Georgia

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
Change in Number of Firms and Gross Receipts for Firms in Georgia 1997 -2002

- In 2002, there were over 137,000 minority firms in Georgia generating over \$18 billion in gross receipts.
- These firms also employed more than 117,000 workers.
- Minority firms represented 21% of all 'classifiable' firms located in the state.
- The number of minority firms in Georgia increased by 55% between 1997 and 2002, compared to 18% for all 'classifiable' firms in the state.
- Georgia had the 6th largest minority population in the country, numbering more than 3.2 million or 38% of the state's total population in 2002.


Percentage of Minority Population, Number of Firms and Gross Receipts Compared to Classifiable Firms, Georgia – 2002



- When compared to their representation in the state's population, only Asian Americans reached parity in both their number of firms and total gross receipts. American Indians and Alaskan Natives reached parity in regards to their number of firms. No other minority group in Georgia has reached parity in the number of firms and gross receipts.
- If minority business activity in Georgia matched the state's minority population percentage in 2002, the number of minority firms in the state would have exceeded 249,000. They would have also generated \$96.6 billion in gross receipts and employed about 580,000 workers.

Table 2: Estimates of the Total Population of States by Race and Hispanic Origin: July 1, 2002. All U.S. Firms include publicly-held, foreign-owned and non-profit firms. Statistics for All Minority, Classifiable Firms and all groups do not include publicly-held, foreign-owned and non-minority-owned firms. These are firms whose ownership can be classified by race, gender of Hispanic origin. Total numbers for Classifiable Firms represent MBDA estimates. Hispanics may be of any race, because business owners were allowed to identify with more than one race category. Due to the exclusion of tribally held governments in 2002, data for American Indian and Alaska Native firms for 1997 and 2002 are not directly comparable. Population estimates for 2002 were for all ages.

Minority Firms in Georgia by Gross Receipts Size, 2002



- While smaller in number, minority-owned Strategic Growth Initiative (SGI) firms with receipts of \$500,000 or above produce a greater percentage of the state's minority economic activity; these firms generate more revenue and offer more paid employment than firms with receipts under \$500,000.
- In 2002, minority-owned SGI firms generated about 72% of all receipts grossed by all minority firms in Georgia and employed 63% of all paid workers employed by minority firms in that state.
- Minority-owned firms in Georgia were also more concentrated in the following industries: other services: administrative support, waste management, and remediation services; health care and social assistance; and retail trade.
