ANNEX - AI-A-08-01_CENTRALLY MANAGED SUPPLIES AND SERVICES AND NATO ACQUISITION AND CONTRACTING

- 1. <u>Background.</u> As an Army non-expeditionary and expeditionary contracting force, ECC supports: installation contracting, humanitarian relief and natural disaster response missions, military exercises, peace and combat operations, Department of State's Office of Security Cooperation (OSC), and Defense Support of Civilian Authority. Our goal is to execute our contracting mission in the most efficient and effective manner possible by following FAR Part 8 and its supplements and through local purchase when authorized. We do this by leveraging all available sources of supplies and services. Additionally in Paragraph 5 we provide linkage to NATO Acquisition and Logistics procedures and agreements.
- 2. <u>Authority to Local Purchase</u>. Prior to initiating any procurement action, the ECC Civilian workforce and/or Contingency Contracting Force (CCF) shall ensure supported units provide appropriate local purchase authority indicating:
- a. The supply system will not support mission requirements for items such as Class I- bottled water/food; Class III-petroleum products; Class IV-construction/ barrier materials; Class V-ammunition; and Class VIII-medical supplies/equipment.

NOTE: In no way does this prohibit the use of a contract to support a customer requirement when local purchase authority provides regulatory relief when the supply system will not meet a customer unit's mission requirements. In addition, in a contingency or support of OSC, CCFs shall leverage designated reach-back support based on theater or local procurement guidelines. (See attached points of contact paragraph 4)

b. For Army weapon systems or program managed items, coordinate with the appropriate Army Contracting Command's (ACC) Contracting Center.

NOTE: Contracting professionals shall facilitate coordination between supported units and the appropriate ACC Contracting Center (See attached points of contact enclosure).

- c. Other Defense Agency sources of supply and services include:
 - (1) U.S. Army Intelligence and Security Command for linguist/interpreter/translator requirements.
 - (2) Defense Information Systems Agency for satellite equipment or services.
 - (3) Defense Intelligence Agency for interrogator services.
- (4) United States Air Force-Air Mobility Command's Commercial Airlift Division for all approved air carriers.
- (5) U.S. Army Corps of Engineers for engineering, construction, real estate requirements-Contingency Real Estate Support Team, and environmental management products.

Note: (See attached points of contact paragraph 4)

d. Government Contract Directory website is available to research Indefinite Delivery Vehicles (IDV) awarded by Federal Agencies https://contractdirectory.gov/contractdirectory that may be used for procurements if allowable by the arrangement and DoD policy.

3. Expeditionary Contracting Command's End State. Train the current and future Civilian workforce and CCF to leverage centrally managed sources of supply and services or other agency contract vehicles as sources to fulfill customer requirements. In the event centrally managed sources of supply will not fulfill a customer's needs, execute the contract action and document the contract file to reflect the local purchase authority for not using a centrally managed source. The use of these contract vehicles does not exempt mandated postaward oversight.

This is important for our contracting workforce to understand NATO alliance countries can be mutually supporting at-times vice U.S. forces having to work logistics requirements through our contracting offices.
