniors in the Medicare prescription drug coverage gap known as the donut hole have saved an average of \$641 in the first eight months of 2012 alone. This includes \$195 million in savings on prescriptions for diabetes, over \$140 million on drugs to lower cholesterol and blood pressure, and \$75 million on cancer drugs so far this year. Also in the first eight months of 2012, more than 19 million people with original Medicare received at least one preventive service at no cost to them.

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## **Medicare Advantage Remains Strong**

Enrollment in the Medicare Advantage (MA) program is projected to increase by 11 percent in the next year and premiums will remain steady, Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Kathleen Sebelius announced last week. Since the Affordable Care Act was passed in 2010, Medicare Advantage premiums have fallen by 10 percent and enrollment has risen by 28 percent.

For the third year in a row, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) used authority provided by the Affordable Care Act to protect beneficiaries from significant increases in costs or cuts in benefits. Access to supplemental benefits remains steady and beneficiaries' average out-of-pocket spending remains constant.

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#### New Grants Help People with Medicare Stay Healthy and Independent

Administrator of the Administration for Community Living and Assistant Secretary for Aging Kathy Greenlee announced last week more than \$8.5

million for states to provide education and tools to help older adults and adults with disabilities, including those with Medicare, better manage their chronic conditions. The 22 states receiving the awards will use these resources to provide 87,000 individuals with more information about steps they can take to improve their health.

The funding will support a variety of programs, all evidence-based and licensed from the Stanford University Patient Education Research Center. The Stanford programs emphasize the individual's role in managing their health and improving their quality of life. The grants will also support evidence-based self-management programs for people with diabetes, arthritis, HIV/AIDS, and chronic pain, including internet-based courses and programs specifically developed for Spanish-speaking adults with chronic conditions.

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## HHS Enlists Seniors in the Fight Against Health Care Fraud

Senior Medicare Patrol programs in 53 states and territories awarded funding

Last week the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Administration for Community Living awarded new resources to support Senior Medicare Patrol programs across the nation as they continue their work uncovering Medicare fraud and waste. This program is part of President Obama's work to fight Medicare fraud and equip Medicare beneficiaries with the tools to protect themselves—and help the government prosecute fraudsters and uncover billing mistakes.

The Senior Medicare Patrol programs organize volunteers who work in their communities to educate Medicare beneficiaries, family members, and caregivers about the importance of reviewing their Medicare notices to identify errors and potentially fraudulent activity. Local Senior Medicare Patrol offices provide assistance when such issues are identified, so that mistakes are corrected and suspected fraud referred to the appropriate authorities. Since 1997, more than 1.5 million seniors and their caregivers have contacted the Senior Medicare Patrol to ask questions or report potential fraud. According to the HHS Office of the Inspector General, the program has saved the federal government over \$100 million.

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#### Recent Justice Department Actions to Protect Persons with Disabilities

Settlement with Bank of America to Resolve Allegations of Discrimination Against Recipients of Disability Income

Bank of America N.A. has agreed to maintain revised policies, conduct employee training and pay compensation to victims to resolve allegations that it engaged in a pattern or practice of discrimination on the basis of disability and receipt of public assistance in violation of the Fair Housing Act (FHA) and the Equal Credit Opportunity Act (ECOA). The settlement, which is subject to court approval, was filed recently in federal court in Charlotte, NC, where Bank of America is headquartered. The terms of the settlement require Bank of America to pay \$1,000, \$2,500 or \$5,000 to eligible mortgage loan applicants

who were asked to provide a letter from their doctor to document the income they received from Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI).

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#### Centenarian DNA to Be Used to Unlock Medical Mysteries

Life expectancy has increased for Americans from 49 in 1900 to 78 in 2010, and there are now 53,000 centenarians living among us. More than 60 of these centenarians have so far volunteered to help with the X PRIZE 100 Over 100, a \$10 million competition to accurately sequence the whole genome of 100 subjects within 30 days, in a quest to advance research in predictive and personalized medicine.

Centenarians will donate a sample of their DNA, as well as information about lifestyle factors that could contribute to their longevity. The X PRIZE Foundation (http://www.xprize.org/) creates such competitions to stimulate

investment in research and development in five groups: education, exploration, energy and environment, global development, and life sciences.

The Foundation will accept more centenarian volunteers until December 2012.

When the competition is complete, the X PRIZE Foundation will compile a public database of the DNA sequences and cell lines from the centenarian genomes. That way the information stored there will be available to any researcher or scientist for use in their quest to decode longevity secrets that might lead to more medical breakthroughs.
