Hispanic Heritage is a Tradition of Excellence

The scope and sweep of The Great Society to eliminate poverty and set a social agenda of equality and opportunity was the impetus for celebrating this country's Hispanic heritage. Plagued by the vagaries of the Vietnam era, President Johnson opted to celebrate the diversity of American culture while spotlighting a variety of its unique segments with special days and weeks.

The first celebration of Hispanic heritage (1968) was observed in the week surrounding September 15th, the anniversary of the independence of five Latin America countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. Additionally, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence on September 16 and 18, respectively. Twenty years later, Congress expanded the tribute to a month, September 15 through October 15.

People of Hispanic descent have excelled in science (1968 Nobel Laureate Luis W. Alvarez), space exploration (Discovery crew member Ellen Lauri Ochoa), the arts (Metropolitan Opera star Lucrezia Bori and silent film star Ramon Novarro), sports (Major League Baseball's Esteban Bellan), politics (California's only Hispanic governor Jose Antonio Romualdo Pacheco and U.S. Treasurer Romana Acosta Banuelos), and civil rights (labor leader Cesar Chavez).

And that heritage of excellence continues in the Air Force, as well, gaining notoriety as fighter pilots and bombardiers ("Ace in a Day" Lt. Oscar F. Perdomo, known as the "last Ace of World War II"), Korean War heroes (Capt. Manuel J. "Pete" Fernandez, the third-leading American ace with 14.5 kills during his nine months in Korea), pioneering pilots (Maj. Gen. Salvador E. Felices, who participated in the first round-the-world nonstop flight by a jet, and then-Lt. Olga E. Custodio, the first Latina military pilot and the first Latina commercial airline captain), and combat action heroes (Chief Master Sgt. Ramon Colon Lopez, a pararescueman who is the first Hispanic, among the first six Airmen, to be awarded the Air Force Combat Action Medal, recognizing airmen engaged in air or ground combat "outside the wire" in combat zones).

Of all the many heroes and heroines of Hispanic descent who are "just doing their job" for the Air Force and the U.S, the person who stands out as having participated in just about every level of the Air Force and as a pilot in the Air Force's predecessor organization, the U.S. Army Air Force, is <a href="Lt. Gen. Elwood R." Pete" Quesada, who rose through the ranks from USAAF pilot to commanding general of the 9th Fighter Command establishing advanced headquarters on the Normandy beachhead on D-Day plus one, and highly-decorated leader having earned among other distinctions, the Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Purple Heart and an Air Medal with two silver star devices.

Gen. Quesada's life in retirement was as interesting and patriotic as his life in the military. He was an executive for Lockheed Aircraft Corporation and then Special Advisor for Aviation to President Eisenhower, leading to his appointment as the first administrator of the Federal Aviation Administration. A Washingtonian at heart, Gen. Quesada became owner of the Washington Senators in 1961, although he would sell his stake only two years later. He then went on to lend his leadership to the revitalization of the capital city through service to the L'Enfant Plaza Corporation and the Pennsylvania Avenue Redevelopment Corporation.

Because of those earlier trailblazers and heroes like Pete Quesada, Oscar Perdomo, Ramon Lopez and Pete Fernandez, today there are more than 1.2 million Hispanics who are serving, or have served, in our military. While proud of their heritage and backgrounds, Hispanic Airmen have proven that they are much more: They are truly Americans.

▶ THIS WEEK IN AIR FORCE HISTORY

Sept. 27, 1993 - Gen. James H. Doolittle, who led the first air raid on Tokyo and commanded the Eighth Air Force during World War II, dies at the age of 96.

Sept. 28, 1912 - Cpl. Frank S. Scott became the first enlisted fatality in Signal Corps Aviation.

Sept. 29, 1964 - The first of 36 Minuteman II launches occurred at Cape Kennedy, Fla. In this flight, the missile successfully delivered its payload nearly 5,000 miles downrange on target.

Sept. 30, 1949 - The Berlin airlift, gradually reduced since May 12, officially ended. Allied aircraft carried 2,343,301.5 tons of supplies on 277,264 flights. U.S. planes carried 1,783,826 tons.

Oct. 1, 1969 - The C-5A Galaxy, world's largest aircraft at the time, took off from Edwards AFB, Calif., with a 410,000-payload, the heaviest ever carried by any aircraft. This load was also 21,000 pounds heavier than the C-5A's designed lift capability and 28,100 pounds heavier than the record it set on June 15.

Oct. 2, 2007 - At Elmendorf AFB, Alaska, Air Force Reserve officials activated the first F-22 Raptor unit, the 477th Fighter Group. The day also honored the 477th Fighter Group's and the 302nd Fighter Squadron's fabled heritage and their connection to the Tuskegee Airmen.

Oct 3, 1993 – Through Oct. 4, pararescueman TSgt.

Timothy A. Wilkinson ran through enemy fire repeatedly, despite his own injuries, to save five wounded Army Rangers after enemy forces shot down their MH-60 Black Hawk helicopter at Mogadishu, Somalia. For that heroism, Wilkinson received the Air Force Cross.
