## U.S. military struggles to teach troops to respect Koran

North Atlantic Treaty Organization troops last week started mandatory refresher training on how to handle the Koran. Lt. Col. George Robinson is a senior officer in the Marine Corps' language and culture training programs and has seen the new training documents issued last month. "It's probably a little too simplistic to suggest that it's a simple matter of do's and don'ts," he said. "It's more a matter of why is the Koran important." Mahir Ibrahimov, a top Army advisor on culture and language, is working to update and standardize the service's approach. He said the Koran burnings could affect the Army's training. "If that's the result of a lack of cultural training, of course we need to keep that in mind for the future," he said.

#### Software Turns Sign Language into Text

*(Wall Street Journal)...*Nick Clayton Researchers at Aberdeen University in Scotland are developing technology that will translate sign language into text. It could have a profound impact on the way people with hearing and speech impairments are able to communicate. The Portable Sign Language Translator (PSLT ) has been developed by computing scientists at



Technabling, a spin-out from Aberdeen University. The PSLT recognizes sign language using a

small camera which can be integrated in most mobile devices, such as smartphones, tablet Pcs and netbooks, and then renders it as text displayed on the device's main screen.
