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Dear Secretary Gates:

My concern over the implementation of the Obama Administration's insourcing policy in the Department of Defense continues to grow.

As of today, we have not received a response to the letter sent by Chairman Ortiz and Ranking Member Forbes on February 4, 2010, asking you to direct a re-evaluation of insourcing efforts at Air Force Plant 42 in Palmdale, California. I find it very troubling that despite the bi-partisan request from the Committee, you have disregarded Congressional concern about this matter and allowed hiring actions to be initiated for the firefighting positions at Plant 42.

I appreciate the Department's desire to reduce its overreliance on contractors, but I have concerns with the arbitrary targets mandated to the military services. This is forcing installations to insource some jobs that are better served as a contracted function, such as the firefighters at Air Force Plant 42. Unlike traditional military installations, Plant 42 is a government-owned, contractor-operated facility. There are over 6,500 total contractor positions at Plant 42, compared with 10 civilian Air Force slots and one uniformed position at the plant. The cost savings estimated for this insourcing effort is 2.5 percent, a savings that easily could be recouped by re-competing the contract. Because these jobs are not inherently governmental, and the cost savings is minimal, I can only conclude that this action is being done solely to comply with quotas imposed to meet the Department's overall goal to reduce contractor levels.

Furthermore, I am aware that Department of Defense Instruction (DODI) 1400.24, Volume 336, dated April 6, 2009 implements policy and establishes procedures regarding civilian personnel management for civilian firefighters and law enforcement officers. I am also aware that, in the case of the insourcing efforts at Air Force Plant 42 in Palmdale, California, the Air Force has petitioned your office for an exception to the maximum entry age established by DODI 1400.24, V336.

Despite the Air Force's stated desire to minimize the impact of insourcing, their request for relief from your policy on age limitations has not been taken up. Allowing hiring actions to begin before the request for waiver was adjudicated will lead to confusion, and ill-advised hiring actions, and may likely prevent an experienced, established workforce from being able to compete for the newly created government positions.

With these concerns in mind, I ask that you immediately hold any further efforts to insource the contract workforce at Plant 42 until providing the Committee a response to the review requested by Mr. Forbes and Mr. Ortiz and issuance of waiver to DOD I 1400.24, Volume 336 for the positions targeting for insourcing at Plant 42.

I am writing to request documents and information relating to the extent to which White House political personnel are involved with planning, directing, or coordinating your travel to participate in public events – official or political – which may have a political benefit for elected Democratic officials or Democratic candidates for office.

As you may know, during the last Congress then-Chairman Waxman and this Committee invested substantial time and effort to investigate the use of official resources at the behest of the White House for political purposes. During the Committee's investigation – which spanned nearly two years – the staff interviewed or deposed 18 political appointees, including President Bush's political directors, and received nearly 70,000 pages of documents from the White House and 29 agencies.

At the conclusion of his years-long investigation, Chairman Waxman's staff prepared a staff report entitled "The Activities of the White House Office of Political Affairs." Chairman Waxman called for the elimination of the Office. The Waxman Report stated:

The White House Office of Political Affairs has been controversial since President Reagan created the office in 1981. . . . But the extent of political activity by the . . . White House and its deep and systematic reach into the federal agencies is unprecedented. Congress should amend the Hatch Act, the federal law

restricting political activity by federal officials, to eliminate the White House Office of Political Affairs. If the political affairs office is retained, its activities should be restructured to ensure that it serves the interests of the taxpayer, not the political party of the President.¹⁸

In the report, the Waxman staff concluded that the White House organized the travel of senior administration officials around politically advantageous locations and specifically used travel as a tool to help elect or re-elect members of their party to public office. The report counted events that were attended personally by senior administration officials. It reported that 303 events required travel outside of Washington, D.C. The Waxman staff concluded that these events violated the Hatch Act. They wrote the events "established precisely the type of 'political boiler-room' that the Congress warned against when it amended the Hatch Act in 1993." The report stated that the taxpayers "should

. . . not pay the travel expenses of cabinet and other senior officials to fly across the country" for political purposes. 21

During President Obama's short time in office, there has been some indication that the White House has ignored Chairman Waxman's concerns. For example, according to a *Washington Post* story last year about travel related to marketing of the President's stimulus plan, "public policy and electoral politics have come together seamlessly in his domestic travel itinerary."²² The *Post* reported:

Since becoming president, he hasn't set foot in a state he won by nearly 40 percentage points in November's general election.

But thousands have heard Obama speak in Ohio, North Carolina, Missouri, Indiana and Florida, all among the 16 states be has visited since taking office. In each of those places, his margin of victory or defeat last November was fewer than five percentage points.

On nearly every trip he has taken, Obama has followed the timeworn path of presidential travel — go where the votes matter most.

But the travel suggests a White House far more interested in electoral politics than its leader and senior staff members publicly acknowledge. The swing-state stops are just one element of a West Wing political operation that has preserved many practices of preceding ones, and that takes into account the dynamics of the 2010 midterm elections and the next presidential race in deciding where to spend Obama's time.

Of the 16 states Obama has visited, nine shifted from the Republican to Democratic column in 2008. Five of the states are among the six that posted the narrowest margins of victory for either Obama or Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.), and are likely to remain the most closely divided through the coming campaign cycles.

* * *

Obama has raised money in California, Indiana and Nevada, and election law calls for the government to be reimbursed for those explicitly political aspects of his travel.²³

Last June, *Politico* similarly reported administration officials have traveled to at least 66 events across the country to tout the stimulus program, but the events were almost exclusively tied to obviously politically motivated destinations. According to *Politico*:

Since Congress passed President Barack Obama's \$787 billion economic stimulus bill in February, administration officials have traveled to at least 66 events across the country to tout the massive spending program or hand out stimulus cash to grateful local officials.

Top officials have hosted events predominantly in states that Obama won in 2008.

What's more, the examination revealed that Obama officials all but avoided Southern states that Obama lost.

But the numbers tell the tale: 52 of the 66 events were in states that backed Obama. And taken together, the itineraries amount to a veritable map of Obama's election-night victories — big-money states like California and New York, swing states like Ohio and Colorado that Obama turned blue and other solidly Democratic states Obama kept in his column.²⁴

This is precisely the type of political travel former Chairman Waxman spent years investigating. This is what he deemed Hatch Act violations.

I am interested in developing a better understanding of whether the types of political travel Chairman Waxman invested so much time and energy attempting to eradicate are still occurring. To assist the Committee in learning more about this Administration's practices with regard to political travel, I request that you provide the Committee with the following information:

- 1. Provide a list of all events with elected officials or candidates for office that you attended outside of Washington, D.C., in an official capacity during the time period February 1, 2009 to the present. For each event, please provide the date and location of the event, a brief description of the purpose of the event, the identity of the elected officials or candidates for office attending the event, and a statement declaring whether taxpayer funds were used to travel to the event.
- 2. Provide a list of all events with elected officials or candidates for office that you attended outside of Washington, D.C., for political purposes, whether it be a fundraiser, rally, or other political function, during the time period February 1, 2009 to the present. For each event, please provide the date and location of the event, a brief description of the purpose of the event, the identity of the elected officials or candidates for office attending the event, and a statement declaring whether taxpayer funds were used in part to travel to the event.
- 3. All documents, including emails, that relate to the involvement of White House officials in scheduling, suggesting, coordinating, or directing public events with elected officials or candidates for office for any official at the Department during the time period February 1, 2009 to the present.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight committee in the House of Representatives and has broad oversight jurisdiction as set forth in House Rule X.

I am writing to follow up on my letter to you dated June 3, 2010. In that letter, I requested documents and information about the involvement of White House political personnel in coordinating your travel to official and political events that may have benefited Democratic candidates for office. This investigation continues the work this Committee began in the last Congress under then-Chairman Waxman. To date, I have not received the information I requested or any explanation about the delay. Ordinarily, the Department of Defense (DoD) is more cooperative.

Recently, a DoD insider provided information and email correspondence to my staff confirming that your staff issued what appears to be a "stop work order" with respect to my request. An email exchange between senior officials granted the Office of the General Counsel's request that the suspense date (i.e., due date) be "turned off due to this letter going to 21 Agencies, and response requiring Administration guidance." Essentially, Michael Bruhn and Christian Marrone, both top aides in your office, ensured that all work on my request would stop and the due date would be ignored. The correspondence also indicates that Mr. Marrone would provide an explanation offline, effectively obscuring his motives from scrutiny.

The actions of senior DoD officials are inconsistent with the President's commitment "to making his administration the most open and transparent in history." They are also inconsistent with federal law under 5 U.S.C. § 552. At the outset of his presidency, President Obama reiterated that "the way to make government accountable is make it transparent so that the American people can know exactly what decisions are

being made, how they're being made, and whether their interests are being well served."² He went on to state as follows:

I will also hold myself as President to a new standard of openness. Going forward, anytime the American people want to know something that I or a former President wants to withhold, we will have to consult with the Attorney General and the White House Counsel, whose business it is to ensure compliance with the rule of law. Information will not be withheld just because I say so. It will be withheld because a separate authority believes my request is well grounded in the Constitution.³

The President further urged federal agencies "to adopt a presumption in favor of disclosure." It is in the interests of transparency to disclose all information related to the White House's involvement in Cabinet officials' travel. Moreover, this Committee has broad jurisdiction to conduct oversight of the federal government.

I trust that you will reconsider my original request. If it is your position not to provide the requested materials, I request that you articulate the basis for this position in writing. Additionally, to better understand the status of my letter request, I ask that you make Michael Bruhn and Christian Marrone available for transcribed interviews. Please contact Steve Castor or Ashok Pinto of the Committee staff at (202) 225-5074 with any questions.

As you know, in the past three months, there have been two terrorist attacks on our homeland. On Christmas Day, a terrorist acting under Al Qaeda's direction was arrested after attempting to bomb a fully-loaded passenger plane over the United States. Eight weeks before, U.S. Army Major Nidal Hasan took the lives of thirteen American soldiers and civilians at Fort Hood after apparently having received the sanction of a radical American-born terrorist cleric living in Yemen.

The actions of these terrorists have rightly spurred an examination of their backgrounds and associations. Reports indicate the men were connected with terrorist operations in Yemen with support coming directly from former detainees of the United States military in Guantanamo Bay. According to recent press reports, dozens of former detainees have resumed plotting and executing terrorist attacks on American military personnel and civilians.

Following the Christmas Day terrorist attack, the Administration announced it had "suspended" the release to Yemen of detainees held at Guantanamo Bay and declared that "in the near term" no more detainees will be sent to Saudi Arabia. The timing of this announcement has raised important questions about the handling of detainees, and why the decision only took place after the terrorist attacks occurred when dangers were, apparently, known beforehand. Obtaining information about this decision is necessary for this investigation to confirm that national security determinations on detainees are being made as a result of careful evaluation by career professionals and that such decisions are not being driven or hindered for primarily political purposes.

The decision to release six Yemeni detainees despite mounting intelligence of increased terrorist activity in Yemen and credible reports of detainee recidivism only days before the failed attack on Northwest Flight 253 raises obvious concerns. It clearly should not have required both the murder of 13 at Fort Hood nor the near-death of hundreds of American civilians on board Northwest Flight 253 for this Administration to reevaluate the policy for releasing terrorist detainees from Guantanamo Bay. Such events raise disturbing questions about a possible return to a reactive pre-9/11 mindset that must be addressed.

In light of this situation, and in order to evaluate more fully the Administration's detention program, it is necessary for Congress to obtain specific details which are not readily available.

Accordingly, I request:

- 1. All information on known or suspected recidivism of terrorist or terrorist related activity among those released from U.S. custody at Guantanamo Bay;
- 2. Details of agreements, memorandums of understanding (MOUs), or informal expectations placed on nations which have received detainees, and the extent to which the Administration assesses these have been met or are being followed;
- 3. Specifics about the Administration's plans to ensure that the Yemenis transferred in December remain imprisoned there; and

I respectfully ask that this material be conveyed by 3:00 P.M. February 8, 2010. The Committee has the facilities, procedures, and staff necessary to receive classified information. As you know, the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight committee in the House of Representatives. House Rule X grants the

As the Ranking Member for the House Committee with primary jurisdiction over federal procurement policy, I have a responsibility to conduct meaningful oversight of federal contracts that run the risk of wasting taxpayer dollars.

I am writing to seek additional information about a pending sole-source contract award to Kuwait & Gulf Link Transport Company (KGL), a Kuwait-based company, under Solicitation Number SP3300-10-R-0014 ("the solicitation").

As you may know, this Committee has long been a skeptic of sole-source contracts. My colleagues on the Committee were encouraged last March when the President, in his first pronouncement about federal procurement policy railed against the use of sole-source arrangements. The President stated:

Excessive reliance by executive agencies on sole-source contracts (or contracts with a limited number of sources) and cost-reimbursement contracts creates a risk that taxpayer funds will be spent on contracts that are wasteful, inefficient, subject to misuse, or otherwise not well designed to serve the needs of the Federal Government or the interests of the American taxpayer.

It is the policy of the Federal Government that executive agencies shall not engage in noncompetitive contracts except in those circumstances where their use can be fully

justified and where appropriate safeguards have been put in place to protect the taxpayer.

The President's memorandum then directed all executive departments and agencies to exercise the strictest of scrutiny on all sole-source contracting vehicles.

In light of the President's specific guidance on sole-source contracts, I was disturbed to learn that the Defense Logistics Agency has made the decision to award KGL the contract on a sole-source basis. According to FedBizOpps.gov at least three additional contractors are identified as interested vendors under the solicitation.

On or before February 18, 2010, please produce all documents related to the pending KGL contract, including the contract file for the solicitation. With your document production be sure to include all email correspondence relating to KGL or the potential award by and to the contracting officer Medard R. Kowalski.

The purpose of the travel to Haiti is to assess the progress and accountability of USAID's \$3.5billion relief and reconstruction efforts since the 2010 earthquake. The purpose of the travel to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, is to tour the detention facilities and evaluate the need for them to remain open despite the President's 2009 Executive Orders mandating closure.

I request the Department of Defense to furnish such assistance, including transportation, as may be required to facilitate this trip. The expenditure of funds for the payment of actual expenses of such transportation as may be required is authorized by Title 31, U.S.C. 1108(g). Travel will be conducted by military and /or commercial aircraft up to business class, including foreign flag carriers when U.S. carriers are not available, and in accordance with House rules. The CODEL requests Navy liaison support for this trip.

As you know, the Department of Defense handles the bulk of the earmarks intended for for-profit entities included in the annual appropriations bill(s). Much emphasis has been placed on the efforts of the House appropriators to ensure that earmarks intended for for-profit entities are competitively bid. We are interested in understanding the efficacy of the new language requiring "full and open competition" for Congressional earmarks and the overall acquisition process at the Department. Therefore, we are writing to request all information associated with the full and open acquisition process utilized for the attached list of fiscal year 2010 defense earmarks.

The Department previously stated that earmarks are awarded in a manner consistent with the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR), which implements the Competition in Contracting Act.² Regardless, past practices and a review of contracting information for a subset of earmarks by Congressman Flake's staff indicate that in large part earmarked funds are in fact awarded to the intended for-profit entity listed in the earmark certification letters provided to the House Committee on Appropriations by the sponsor. We understand, as the Director of Defense Procurement and Acquisition Policy, Mr. Shay Assad, noted in response to Congressman Flake, "that there are other legitimate

means of competition." Indeed, the FAR contains provisions allowing for other than full and open competition.

We appreciate that a one size fits all approach will not work for Defense Department procurement. Mr. Assad acknowledged as much in responding to Congressman Flake when he stated that "imposing a requirement for [earmarks] to be awarded using full and open competition is not appropriate." Congress, however, deemed full and open competition for earmarks to be the preferred manner for award. To help us understand how this legislative requirement is being implemented, we request that your office provide the Committee with all information showing that a full and open acquisition process was used in awarding the attached list of fiscal year 2010 defense earmarks, as it becomes available. The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is conducting an investigation into the appearance of impropriety related to the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) contract award HR0011-10-C-0068. According to press reports, the Director of DARPA, Regina Dugan, has a financial interest in RedXDefense, the company receiving the contract. As part of this investigation, I am writing to request documents and information relating to this award.

RedXDefense was founded in 2005 by Dugan and her father.² As I understand it, the company also currently employs Dugan's uncle and sister. Dugan was sworn in as DARPA Director on July 20, 2009, and six months later, RedXDefense was awarded a \$400,000 research contract. In August 2010, the contract was extended. The Committee is aware of Dugan's recusal pursuant to Department of Defense ethics regulations, and the investigation by the DARPA General Counsel finding no impropriety in the award to RedXDefense. However, writer, David Wallechinsky, and Project on Government Oversight Spokesman, Joe Newman, raised valid concerns about Dugan's subordinates at the programmatic level being hesitant to not make an award to a company she helped found.6

There are also reports that Dugan continues to own stock in RedXDefense valued at more than \$15,000.⁷ Transparency organizations point out that "her continued ownership of \$15,000 or more in RedXDefense stock creates the potential for the appearance of a conflict of interest." These organizations use former Deputy Secretary of Defense Gordon England's General Dynamics stock sale to illustrate the precedent for Dugan divesting herself of stock in RedXDefense upon her return to public service. This Committee takes potential conflicts of interest and even the appearance of impropriety in government contracting very seriously.

The Committee requests that DARPA produce the following documents, in electronic format, for the time period July 1, 2009 to the present:

- 1. All documents and communications relating to RedXDefense's current or prospective contracts with DARPA.
- 2. All documents and communications between Director Dugan and any DARPA employee or other Department of Defense employee concerning RedXDefense.
- 3. All documents and communications between the contracting officer(s) on award HR0011-10-C-0068 or solicitation DARPA-BAA-09-31, Dugan, or any other DARPA employee relating to RedXDefense.
- 4. All documents and communications between Robert Leheny and any other government official or employee regarding RedXDefense.
- 5. All documents and communications in the contract file for award HR0011-10-C-0068 or solicitation DARPA-BAA-09-31.
- 6. All documents and communications supporting the DARPA General Counsel's finding of no wrongdoing on the RedXDefense contract and any documentation memorializing the General Counsel's conclusion(s).

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight committee of the House of Representatives and may at "any time" investigate "any matter" as set forth in House Rule X. Responding to Committee Document Requests

- 1. In complying with this request, you should produce all responsive documents that are in your possession, custody, or control, whether held by you or your past or present agents, employees, and representatives acting on your behalf. You should also produce documents that you have a legal right to obtain, that you have a right to copy or to which you have access, as well as documents that you have placed in the temporary possession, custody, or control of any third party. Requested records, documents, data or information should not be destroyed, modified, removed, transferred or otherwise made inaccessible to the Committee.
- 2. In the event that any entity, organization or individual denoted in this request has been, or is also known by any other name than that herein denoted, the request shall be read also to include that alternative identification.
- 3. The Committee's preference is to receive documents in electronic form (i.e., CD, memory stick, or thumb drive) in lieu of paper productions.
- 4. Documents produced in electronic format should also be organized, identified, and indexed electronically.

Definitions

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On his first full day in office, President Obama proclaimed his Administration's commitment to openness and transparency by signing a memorandum that urged the federal agencies to adopt a presumption in favor of disclosure in response to Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests. The Freedom of Information Act grants the public access to federal agency records unless the requested information is protected by any of nine exemptions or three exclusions. Two recent audits demonstrate that the agencies have failed to implement the President's first-day FOIA guidance to such an extent that we are concerned the records and information of the federal government are no more, and possibly less, available to the public than they were during previous administrations.

President Obama promised taxpayers "a new era of openness in our country" and a presidency built on "transparency and the rule of law." To that end, on January 21, 2009, President Obama issued new guidance on FOIA, via a memorandum to the heads of executive departments and agencies. The President stated that "all agencies should adopt a presumption in favor of disclosure, in order to renew their commitment to the principles embodied in FOIA, and to usher in a new era of open Government." Additionally, agencies were instructed that "[n]ondisclosure should never be based on an

effort to protect the personal interests of Government officials at the expense of those they are supposed to serve."

As directed by President Obama, on March 19, 2009, Attorney General Holder issued a memorandum to the heads of executive departments and agencies to "underscore" the President's FOIA commitment and "ensure" that it was realized in practice. The memorandum stressed two points: 1) an agency should not withhold information simply because it may do so legally; and 2) whenever an agency determines that it cannot make full disclosure of a requested record, it must consider whether it can make partial disclosure. Additionally, presumably to discourage FOIA denials, the Attorney General limited the Department of Justice's defense of FOIA denials to those that 1) the department reasonably foresees that disclosure would harm an interest protected by one of the statutory exemptions, or 2) disclosure is prohibited by law. 4

Despite these memoranda stressing the importance of openness and transparency, an audit by the National Security Archive, an open-government project at George Washington University, found that only four agencies have increased the release of information and decreased denials under FOIA, the majority of agencies have not responded to either the Obama or Holder memos with concrete changes in their FOIA practices, and ancient requests still persist in the FOIA system. Additionally, despite receiving 48,686 fewer FOIA requests in the past fiscal year than in 2008, the number of rejections rose by 154,189. In direct opposition to Obama's memorandum, the use of FOIA exception 5, which more than any other exemption protects the personal interests of Government officials, has risen, from 47,395 in fiscal year 2008 to 70,779 in the past fiscal year.

During a March 18, 2010 Subcommittee on Information Policy, Census, and National Archives hearing on current trends in the administration of FOIA, several witnesses expressed frustration with the current climate surrounding FOIA. One witness, a director of a FOIA litigation group, testified that he has observed no improvement since President Obama signed the January 21, 2010 FOIA memorandum: "We [are] unable to discern any real difference between the manner in which the disputed information was handled first under the Bush policy, and later under the Obama policy."

Another witness, representing perhaps the most active FOIA requestor and litigator operating today, stated plainly "The Obama administration is less transparent than the Bush administration."

So that we may better understand the failure of the federal agencies to implement the directives of the White House and Justice Department, and to facilitate openness and transparency in the future, we request the following documents:

- 1. Your agency's complete FOIA log, including the identity of each party that requested records and/or information, the date the request was received, the date the request was fulfilled, whether the request was rejected, and if so, what exemption or exclusion was cited.
- 2. A complete explanation for each full or partial FOIA rejection since January 21, 2009.
- 3. All records and communications referring or relating to a full or partial FOIA rejection since January 21, 2009.
- 4. All records and communications referring or relating to the implementation of President Obama's January 21, 2009, memorandum on the Freedom of Information Act and/or Attorney General Eric Holder's memorandum of March 19, 2009, on the Freedom of Information Act.

We respectfully request that you provide the requested information **no later than** Monday, April 26, 2010. Please note that, for purposes of responding to this request, the terms "records," "communications," and "referring or relating" should be interpreted consistently with the attached Definitions of Terms.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the main investigative committee in the U.S. House of Representatives. Pursuant to House Rule X, it has authority to investigate the subjects within the Committee's legislative jurisdiction as well as "any matter" within the jurisdiction of the other standing House Committees. This broad jurisdiction includes the oversight of Executive Branch operations and administrative functions.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is conducting oversight of agency operations in the absence of appropriations. While the Majority has made clear it does not want a government shutdown, the potential failure of the President and Congress to reach an agreement on funding for the remainder of the current fiscal year requires the Committee ensure the executive branch it has effective contingency plans in place. Such review is important in the event of a shutdown.

As part of this oversight, I am writing to request the agency produce the following documents and information related to its shutdown plan as required by Section 124 of Circular No. A-11:³

- (1) the list of agency activities and functions that will continue during a lapse in appropriations because they qualify as exceptions to the Antideficiency Act restrictions;
- (2) the list of employees who will be retained during a lapse in appropriations organized by administrative subdivision, occupational category, functional classification, and location.
- (3) the agency plan for communicating information to its employees.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight committee of the House of Representatives and may at "any time" investigate "any matter" as set forth in House Rule X. An attachment to this letter provides additional information about responding to the Committee's request.

- 1. We have united with small business, minority interest groups, and federal contractors in opposition to the implementation of President Obama's February 11, 2009 executive order, E.O. 13502, encouraging federal agencies to consider the use of a project labor agreement (PLA) on large scale construction projects, where the total cost to the Government is \$25 million or more. Despite promises of greater efficiency and labor peace, ample evidence shows that PLAs do not promote efficiency or labor peace and are discriminatory, wasteful, and anticompetitive. This Administration has chosen to adopt a final rule to reward its union allies at the expense of jobs. We have instructed our staffs to conduct meaningful oversight into all PLAs on large scale federal construction projects to evaluate the value and cost of these programs to the American taxpayer.

Project Labor Agreements Do NOT Promote Efficiency

PLAs use uniform collective bargaining agreements that cover all crafts on a construction project - setting work schedules, hours, payment arrangements, grievance procedures, and other terms and conditions of employment. These uniform contracts limit both employee and employer choice and innovation. Employees have no choice in representation. Contractors and subcontractors are forced to accept the PLA conditions, eliminating any chance of efficiency through innovation and forcing many employers to overhaul their structures to accommodate the new requirements.

Project Labor Agreements Do NOT Promote Industrial Peace

There is no evidence that PLAs are more successful than traditional contracts at securing industrial peace. A recent study by the Beacon Hill Institute found that the Bush Administration initiated 57,287 construction projects worth \$25 million or more without a single PLA.² None of these projects suffered from labor strife, slowdowns, or

significant cost overruns.³ Clearly, PLAs and their grievance provisions are not necessary to ensure industrial peace on federal projects.

Project Labor Agreements are Wasteful

It is estimated that PLAs increase the costs of projects by between 20 and 26 percent. If PLAs had been used on all federal construction projects financed by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, assuming PLA agreements increase project costs by 20 percent, the federal government would have spent \$131 billion on work that could have been done for \$109 billion without the PLA. This labor windfall will cost the American taxpayer billions of dollars and innumerable jobs.

Project Labor Agreements are Anticompetitive

In 2001, approximately 80 percent of all construction workers were not affiliated with a union organization, and 75 percent of all construction projects nationwide were completed with non-union labor. To avoid the difficulties inherent in PLAs, many employers who are capable of managing and completing large projects choose not to bid on construction projects covered by a PLA. This response reduces competitive bidding and quality of workers. The 1995 study of the Buffalo Roswell Park project estimated that a PLA reduced total bidders by 30 percent. All federal contracts should be open to competitive bidding without PLAs to ensure best value and quality of work.

Project Labor Agreements are Discriminatory

The underrepresentation of minorities in unions, and the lack of non-union contractor bidding on construction projects covered by PLAs, act as barriers for minority workers and contractors. In 2008, approximately 73 percent of union members were white, 13 percent were African-American, four percent were Asian, and 11 percent were Hispanic. Further, 98 percent of black construction workers and construction companies are non-union. The National Black Chamber of Commerce, Women Construction Owners & Executives USA, Bay Area Black Contractors Association, Latin Builders

Association Inc., United States Pan-Asian-American Chamber of Commerce, American Asian Contractors Association, and National Association of Women Business Owners recognize that these disparities ensure that small and minority businesses are not able to compete on PLAs. 9

Despite significant opposition from small business, federal contractors and minority interest groups, on April 13, 2010, the Federal Acquisition Regulation Council amended the Federal Acquisition Regulation to implement President Obama's February 11, 2009 executive order, E.O. 13502. The final rule:

- Encourages agency planners to consider use of PLAs early in the acquisition process;
- Clarifies that if an agency decides to use a PLA on a particular project, then the
 contractor must submit an executed PLA, meaning that a contractor can no longer
 merely bargain in good faith;
- Provides a non-exhaustive list of factors agencies may consider when deciding, on a case-by-case basis, whether to use a PLA;
- Allows agencies to either dictate the terms and conditions of the PLA or solicit a PLA from offerors;
- Requires PLAs to bind all contractors and subcontractors engaged in construction on the construction project to comply with the PLA;
- Requires PLAs to set forth mutually binding procedures for resolving labor disputes arising during the term of the PLA; and
- Requires contractor to provide a copy of the PLA to the contracting agency.¹⁰

In light of the leeway granted to agencies in the use, procedure, and terms of PLAs on large scale federal construction projects and the waste, discrimination, and anticompetitive elements of PLAs, we have instructed our staffs to monitor all large scale federal construction project that use a PLA very closely. In the event that your agency chooses to use a PLA on a large scale federal construction project, we would anticipate sending a letter requesting detailed documentation covering all levels of the decision making process and implementation.

- Identify all large scale construction projects on which the agency is considering
 the use of a PLA. Provide the location and nature of the construction project, the
 source of financing, identity of the unions and contractors involved, and the
 expected cost.
- 3. Should your agency use a PLA on a large scale construction project, we may request that you brief our staffs about the decision-making process, the mechanics of implementation, and terms of the PLA. To facilitate the Committees' oversight work in this area, please identify a staff contact with subject matter expertise on PLAs to serve as a liaison between the agency and our Committees.
- 4. Please provide any and all documents and communications with persons, groups, or organizations outside the agency regarding the use of PLAs, and identify any policy decision(s) or programmatic requirement(s) made or included (for example, apprenticeship requirements) based on consultation with these parties.

I write to request that you provide this Committee with important documents and legal findings which will allow us to appropriately oversee the Administration's antiterrorism efforts.

On March 23, the Committee's National Security and Foreign Affairs subcommittee held an oversight hearing that focused on the Administration's successful use of Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS) to attack terrorists. Although I commend the Administration for aggressively taking the fight to the enemy in this manner, I was concerned to learn from the expert testimony that the Administration had not clearly articulated the legal basis upon which drone strikes are conducted or otherwise declared that the strikes conform with U.S. and international law.

Two days following the hearing, the Administration took steps to ameliorate the concerns expressed. On March 25, Harold Hongju Koh, the Department of State's Legal Advisor, announced in a widely heralded speech in Washington that "it is the considered view of this Administration . . . that lethal operations conducted with the use of unmanned aerial vehicles, comply with all applicable law, including the laws of war."

Because it came so soon after the issue was raised at our subcommittee hearing, I am pleased with this explicit and official declaration. Now individuals operating drones at the behest of the U.S. government can continue to fight the enemy without fearing trumped up allegations of illegality or impropriety lodged by those who desire to curtail or otherwise inhibit our nation's antiterrorist efforts.

According to *The New York Times*, however, disputes remain between the departments of Justice, State, and Defense about other legal aspects of the

Administration's anti-terrorism policies. One disagreement apparently surrounds the type of terrorist activity which warrants indefinite detention by the United States without trial. Mr. Koh reportedly has written a memorandum suggesting that if an individual has only what is considered an indirect connection to terrorism, indefinite detention of this individual should not be permissible. Apparently, Jeh C. Johnson, the Defense Department's General Counsel, and David Barron, the acting director of the Department of Justice's Office of Legal Counsel, have written memoranda which express different opinions. It is precisely this sort of bureaucratic discord that impedes an effective and unified cross-government war against terrorists.

Congress must have a full understanding of the Administration's anti-terrorism policies and the legal framework that underlie them. We must also ensure that departments are fully and properly interacting in a coordinated manner, thus avoiding the kind of interdepartmental fractures evident prior to the 9/11 attacks. Therefore, I respectfully request that you provide the Committee with a copy of the Johnson memorandum. I ask that this be conveyed by June 2, 2010.

As you know, the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the main investigative committee in the U.S. House of Representatives. Pursuant to House Rule X, it has authority to investigate the subjects within the Committee's legislative jurisdiction as well as "any matter" within the jurisdiction of the other standing House Committees. This broad jurisdiction includes the oversight of Executive Branch management, operations, and administrative functions, and interagency operations.

I am writing to request documents and information relating to the extent to which White House political personnel are involved with planning, directing, or coordinating your travel to participate in public events – official or political – which may have a political benefit for elected Democratic officials or Democratic candidates for office.

As you may know, during the last Congress then-Chairman Waxman and this Committee invested substantial time and effort to investigate the use of official resources at the behest of the White House for political purposes. During the Committee's investigation – which spanned nearly two years – the staff interviewed or deposed 18 political appointees, including President Bush's political directors, and received nearly 70,000 pages of documents from the White House and 29 agencies.

At the conclusion of his years-long investigation, Chairman Waxman's staff prepared a staff report entitled "The Activities of the White House Office of Political Affairs." Chairman Waxman called for the elimination of the Office. The Waxman Report stated:

The White House Office of Political Affairs has been controversial since President Reagan created the office in 1981. . . . But the extent of political activity by the . . . White House and its deep and systematic reach into the federal agencies is unprecedented. Congress should amend the Hatch Act, the federal law

restricting political activity by federal officials, to eliminate the White House Office of Political Affairs. If the political affairs office is retained, its activities should be restructured to ensure that it serves the interests of the taxpayer, not the political party of the President. 18

In the report, the Waxman staff concluded that the White House organized the travel of senior administration officials around politically advantageous locations and specifically used travel as a tool to help elect or re-elect members of their party to public office. The report counted events that were attended personally by senior administration officials. It reported that 303 events required travel outside of Washington, D.C. The Waxman staff concluded that these events violated the Hatch Act. They wrote the events "established precisely the type of 'political boiler-room' that the Congress warned against when it amended the Hatch Act in 1993." The report stated that the taxpayers "should

... not pay the travel expenses of cabinet and other senior officials to fly across the country" for political purposes.²¹

During President Obama's short time in office, there has been some indication that the White House has ignored Chairman Waxman's concerns. For example, according to a *Washington Post* story last year about travel related to marketing of the President's stimulus plan, "public policy and electoral politics have come together seamlessly in his domestic travel itinerary." The *Post* reported:

Since becoming president, he hasn't set foot in a state he won by nearly 40 percentage points in November's general election.

But thousands have heard Obama speak in Ohio, North Carolina, Missouri, Indiana and Florida, all among the 16 states he has visited since taking office. In each of those places, his margin of victory or defeat last November was fewer than five percentage points.

On nearly every trip he has taken, Obama has followed the timeworn path of presidential travel — go where the votes matter most.

But the travel suggests a White House far more interested in electoral politics than its leader and senior staff members publicly acknowledge. The swing-state stops are just one element of a West Wing political operation that has preserved many practices of preceding ones, and that takes into account the dynamics of the 2010 midterm elections and the next presidential race in deciding where to spend Obama's time.

Of the 16 states Obama has visited, nine shifted from the Republican to Democratic column in 2008. Five of the states are among the six that posted the narrowest margins of victory for either Obama or Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.), and are likely to remain the most closely divided through the coming campaign cycles.

* * *

Obama has raised money in California, Indiana and Nevada, and election law calls for the government to be reimbursed for those explicitly political aspects of his travel.²³

Last June, *Politico* similarly reported administration officials have traveled to at least 66 events across the country to tout the stimulus program, but the events were almost exclusively tied to obviously politically motivated destinations. According to *Politico*:

Since Congress passed President Barack Obama's \$787 billion economic stimulus bill in February, administration officials have traveled to at least 66 events across the country to tout the massive spending program or hand out stimulus cash to grateful local officials.

* * *

Top officials have hosted events predominantly in states that Obama won in 2008.

What's more, the examination revealed that Obama officials all but avoided Southern states that Obama lost.

But the numbers tell the tale: 52 of the 66 events were in states that backed Obama. And taken together, the itineraries amount to a veritable map of Obama's election-night victories — big-money states like California and New York, swing states like Ohio and Colorado that Obama turned blue and other solidly Democratic states Obama kept in his column.²⁴

This is precisely the type of political travel former Chairman Waxman spent years investigating. This is what he deemed Hatch Act violations.

I am interested in developing a better understanding of whether the types of political travel Chairman Waxman invested so much time and energy attempting to eradicate are still occurring. To assist the Committee in learning more about this Administration's practices with regard to political travel, I request that you provide the Committee with the following information:

- Provide a list of all events with elected officials or candidates for office that
 you attended outside of Washington, D.C., in an official capacity during the
 time period February 1, 2009 to the present. For each event, please provide
 the date and location of the event, a brief description of the purpose of the
 event, the identity of the elected officials or candidates for office attending the
 event, and a statement declaring whether taxpayer funds were used to travel to
 the event.
- 2. Provide a list of all events with elected officials or candidates for office that you attended outside of Washington, D.C., for political purposes, whether it be a fundraiser, rally, or other political function, during the time period February 1, 2009 to the present. For each event, please provide the date and location of the event, a brief description of the purpose of the event, the identity of the elected officials or candidates for office attending the event, and a statement declaring whether taxpayer funds were used in part to travel to the event.
- 3. All documents, including emails, that relate to the involvement of White House officials in scheduling, suggesting, coordinating, or directing public events with elected officials or candidates for office for any official at the Department during the time period February 1, 2009 to the present.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is the principal oversight committee in the House of Representatives and has broad oversight jurisdiction as set forth in House Rule X.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is investigating the extent to which U.S. taxpayer money is directly or indirectly funding criminal patronage networks, power brokers, and the Taliban in Afghanistan. On July 25, 2011, it was reported that Department of Defense investigators have found "documented, credible evidence... of involvement in a criminal enterprise or support for the enemy" by multiple prime contractors. According to *The Washington Post*, investigators also cited cases of profiteering, money laundering and kickbacks to Afghan power brokers, government officials and police officers. If accurate, these findings could serve as a major setback for the United States and its efforts in Afghanistan.

To assist the Committee in its oversight, I request that the Department provide a copy of the report referenced by *The Washington Post* and arrange to brief staff on the findings contained therein. This should occur no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 2, 2011. When producing documents to the Committee, please deliver production sets to the Majority Staff in room 2157 of the Rayburn House Office Building and the Minority Staff in room 2471 of the Rayburn House Office Building. The Committee prefers, if possible, to receive all documents in electronic format.

I am writing to follow up on my letter to you dated June 3, 2010. In that letter, I requested documents and information about the involvement of White House political personnel in coordinating your travel to official and political events that may have benefited Democratic candidates for office. This investigation continues the work this Committee began in the last Congress under then-Chairman Waxman. To date, I have not received the information I requested or any explanation about the delay. Ordinarily, the Department of Defense (DoD) is more cooperative.

Recently, a DoD insider provided information and email correspondence to my staff confirming that your staff issued what appears to be a "stop work order" with respect to my request. An email exchange between senior officials granted the Office of the General Counsel's request that the suspense date (i.e., due date) be "turned off due to this letter going to 21 Agencies, and response requiring Administration guidance." Essentially, Michael Bruhn and Christian Marrone, both top aides in your office, ensured that all work on my request would stop and the due date would be ignored. The correspondence also indicates that Mr. Marrone would provide an explanation offline, effectively obscuring his motives from scrutiny.

The actions of senior DoD officials are inconsistent with the President's commitment "to making his administration the most open and transparent in history." They are also inconsistent with federal law under 5-U.S.C. § 552. At the outset of his presidency, President Obama reiterated that "the way to make government accountable is make it transparent so that the American people can know exactly what decisions are

being made, how they're being made, and whether their interests are being well served."² He went on to state as follows:

I will also hold myself as President to a new standard of openness. Going forward, anytime the American people want to know something that I or a former President wants to withhold, we will have to consult with the Attorney General and the White House Counsel, whose business it is to ensure compliance with the rule of law. Information will not be withheld just because I say so. It will be withheld because a separate authority believes my request is well grounded in the Constitution.³

The President further urged federal agencies "to adopt a presumption in favor of disclosure." It is in the interests of transparency to disclose all information related to the White House's involvement in Cabinet officials' travel. Moreover, this Committee has broad jurisdiction to conduct oversight of the federal government.

I trust that you will reconsider my original request. If it is your position not to provide the requested materials, I request that you articulate the basis for this position in writing. Additionally, to better understand the status of my letter request, I ask that you make Michael Bruhn and Christian Marrone available for transcribed interviews. Please contact Steve Castor or Ashok Pinto of the Committee staff at (202) 225-5074 with any questions.

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is investigating the facts and circumstances surrounding alleged corruption and mismanagement at the Dawood National Military Hospital in Afghanistan. The *Wall Street Journal* recently detailed disturbing accounts of substandard patient care, corruption and malfeasance in the operation and provision of basic medical care to Afghan soldiers wounded or injured in the line of duty. As part of the Committee's oversight, we are writing to request documents and information regarding this U.S. taxpayer-funded institution.

Dawood National Military Hospital ("Dawood Hospital") was designed to facilitate the recovery of Afghan soldiers wounded on the battlefield. According to reports, however, Afghans routinely experienced "willful" neglect at the hands of medical providers. Time and again, caregivers denied or withheld the most rudimentary services if patients did not pay bribes. In some cases, surgeons operated without sedatives or provided counterfeit medicine that failed to work. Those who asked for medicine received a beating instead. In all, according to these accounts, the horrific conditions resulted in crippling bedsores, extreme starvation, and death.

While the wounded suffered, the Afghan Army's Surgeon General, Ahmed Zia Yaftali, reportedly diverted millions of dollars in cash and pharmaceuticals earmarked for Dawood Hospital. According to the *Wall Street Journal*, General Yaftali pilfered roughly \$20 million dollars from the Afghan defense ministry and \$153 million in medical supplies provided by the U.S.³ Though he appears to have been removed from that post and the U.S. military has taken some remedial measures, there is little assurance that he will be held accountable for mistreating Afghans and fleecing the American people. This is an unacceptable result given the sacrifices made by Americans and Afghans over the past ten years.

Unfortunately, this behavior is emblematic of a wider culture of corruption in Afghanistan. As the Wall Street Journal observes, "[t]he way senior Afghan officials tolerated such deadly graft shows

just how deeply rooted corruption has become in President Karzai's administration, as well as the limits of Washington's ability to rein it in." Indeed, the inability of all parties to purge corruption from the Afghan government is a detriment to U.S. efforts. The ability of the Afghan people to place trust in their institutions – and by extension, the U.S. government – is the cornerstone of the counterinsurgency strategy. Holding General Yaftali and others accountable for their actions at Dawood Hospital would be a step in the right direction.

To assist this Committee with its oversight, we request that the Department produce the following information and documents in hard copy and electronic format:

- 1. All documents and communications referring or relating to Dawood National Military Hospital and allegations of corruption;
- 2. The total amount, by fiscal year, of U.S. funding provided for Dawood National Military Hospital. This should include FY-12 projections;
- The type, quantity, and value of pharmaceuticals provided by the U.S. government for the Dawood National Military Hospital;
- 4. A timeline and description of events detailing how, when, and in what manner Defense Department officials became aware of mistreatment and mismanagement at Dawood National Military Hospital. This should include the names and contact information of those who were informed, and by whom they were informed;
- 5. A timeline and description of events detailing the actions taken by the U.S. government to remedy the mistreatment and mismanagement at the Dawood National Military Hospital;
- A list of all similar instances of corruption involving Dawood National Military Hospital or any other medical facility paid for by U.S. taxpayer dollars;
- 7. The total amount, by fiscal year, of U.S. funding provided for all other medical facilities in Afghanistan since 2001. This should include a list of the medical facilities, the number of U.S. and Afghan personnel serving at each facility, as well as the geographical coordinates of each facility;
- The total amount, by fiscal year, of all U.S. funding provided for medical supplies to
 Afghanistan. This should also include the total amount known to be lost due to waste,
 fraud, and abuse; and
- 9. All documents describing the extent to which the Afghan government is prosecuting those guilty of corruption, including General Ahmed Zia Yaftali and all others connected to the mistreatment and mismanagement at Dawood National Military Hospital.

We request that you provide the requested documents and information as soon as possible, but no later than October 27, 2011. Documents produced in response to this request must include an index

The Committee on Oversight and Government Reform is conducting oversight of the Defense Department's efforts to properly care for injured and fallen service members. As part of this oversight, we are writing to request information regarding recent reports in the Washington Post and several other news outlets of the improper handling and preparation of remains at Port Mortuary at Dover Air Force Base, Delaware. According to an investigation of whistleblower reports completed by the Office of Special Counsel, there were "serious violations of rules and regulations, gross mismanagement, dishonesty and misconduct" by individuals employed at Port Mortuary.2

To assist with the Committee's oversight, we ask that you please produce the following information:

- A copy of the Defense Department's policies and procedures regarding the handling, preparation, and burial of remains;
- 2. A list and description of all allegations involving improper handling, preparation, and burial of remains since January 1, 2002. This should include, but shall not be limited to, the incidents that occurred at Port Mortuary;
- All documents and communications referring or relating to allegations involving improper handling, preparation, and burial of remains since January 1, 2002. This should include, but shall not be limited to, the incidents that occurred at Port Mortuary;

- In complying with this request, you should produce all responsive documents that are in your possession, custody, or control, whether held by you or your past or present agents, employees, and representatives acting on your behalf. Dear Secretary Gates:

We recently discovered that the Air Force has rescinded an invitation to Dr. Tony Perkins to speak at its National Prayer Luncheon, because statements posted on the website of the organization he leads are purportedly at odds with the positions of the President. This action troubles us a great deal, not only in this particular case, but because of the implications for anyone who might disagree with the Administration in the future.

The luncheon in which Dr. Perkins, a former Marine, was scheduled to participate was designed as a time of prayer, not a policy discussion. With a brief letter sent on January 29, Chaplain Lt. Col. Gary Bertsch informed Dr. Perkins that he was rescinding the invitation "due to statements posted on the Family Research Council website which are incompatible in our role as military members who serve our elected officials and our Commander in Chief." No further explanation of these statements nor the alleged incompatibility was provided.

What is clear from this letter, however, is the establishment of a new litmus test: if one disagrees with the President, that person is not welcome to participate in military activities. Holding private citizens to such a standard – one not even expected of senior military officials who are often asked to give their expert opinion to Congress – is incredibly disconcerting. The chilling impact such a standard could have on the free speech of private citizens and those who serve in our armed forces – guaranteeing precisely these types of freedoms – cannot be allowed to stand.

We respectfully ask for a reply to this letter, informing us of the written or unwritten policies that led to the decision to rescind Dr. Perkins's invitation to participate in the Air Force's National Prayer Luncheon. Specifically, is it the policy of the Air Force and/or other branches of the armed services to allow only those individuals who agree with the President on all matters of policy to participate in ministry events they host?

With the recent passing of Frank W. Buckles of West Virginia, the last surviving American to have served during the First World War, America has lost its final living connection to a war that saw our nation emerge as the world's preeminent defender of liberty and democratic values.

Between 1916 and 1918, more than 116,000 Americans gave their lives – and an additional 200,000 suffered injury – on the battlefields of Western Europe and on the high seas. The loss of Frank Buckles provides an opportunity for every American to pause and reflect on the sacrifices his entire generation made to secure the blessings of freedom.

To this end, we respectfully request, in addition to his interment in Arlington Cemetery, that the remains of Corporal Frank Buckles, U.S. Army, August 1917-January 1920, be allowed to lie in honor for a period of time in the cemetery's Memorial Amphitheater.

On November 11, 1921, at a ceremony marking the burial of the Unknown Soldier from the First-World War, President Warren G. Harding said, "Standing today on hallowed ground, conscious that all America has halted to share in the tribute of heart and mind and soul to this fellow-American, and knowing that the world is noting this expression of the republic's mindfulness, it is fitting to say that his sacrifice, and that of millions dead, shall not be in vain."

Like the Unknown Soldier buried that day in 1921, Frank Buckles answered the call of duty to defend his country. He loved America and was assured of its ultimate victory. His contributions and sacrifice on behalf of the Republic mark him as true patriot worthy of the hallowed grounds of Arlington.



We are writing to ascertain your Department's implementation and enforcement of the relevant provisions of the Comprehensive Iran Sanctions, Accountability, and Divestment Act (P.L. 111-195), which the President signed into law on July 1, 2010.

As you know, section 102(b)(3) of that legislation amended the Iran Sanctions Act (50 USC 1701 note) to require that the Federal Acquisition Regulation be revised by not later than September 29, 2010, "to require a certification from each person that is a prospective contractor that the person, and any person owned or controlled by the person owned or controlled by the person, does not engage in any activity for which sanctions may be imposed under section 5" of the Iran Sanctions Act. Section 102(b)(3) also requires the head of an executive agency, if he "determines that a person has submitted a false certification" in this regard, to "terminate a contract with such person or debar or suspend such person from eligibility for Federal contracts for a period of not more than 3 years."

Reports indicate that the Department of Defense has contracted with numerous entities that may have conducted sanctionable activities under section 5 of the Iran Sanctions Act, including: Aker Solutions; Daelim Industrial Corporation; Eni; Inpex; Komatsu; Maersk; Repsol; Royal Dutch Shell; Sasol Limited; ThyssenKrupp AG; Total; and WorleyParsons.

Therefore, we would respectfully request information on your Department's plans or actions already undertake to come into compliance with the statutory requirements, including by requiring the above-referenced certifications and ceasing any contracting with entities that continue to conduct sanctionable activities under section 5 of the Iran Sanctions Act.

This letter is Mobile Medical Mission Hospitals (MMMH) request for rotary air support to our humanitarian mission to St. Vincent and the Grenedienes during the period 24 to 28 May 2010.

MMMH conducts, yearly, an Eye Care Medical Mission for the chizens of St. Vincent. In years past, we have been constrained to limit our support to the main island's major city, Kingstown, since there is very limited transportation assets available to support the medical teams providing eye care missions to remote islands and locations on the main Island of St. Vincent.

MMMH request that the US Military provide for the detec above rotary air support to transport the medical team and its limited supplies to the island around St. Vincent and to remote villages on the main island. None of the locations are greater than 50 miles from Kingstown. It is anticipated that the flight would be based at the main airport for Kingstown.

The support requested is for a maximum of 4 flights per day to the needed locations. Each flight would have no more than 3-4 personnel and approximately 300Hz of medical equipment and supplies.

As you heard during your February 3rd testimony before the House Armed Services Committee, there appears to be a major disconnect between the perspectives of the Department and the Committee regarding the F-35's F136 alternate, competitive fighter engine program. We maintain great respect for your judgment and the sincerity of your position, but have not been provided any analysis that supports your view. In fact, the best "business case" information the committee has received clearly supports continued development of the alternate engine. Therefore, we are concerned by your reference to a possible Presidential veto over this issue, and we are equally concerned that the Department has not provided us with the "business case" analysis you have referenced, despite our repeated requests.

Approximately seventy-five percent of the development investment has already been made in the alternate engine. From various sources, including the 2007 analysis by the Department's Cost Analysis Improvement Group, we understand that for little or no net additional cost to the taxpayer, the alternate engine competition improves the F-35 program by addressing potential aircraft weight growth. The follow-on alternate engine may meet this challenge through evolving technology. Other advantages include insurance against fleet-wide engine problems, growth paths for propulsion systems, enhanced contractor responsiveness, technological innovation, improved operational readiness and a more robust industrial base. Consequently, we were surprised by the Department's 2006 decision not to include a request for funding in the fiscal year 2007 budget for the F136, after ten years of defending it for all the reasons we have listed.

Since the Department's about face, Congress has invested an additional \$1.75 billion in the alternate engine. Most of this additional investment came after the Department's 2007 analysis concluded that the alternate engine program lifecycle cost considerations were "not compelling" because then year dollar projections showed a \$2.2 billion savings while present value dollar projections showed a \$1.2 billion dollar loss. It is very possible that our additional fiscal year 2007-2010 investments changed the cost case from "not compelling" to a "net savings," a rare win, win for defense dollar expenditures. At the very least, our recent investments in the alternate engine make breakeven more likely going forward.

We will not detail here the accumulated testing failures, required redesigns, major cost growth and repeated delays experienced thus far with the baseline engine. We simply note that, in our view, these problems bolster



the case for a competing alternate engine. History tells us that competition serves the taxpayer well – especially when it comes to fighter engines.

In an August 2009 speech in Fort Worth, you mentioned that the "business case" did not support the alternate engine program. The committee requested a copy of that "business case" and was told by your legislative affairs staff that there was no formal analysis, beyond the Department's 2007 study. Yet you again referenced the "business case" during the February 3rd hearing and in your February 1st meeting with chairmen and ranking members of the congressional defense committees.

Therefore, we respectfully request that you immediately provide the Committee with the "business case" analysis you referenced in testimony that supports discontinuing the alternate engine program for the F-35.

We are writing in our capacity as members of the Military Family Caucus to express our concern with the sudden suspension of the Military Spouse Career Advancement Account (MyCAA). Authorized in 2009 in the National Defense Authorization Act, this program provides critical support to military spouses allowing them to pursue portable careers in high demand, high growth occupations. We are seeking your help to better understand the basis for this "pause," how long the "pause" will be in effect, and the impact it will have on spouses.

While military spouses often would like to follow a traditional education path, their lifestyles prevent them from doing so. Many access online courses as opposed to enrolling in semester long "in-person" courses to better suit their family needs. The MyCAA provides the critical support that these military spouses need to succeed in school and in their careers.

We have heard from military spouses who are directly impacted by this program termination. They explain that a disruption in funding may cause many of them to miss a final term or delay the completion of their degrees – possibly without the opportunity to finish once they are relocated. Many military spouses have planned their careers and lives around the assumption that this program would continue without interruption.

The sudden abatement of this program has significantly impacted an overwhelming number of spouses - preventing them from moving forward with their lives. To our knowledge, the Department of Defense has yet to fill this gap or provide any detailed information as to when this program will resume. With 133,000 military spouses participating in this program, we are concerned with the practical impact of this "pause".

The MyCAA program not only provides training and benefits, but gives military spouses much needed confidence that they are contributors to their families' needs. Halting this program without notice is not the way to support those who sacrifice so much to make our military what it is today. We look forward to your response and are hopeful that the program is up and running very soon.

We write to express our great concern over the decision made by Army Secretary John McHugh and Army Chief of Staff Gen. George W. Casey Jr. to rescind an invitation to Reverend Franklin Graham to speak at the National Day of Prayer on May 6th, 2010, due to complaints raised and publicized by two special interest groups that object to his Christian beliefs and his criticisms of the Islamic faith. We find this decision misguided for several reasons.

Army spokesman Col. Tom Collins is quoted as saying that Secretary McHugh and General Casey decided "it would be inappropriate for [Reverend Graham] to participate in this inclusive event" because of Graham's comments about Islam.

From its founding, America has possessed a rich heritage of affirming religious expression in the lives of the men and women serving in the armed forces. Indeed, America's founders and a long line of national and military leaders have realized that the strength of America's military lies in the depth of its faith. Commander-in-Chief George Washington regularly issued orders for military troops to attend and participate in religious gatherings. Declaration signer John Witherspoon, a member of the Board of War that oversaw military operations throughout the Revolution, reminded soldiers: "[T]here is no soldier so undaunted as the pious man, no army so formidable as those who are superior to the fear of death."

It is thus intensely troubling that Pentagon officials have now taken it upon themselves to deign what type of Christian belief and expression is "appropriate," and then to censor a patriotic minister, whose own son is serving his fourth tour of duty in Afghanistan, simply because of the objection of an organization that has made it its mission to eradicate open expressions of religious faith from the military. It is highly ironic that it is in the name of religious freedom and "inclusiveness," peaceful religious expression is actually being stifled.

Reverend Graham is one of America's most respected religious leaders, and is beloved by millions of Americans. We understand that not overyone shares Reverend Graham's beliefs about Islam, but the essence of religious liberty is having the right to one's own religious convictions as well as the right to express them. We would like to know for the future by what standard the U.S. military is going to judge what are appropriate religious convictions? Our Founding Fathers understood that religious pluralism did not mean we didn't have disagreements about religion, but that we would disagree peaceably, something Franklin Graham has always done. But now, the U.S. military is putting itself in the position of judging what acceptable belief is. Might the Secretary explain to the Congress just how it will do this?

We do not believe that Reverend Graham's views of Islam should exclude him from this event. If our concept of religious freedom today is based primarily on the desire to placate or avoid criticism offered by suspect organizations, then our constitutional right of freedom of religion is devoid of both meaning and principle.

We ask that you reconsider the decision to revoke Reverend Graham's invitation, and extend to him the opportunity to preach his welcome message to the men and women of our armed forces, and indeed to the Nation at the National Day of Prayer event at the Pentagon.

We look forward to hearing from you very soon.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

We write to bring to your attention the plight of our Iraqi allies, those Iraqis who have worked alongside our troops and diplomats as interpreters and in other capacities since 2003, and who are now threatened for their service. We urge you to work with the Department of State and other federal agencies to develop contingency plans to protect these allies as our forces redeploy.

Since 2003, tens of thousands of Iraqis have worked, or continue to work for, the Department of Defense, the Department of State, U.S. government contractors and other U.S. government funded entities in Iraq. Al Qaeda in Iraq and other terrorist groups affiliated with the Islamic State of Iraq have labeled these Iraqis traitors, collaborators and worse. Many have already paid the ultimate price for their service, and many more may be at risk after U.S. troops depart Iraq.

Resettlement to the United States could be the only safe option for thousands of our Iraqi employees. We commend the State Department and the Department of Homeland Security for expanding and accelerating the admission process for Iraqi refugees during the past three years. However, we are advised that the application process for Iraqi refugees currently takes a year or more on average, and that fewer than 5,000 of those resettled to date were employed by the United States in Iraq. This process will not work quickly enough when U.S.-affiliated Iraqis need it the most urgently.

A second path to resettlement, Special Immigrant Visas (SIVs), has also underperformed the current need. As you know, the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008 expanded the availability of Special Immigrant Visas (SIVs) to enable U.S.-affiliated Iraqis to resettle to the United States, providing 5,000 visas per fiscal year for principal applicants with a carryover of unused availability to succeeding years. However, out of a current availability of 15,000 SIVs, only 2,145 have been issued to principal applicants to date.

Finally, we should consider an airlift, for later processing, out of Iraq for those Iraqis who worked for or on behalf of the United States, who wish to leave Iraq, and who cannot be processed before all U.S. troops depart. The British did exactly this as they departed Basra and militant thugs openly hunted Iraqis who had worked for the British, airlifting their surviving Iraqi employees directly to a Royal Air Force base in England. Each of America's principal coalition partners – Britain, Denmark, and Poland – has honored its moral obligation to endangered Iraqi employees through airlifts to military bases.

There is precedent for a similar undertaking by the United States in Iraq. In the 1996 Operation Pacific Haven, the United States airlifted more than 6,000 Iraqis to Guam in a matter of weeks, where they were safely processed for resettlement to the United States. While the circumstances are somewhat different, our country also used Guam as a processing center for tens of thousands of Vietnamese refugees in 1975.

Mr. Secretary, time is of the essence in developing a plan to address this looming crisis as the August 31, 2010 withdrawal date rapidly approaches. The United States has a moral obligation to stand by those Iraqis who have risked their lives – and the lives of their families – to stand by us in Iraq for the past seven years, and doing so is also in our strategic self-interest. Providing support for our Iraqi allies will advance U.S. national security interests around the world, particularly in Afghanistan, by sending a message that foreign nationals who support our work abroad can expect some measure of protection.

We urge that you recommend to the President the promotion of Brigadier General Charles E. "Chuck" Yeager to the grade of Major General on the United States Air Force retired list.

In Section 563 of the Ronald W. Reagan National Defense Authorization Act for 2005, Congress authorized the President of the United States to appoint Brigadier General Charles E. Yeager, United States Air Force (retired), to the grade of major general on the retired list of the Air Force. Despite being recommended for this promotion by the senior leadership of the United States Air Force, in July 2007 then Secretary of Defense Robert Gates declined to forward Brigadier General Yeager's recommendation for promotion to the President.

64 years after General Yeager became the first person to break the sound barrier, we believe it is time to recognize this American Hero with this promotion. We urge that you recommend to the President that Brigadier General Yeager be advanced on the retired list of the United States Air Force to the grade of major general as authorized by law.

By the end of his storied career, General Yeager had flown more than 10,000 hours in more than 330 different models of aircraft and became the youngest military pilot to be inducted into the Aviation Hall of Fame in 1973. General Yeager has been decorated with the Purple Heart, Bronze Star with V device, Air Force Commendation medal, Silver Star with oak leaf cluster, Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with ten clusters, Presidential Medal of Freedom, and special peacetime Medal of Honor.

General Yeager is also the recipient of every major award in the field of flight, including the Collier Trophy, Harmon International Trophy, and the Federation Aeronautique International Gold Medal. Even today, General Yeager is still actively involved in flight, serving as a consultant to the Air Force Flight Test Center at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

General Yeager is an American Hero and serves as an icon and role model for our servicemen and women. He is an American legend and should be promoted to the grade of Major General on the United States Air Force retired list. We urge that you make this recommendation to President Obama.

Dear Secretary Gates:

Since you announced your decision August 9 to recommend to the President to close the U.S. Joint Forces Command (USJFCOM) as part of a series of initiatives designed to gain efficiencies in the Department of Defense, we have been alarmed at your lack of analytical rigor supporting your closure recommendation and the lack of transparency in disclosing what analysis you might have with Congress and the affected Defense Community.

To be clear, we are in strong support of aggressive, collaborative action to identify any inefficiency not just within the Department of Defense, but across the entire federal government, to ensure that all tax revenue is put to the greatest use and we commend your efforts to reduce overhead and to apply savings to force structure and modernization.

However, the failure to consult more fully with Congress in a transparent way works against the Department's ultimate goal of becoming more cost-conscious and efficient in providing for our nation's defense and erodes the credibility of the Department of Defense.

We are also concerned about the impact that the closure of JFCOM will have on the military's joint training, operations, concept development, and experimentation. JFCOM's focus on warfighters' joint capabilities, a function of growing importance as our military operates with coalition forces around the world, specifically with regard to readiness and interoperability, is critical. JFCOM's leadership in joint force and coalition training over the last decade has led to key advancements in the ability of all branches of our armed forces to deploy together more effectively for joint operations.

In the nearly two months since your announcement, we have sent multiple requests for substantiating information. While we acknowledge that representatives from

the Department of Defense were made available for a staff level brief, the information provided was of little relevance or use. There were no substantive, analytical data provided. Your continued refusal to provide any supporting information indicates that your philosophical decision was made without any analysis as would be expected of a closure of this magnitude. As a result, we have no information that allows us to quantify the possible effects of your proposal. We again request full disclosure of all pertinent documents and analysis supporting your decision to close JFCOM.

If the Department does not provide the requested information and documents prior to the scheduled hearings on this matter on 28-29 September, we will request that the Chairs of the committees of jurisdiction use every means available to compel the Department of Defense to provide the documents and information to Congress.

We appreciate you quick response and support of this request and look forward to further collaborative efforts to identify inefficiencies within the Department of Defense.

We are writing to express our appreciation for the manner in which you handled the aftermath of the November 5, 2009 Fort Hood Shooting. We have reviewed the January 2010 DoD Independent Review Related to Fort Hood ("Independent Review") and your August 18th memo, Final Recommendations of the Ft. Hood Follow-on Review ("August Memo"), and believe that the steps outlined in the reports will help protect our men and women in uniform from another tragedy.

In particular, we strongly support the Independent Review findings, and the August Memo's recommendations that, "the Department identify and incorporate civilian law enforcement best practices, including response to the active shooter threat, into training certifications for civilian police and security guards" outlined in Section 4.3 (pages 37-38 and 15-16, respectively). We encourage you to include an official from a recognized, best practice active shooter-training program, such as the training program used by the first responders at Fort Hood and identified in the "Independent Review," (page 37, footnote 64) in the Law Enforcement Training Standards Working Group described in the August Memo. Please keep us apprised of the process you will use to appoint participants to the working group.

The inclusion of an official from a national civilian law enforcement active shooter-training program will bring extensive knowledge and experience in developing active shooter curriculum. Specifically, this official will have the background in creating and managing an active shooter program, which is currently used by civilian law enforcement agencies across the country. This will ensure the standards and training curriculum developed and adopted by the Department are consistent with the civilian law enforcement agencies outside the installations.

We are pleased that the Department is taking steps to address the lack of a policy and training for active shooter situations. We know with certainty that active shooter training has proven effective as clearly demonstrated by the responding officers in the Fort Hood incident. It is significant that the Independent Review and the August Memo state, "...during this incident the responding officers attributed their actions to this new protocol (page 37)." This training should be used throughout the military both for installation protection and strategic operations in theater.



In recent years, there have been numerous active shooter situations in which an individual or a group of individuals began shooting at unarmed civilians in public places, including military installations. As you know, in addition to the tragedy at Fort Hood, there have been shootings at Fort Bragg, NC, Camp Pennsylvania, Kuwait, Camp Liberty, Iraq, Little Rock, AR, and Tuz, Iraq. In addition, civilian law enforcement officials prevented two apparent imminent active shooter attacks on military installations including the atrest of a suspect in Branchburg, NJ on January 25, 2010 who appeared to planning an attack on Fort Drum, NY. On May 7, 2007, the FBI arrested six suspects and later convicted five for terrorism after the group plotted to attack Fort Dix, NJ and "kill as many soldiers as possible."

The civilian active shooter-training program has proven effective at Fort Hood and in countless other situations. We urge you to fully implement active shooter training and response protocols for military police (all branches) and DoD Civilian Police.

Additionally, this training should be conducted in coordination with nearby civilian law enforcement agencies to ensure a seamless response in the event of an active shooter incident.

Again, thank you for your efforts to ensure that our military facilities are as safe as possible. We would appreciate an update regarding the implementation of the August Memo recommendations as soon as possible.

The enactment of the Budget Control Act of 2011 codifies an agreement between the Administration and Congress as to the maximum total level of discretionary spending for the next ten years. As you know, in the first two years there is also agreement with respect to overall amounts that will be spent on the security agencies – defined in statute for the first time to include the Departments of Defense, Homeland Security, and Veterans Affairs, the National Nuclear Security Administration, the intelligence community management account, and the international affairs budget function (Function 150). There is, however, no agreement in the Budget Control Act as to the appropriate level of funding for any individual department or agency within that security category.

Each of you has recently commented that the Administration believes funding for the Department of Defense should be reduced by somewhere between \$330 billion and \$420 billion over the next ten years. This would be an unprecedented drawdown in defense while U.S. forces are committed to contingency operations in Afghanistan and Libya, and possibly still in Iraq. More troubling than the lack of any historical precedent, however, is that this decision to reduce defense spending – first announced by the President in April – has preceded any substantial analysis of the future roles, missions, and capabilities we want our military to perform. Although the President has directed DOD leadership to commence a "strategic review," as General Martin Dempsey confirmed recently in testimony before the Senate Armed Services Committee, the military has been given, "a target and we're trying to determine what the impact would be to meet that target." Former Secretary Gates correctly described such a budget-first approach as "math, not strategy."

Since we have not seen the outcome of the Administration's strategic review, it is imperative that Members of Congress, and particularly members of our committees, obtain a better understanding of the impact of these reductions on the Defense Department and its ability to meet its mission. We have three requests for additional information to help inform Congress as we finalize the fiscal year 2012 defense budget and as the Joint Select Committee begins its work.

First, there are less than two months left before the beginning of fiscal year 2012. Determining final funding levels for DOD will be a high priority when Congress reconvenes in September. To assist Congress as we work to ensure that we provide all of the resources needed by our men and women in uniform, we request an update on the status of and any preliminary conclusions from the DOD comprehensive review and the budgetary consequences flowing there from.

Second, if the Joint Select Committee's legislation is not enacted or fails to achieve at least \$1.2 trillion of deficit reduction, alternative spending caps for national defense come into effect for fiscal years 2013-2021. The cap for the national defense budget function (Function 050) would be \$546 billion in fiscal year 2013, \$6 billion less than fiscal year 2011. This cap then becomes the baseline against which any future discretionary sequestrations would occur. To be clear, the revised discretionary cap levels do not represent an agreed policy between the Administration and Congress - they only go into effect in what Secretary Panetta has called the 'toomsday mechanism.' It is for that reason that we are troubled by reports that indicate that the fiscal year 2013 budget guidance from OMB to the Department of Defense has cited the alternative spending caps as the appropriate basis for budget preparation. We request that you provide further clarification regarding any budget guidance that has been issued for Function 050 for fiscal year 2013.

Finally, Director Lew, in your August 4th blog entry, you stated, "make no mistake: the sequester is not meant to be policy." And in your recent press conference, Secretary Panetta, you stated that the cuts contemplated by sequestration would do real damage to our security, our troops and their families, and our military's ability to protect the nation." Therefore, we ask for further information about the national security consequences if the doomsday mechanism is triggered and sequestration takes place for fiscal years 2013-2021.

We appreciate your attention to this letter and your shared commitment to our nation's security. We look forward to your prompt response.
