Amid the darkness and the sputters of machine gunfire, service members hustle to assess and treat combat casualty victims. These victims have suffered injuries ranging from loss of limbs to sucking chest wounds.

On the drive from his home in Anoka to MSP airport, William Wilder rehearsed his Arabic. "As salamu alaykum, as salamu alaykum..." It's been almost 21/2 years since he used the language, but he wanted to greet his Iraqi friend properly when he arrived in the United States.

Wilder met Basim Al Hassan in 2009 when he was stationed at the Basra military

base in southern Iraq for a one-year tour with the National Guard. The two worked together at the entry control point to the military base. Al Hassan -- nicknamed "Coy" -was a translator and spoke good English, making it easy for them to shoot the breeze for 10 to 12 hours while they worked.
