# COMPLISSION ANNOUNCEMENTS

COMPLAINT CITES MEMOREX, OFFICERS. The Commission announced the filing of a complaint on June 24, 1971 in the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York seeking to enjoin defendants Memorex Corporation, a Santa Clara, Calif. based corporation whose common stock and debentures are listed on the New York Stock Exchange, Laurence L. Spitters, Chairman of the board of directors and chief executive officer of the corporation and Gordon L. Pilcher, a former vice president of the corporation, from further violations of the anti-fraud and periodic reporting provisions of the Federal securities laws. In its complaint, the Commission alleges that the defendants caused Memorex to issue misleading earnings reports for the six months ending June 30, 1970 and the nine months ending September 30, 1970, and also made misleading statements in connection with a revision of its nine months earnings report and its sales for the year as a whole. The complaint also alleges that a Form 9-K Report filed with the Commission reporting Memorex earnings for the six months ending June 30, 1970 was misleading. (Release 34-9231)

SEC RELEASES STOCK CERTIFICATE AGENDA. The SEC has released the Agenda for the Conference on the Stock Certificate to be held at the Commission on Tuesday, June 29. The Commission also released Chairman Casey's Proposed Introductory Remarks before the conference.

Attending the one day meeting convened by the Commission will be the following: the chief executive officers of various national stock exchanges, the National Association of Securities Dealers', the Canadian Securities Depository; securities industry, banking industry corporate and investment community associations; representatives of the Federal bank regulatory authorities; interested bar association committees; the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants; and various experts that have written on the problems of the stock certificate. This conference is a continuation of a series of conferences which the Commission has held with the representatives of securities industry self regulatory organizations to discuss the operational capability and economic condition of the securities industry and other related topics.

In his proposed opening remarks Chairman Casey indicates that the conference has four purposes. One is to review what is being done to reduce the economic and operational burden of the present methods to settle securities transactions. Second, to explore the development of more satisfactory solutions to the problem than those on which the industry is now working. Third, to explore the interrelationship between the various proposals that have been made for dealing with the stock certificate. The final purpose of the meeting is to determine what should be selected from among the different methods, markets and regions which would afford the best prospect of evolving into a satisfactory nationwide security handling system. 1ST QTR '71 RECORD STOCK PURCHASES FOR INSTITUTIONAL INVESTORS. Four leading institutional investor groups purchased on a net basis a record \$4.2 billion of common stock during the first three months of 1971, according to estimates released today by the SEC. These insitutional investors--private noninsured pension funds, open-end investment companies, life insurance companies, and property and liability insurance companies--also significantly stepped up trading activity, registering new highs in both gross purchases (\$14.2 billion) and sales (\$10.0 billion) of common stock. Net stock purchases by these investors in this latest three-month period were 78 percent greater than in the comparable 1970 period and 21 percent higher than in the last quarter of 1970. ### DECISIONS IN ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEEDINGS

W. C. LANGLEY & CO. REVOKED, LAFFEY RESTRICTED. The Commission today announced the revocation of the broker-dealer registration of W. C. Langley & Co., New York City, with the provision that the firm, which is now in liquidation, may perform the necessary acts to effect an orderly liquidation. The Commission also barred Edwin W. Laffey, a general partner of the firm, from being associated with a broker-dealer for a period of 3 months, except that during such period he may be employed in a supervised capacity with the prior approval of the Commission's staff, and further specified that thereafter Laffey may apply to the Commission for approval of his assuming such other position with a broker-dealer as does not involve the performance of supervisory duties with respect to back office operations.

The sanctions imposed by the Commission were based on findings that the firm improperly hypothecated customers' securities; misrepresented to customers that it had their funds and securities in its custody and control; used for its own benefit customers' securities which it held in safe-keeping, trust or other fiduciary capacity; failed accurately to make and keep current certain required books and records; and filed financial reports which were not duly certified as required. Laffey was found to have failed reasonably to supervise with a view to preventing the above violations.

The commission's action was taken pursuant to an offer of settlement in which respondents, without admitting or denying the allegations in the order for proceedings, consented to the above findings and sanctions. (Release 34-9212)

OVER

BRESLIN SUSPENDED. In a decision announced today, the SEC ordered a 45-day suspension, effective June 28, 1971, of the broker-dealer registration of Daniel J. Breslin, doing business as Daniel Breslin & Associates, of Needham, Mass., and ordered Breslin suspended from association with any broker-dealer for the same period. Withdrawal of the registration upon expiration of the suspension period was authorized by the Commission.

A hearing examiner had found that during April-June 1969 Breslin violated the registration and antifraud provisions of the securities acts, in that he accepted deposits of funds and indications of interest in anticipation of a proposed public offering of securities of Design International Corporation, and failed to segregate the funds so received to disclose the adverse financial condition of the proposed issuer, and to keep proper records. The Commission, noting the hearing examiner's further finding that Breslin's violations were attributable to his lack of understanding of the rules regarding the marketing of a new issue of securities, and that all prospective purchasers recovered their funds, accepted the examiner's conclusion that it was adequate in the public interest to impose the stated suspensions. TARO BARRED. The Commission has barred Steven M. Taro, formerly a margin clerk in the Denver branch office of Goodbody and Co. (whose broker-dealer registration was revoked in April of this year), from association with a broker or dealer. The order was based on Taro's conviction, in a Colorado state court, of an offense involving the embesslement, fraudulent conversion and misappropriation of funds and securities during that employment. Taro consented to entry of the order. (Release 34-9219)

#### COURT ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS

INJUNCTIONS ISSUED IN PIG 'N WHITLE CASE. The SEC Chicago Regional Office announced that on June 15 the Federal district court in Chicago, permanently enjoined Charles Kerkorian, of Lincolnwood, Ill., from violating the registration and anti-fraud provisions of the Federal securities laws in the offer and sale of securities of Pig 'N Whistle Corporation of Chicago. On May 24, 1971, the same court issued injunctions against Paul Pickle and Jean Smith of Canoga Park, Calif. on the same charges. All three of the defendants consented to the order. (LR-5056)

INJUNCTIONS ISSUED IN SPECTRUM CASE. The SEC New York Regional Office announced that on June 1, the Federal district court in New York issued permanent injunctions against the following enjoining violations of the registration and/or anti-fraud provisions of the federal securities laws in the offer and sale of securities of Spectrum, Ltd.: Michael Gardner, New York, Edward T. Carroll, Fort Lauderdale, Louis Israel Marder, and Central National Fund both of Las Vegas, Nevada, Bernard Goldenberg, New York.

Preliminary injunctions were entered against the following: Michael Karfunkel and George Karfunkel,
New York, Quido Benigno, Yonkers, N.Y., Joseph W. Dye, New York and Spectrum, Ltd. of Fort Lauderdale Fla.
Defendants Gardner and Carroll consented to the order; injunctions against Marder, Central National Fund
and Goldenberg were issued by default. Defendants M. Karfunkel, G. Karfunkel, Benigno, Dye and Spectrum
consented to the entry of preliminary injunctions. (LR-5057)

ALABAMA JURY RETURNS INDICTMENTS IN SECURITIES FRAUD. The SEC Atlanta Regional Office announced that on June 11, a Circuit Court jury in Birmingham returned indictments against Louis M. Pihakis and Lawrence Olshan, both of Birmingham, charging them with fraud in the sale of securities of Alabama Equity Corporation. Pihakis was indicted in eight counts, and Olshan in seven. Evidence leading to the indictments was developed in a joint investigation by the Alabama Securities Commission and the SEC. (LR-5058)

FIRST INVESTMENT SAVINGS ENJOINED IN ALABAMA. The SEC Atlanta Regional Office announced that on June 18, a Federal district court in Birmingham permanently enjoined First Investment Savings Corporation, a broker-dealer and its president Sterling Delano Mallory, both of Birmingham, from violating the financial responsibility and net capital provisions of the Federal securities laws. In addition, on application of the Securities Investor Protection Corporation, the court appointed William Green of Atlanta as Trustee for the liquidation of the business of First Investment and Mayer U. Newfield of Birmingham as attorney for the trustee. Both defendants consented to the injunction and the appointment of the trustee. (LR-5059)

EIGHTH CIRCUIT AFFIRMS CONVICTIONS. The SEC Chicago Regional Office, announced that on June 14, the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals in Chicago, affirmed the convictions and sentences of Donald P. Smallwood, Roy E. Lay and Harold F. Conell, who had been found guilty on October 2, 1969 of violations of the antifraud registration provisions of the Federal Securities laws and mail fraud involving the sale of promisaory notes of Diversified Brokers Company. THREE PLEAD CUILTY TO SECURITIES FRAUD. The SEC Chicago Regional Office announced that on June 17, Donald J. Rolinger, Beryl E. Cook and Floyd F. Cook, pleaded guilty to an information charging violation of the anti-fraud provisions of the Federal securities laws in connection with the sale of beneficial interests in Real Estate Investment Trust of Indiana, Equitable Real Estate Investment Trust, Fidelity Real Estate Investment Trust and Bankers Trust. #### HOLDING COMPANY ACT RELEASES

NEW JERSEY POWER & LIGHT COMPANY. The Commission has issued an order giving interested persons until July 15, to request a hearing on application of New Jersey Power & Light Company. NJP&L proposes to sell to two subsidiary companies of United Utilities System, New Jersey Telephone Company and United Telephone Company of New Jersey, from time to time prior to January 1, 1973 for cash, 2,241 electric distribution wood poles and other equipment which are used jointly by NJP&L and the companies. The present application involves an amendment to a previous declaration increasing the number of poles to be sold. 1/ (Release 35-17171)

ALABAMA POWER COMPANY. The Commission has issued an order giving interested persons until July 12 to request a hearing on application of Alabama Power Company to issue and sell \$85 million of first mortage bonds. The net proceeds from the sale of bonds together with other resources will be used by Alabama to finance its 1971 construction program estimated at \$227,630,000 to pay outstanding short-term bank notes and for other designated purposes. 1/ (Release 35-17172)

AMERICAN ELECTRIC POWER COMPANY. The Commission has issued an order giving interested persons until July 13 to request a hearing on application of American Electric Power Company to act as surety for one of its subsidiaries, Appalachian Power Commission, in connection with placing into effect new rates prior to completion of an investigation by the West Virginia Public Service Commission with respect thereto. 1/(Release 35-17173)

Jersey Central Power & Light Company, Madison Avenue at Punch Bowl Rd., Morristown, N.J. 07960, filed a registration statement on June 14 seeking registration of \$25 million of debentures, due 1996, to be offered for public sale at competitive bidding. Net proceeds of its debenture sale will be applied to payment of the company's outstanding bank loan and to its 1971 consstruction program.
