NEW RULES AND RULE PROPOSALS

PROPOSE RULE 10b-2 AMENDMENT. The Commission today announced a proposed amendment to Rule 10b-2 which, subject to certain exceptions, prohibits any person "participating or otherwise financially interested in" a distribution of securities from compensating any person for soliciting on a national securities exchange the purchase of any security of the same issuer whose securities are the subject of the distribution.

Paragraph (c) of the rule presently states that the provisions shall not apply to compensation in the form of a salary paid by a broker or dealer to any person regularly employed by him whose ordinary duties include the solicitation or execution of brokerage orders on a national securities exchange, if such salary represents only ordinary compensation paid to such persons in the regular course of employment and is not paid directly or indirectly for the inducement on a national securities exchange of the purchase or sale of any security of the issuer whose securities are being distributed.

The proposed amendment would permit usual and customary compensation to be paid by a broker or dealer who is participating or otherwise financially interested in a distribution of an issuer's securities to its regular employees for soliciting on a national securities exchange the purchase of any security of the issuer whose securities are the subject of the distribution. In the release announcing the proposed amendment, the Commission indicated that "such compensation would not exceed the usual or customary compensations payable for regular solicitation or execution of brokerage transactions involving similar quantities of the securities at the same price and not as part of a distribution." As amended, paragraph (c) of the rule will continue to prohibit the practice of stimulating exchange/in securities which are the subject of a distribution by prohibiting payment of extra or special compensation for the solicitation of the securities being distributed.

The period during which interested parties may submit their views and comments terminates on March 15, 1973. (Rel. 34-9926)

COMMISSION ANNOUNCEMENTS

SEC ORDER CITES SECURITY BROKERS ASSOCIATES, INC., OTHERS. The SEC has instituted proceedings against Security Brokers Associates, Inc., Security Brokers Investment, Inc., Ward William Setzer, Jr., Marvin Harvey Alkow, and Fredrick L. Schreiner, all of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., based upon allegations that the firms, aided and abetted by Setzer, Alkow and Schreiner, violated the Commission's net capital rule, bookkeeping rules, certain reporting rules and anti-fraud provisions promulgated under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934.

A hearing will be scheduled by further order to take evidence on the staff's allegations for the purpose of determining whether the allegations are true and to afford the respondents an opportunity to offer any defenses, and whether any action of a remedial nature should be ordered by the Commission.

SEC ORDER CITES ALESSANDRINI & CO., INC. OTHERS. The SEC has instituted proceedings against Alessandrini & Co., Inc., of New York City, Paul Alessandrini, Albert Cornett, Richard Seidman, Alvin Lealie, James J. Reilly, employees of Alessandrini and Co., Inc. during the period alleged violations occurred and Perry Scheer an employee of another brokerage firm. The Commission's order is based upon alleged violations by Scheer of the anti-fraud provisions of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 and violations of the anti-fraud and record-keeping provisions of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 by the other respondents.

A hearing will be scheduled by further order to take evidence on the staff allegations and to afford the respondents an opportunity to offer any defenses thereto for the purpose of determining whether the allegations are true, and if so, whether any action of a remedial nature should be ordered by the Commission.

TRADING SUSPENDED IN LILAC TIME SECURITIES. The SEC has ordered the temporary suspension of over-the-counter trading in the securities of Lilac Time, Inc. (Lilac), of Rochester, N. Y., for a 10-day period commencing on January 5 through January 14, 1973. The suspension was ordered because of the unavailability of adequate and accurate information concerning the financial condition and business operations of Lilac and because of the recent unusual market activity in the common stock of Lilac. Certain questions have also been raised as to recent developments concerning the management and control of Lilac. Lilac's common stock has recently experienced a price rise of from 3/8 bid to 5 bid. In addition, Lilac is delinquent in its required filings with the Commission, which include the 10-K Annual Report for the period ending March 31, 1972 and two 10-Q Quarterly Reports. (Rel. 34-9928)

REGULATION A EXEMPTION SUSPENDED. Chief Administrative Law Judge Warren E. Blair has filed an initial decision permanently suspending the Regulation A exemption from registration under the Securities Act of 1933 for public offerings of securities by Dinky's Inc., of Las Vegas, Nev. The decision is subject to review by the Commission.

The permanent suspension was based upon findings that the notification and offering circular filed in connection with a proposed offering of 100,000 shares of Dinky's Inc., common stock at \$5 per share were false and misleading, that the terms and conditions of Regulation A had not been complied with, and that the offering, if made, would be in violation of Sections 5 and 17 of the Securities Act of 1933.

OLD KENNETT LEASING CO, REG A OFFERING SUSPENDED. The SEC has issued an order temporarily suspending a Regulation A exemption from registration under the Securities Act of 1933 with respect to a public offering of securities of Old Kennett Leasing Company, a limited partnership organized under the laws of the State of Delaware. The offering was underwritten by FDI Securities, Inc., of Wilmington, Del.

Pursuant to a notification filed on January 31, 1972, 01d Kennett offered 50 units of limited partnership interests at an offering price of \$10,000 per unit. According to the order, the Commission has reason to believe that (a) the terms and conditions of Regulation A have not been complied with in that the offering, if made, would have exceeded the ceiling for the Regulation A exemption under Rule 254; (b) the notification and offering circular of Old Kennett contain untrue statements of material facts and omit to state material facts necessary in order to make the statements made, in light of the circumstances under which they were made, not misleading, particularly with respect to sales of unregistered securities of affiliates of Old Kennett Leasing Company in violation of Sections 5 and 17 of the Securities Act of 1933, and the contingent liability resulting from the sale of unregistered securities in violation of Section 5 of the Securities Act of 1933; and (c) the offering if made would have been in violation of Section 17 of the Securities Act of 1933.

COURT ENFORCEMENT ACTION

FTI CORP., OTHERS ENJOINED. The SEC Fort Worth Regional Office announced on December 22 the entry by the Federal district court in Houston, Tex. of a preliminary injunction against FTI Corporation, Dudley W. Hargrove, Sr. and Archie B. Carroll, all of Houston, Tex. and David L. Brown, Navasota, Tex. FTI Corporation, Brown and Hargrove were enjoined from violating the registration provisions of the Federal securities laws by selling investment contracts through brokering certificates of deposit. Also, in connection with the sale of common stock, FTI Corporation was enjoined from acting as an unregistered broker-dealer, and FTI Corporation, Hargrove, Brown and Carroll were enjoined from violating the anti-fraud provisions of the Federal securities laws. The defendants consented to the preliminary injunctions without admitting or denying the allegations. (LR-5687)

INVESTMENT COMPANY ACT RELEASES

CAPITAL EXCHANGE FUND, INC.

The SEC has issued a notice giving interested persons until January 29, 1973 to request a hearing on an application by Capital Exchange Fund, Inc., and other funds advised by Vance, Sanders & Company, for an order declaring that Philip H. Theopold, a director of such funds, shall not be deemed an "interested person" of such funds, or of any investment adviser or underwriter of such funds, within the meaning of Section 2(s)(19) of the Act, solely by reason of his status as a director in several life insurance companies that either have interests in, or are in complexes with, companies that are registered as broker-dealers. FEDERAL STREET FUND, INC. The SEC has issued a notice giving interested persons until January 29, 1973 to request a hearing on an application by Federal Street Fund, Inc. for an order permitting such fund to redeem, in kind, a portion of the securities of such fund held by the Estate of Howard Gullman, which may be deemed an "affiliated person" of the fund. HOLDING COMPANY ACT RELEASE

UTAH POWER & LIGHT COMPANY. The SEC has issued a notice giving interested persons until January 29, 1973 to request a hearing upon a proposal by Utah Power & Light Company, a Salt Lake City electric utility and registered holding company, regarding the issue and sale until December 31, 1973, of not more than \$50,000,000 of term bank notes. The notes will carry ten-year maturities. Proceeds from their sale will be used to pay short-term notes and/or commercial paper then outstanding. (Rel. 35-17845)
