## Time for a new kind of foreign policy professional

*(CBS News)...*Roy Godson The United States could embrace a smarter, more adaptive security paradigm that complements military capabilities with new and improved intelligence and political operations, some relearned during our experiences in the first decade of this uncertain century. A U.S. leader who wants to prevent military conflict while maintaining America's national security and global preeminence must be committed to understanding--and shaping--politics in volatile places. We will need large numbers of trained professionals with local knowledge, foreign language skills, and the ability to operate for long periods in a given region. Building this force is difficult, though now we have a pool of resourceful veterans with years of experience in Iraq and Afghanistan, whose knowledge it would be a pity to waste.

Senior Airman Michael Abrash was recently selected as the Air Force Language Professional of the Year for 2011. Although Abrash earned this linguistic honor, he joined the Air Force in a completely different



role: a jet engine mechanic. Being a naturalized U.S. citizen since 2000, Abrash was not aware that his proficiency in Russian could help his career. "There was a shortage of Russian enabled linguists seven months ago to fill a slot in Kyrgyzstan," Abrash said. "So the Air Force sent a mechanic who happens to know Russian." Although Abrash is modest regarding his language skills, his accomplishments abroad did not go unnoticed.

#### <u>Analysis of cross-cultural leadership</u> <u>competencies for United States military</u> <u>leaders: A study of United States military</u> <u>Security Assistance Officers in Cairo, Egypt</u>

*(Indiana Wesleyan University)...*Carlos Braziel This study examined the essential cross-cultural leadership competencies military leaders need in order to be successful in their roles as Security Assistance Officers (SAO). The adequacy or inadequacy of the SAOs' cross-cultural leadership competencies were investigated to determine how the presence or absence of these competencies affect host nation personnel at the United States Embassy in Cairo, Egypt.

(Academic Publisher)...Yanbin Qin Cross-cultural competence is composed of three components, i.e. the sensitivity to cultural differences, tolerance towards cultural differences and flexibility in dealing with problems of cultural differences, which are from low to high in stratification.
