Director's Notes:

On 19 February, I was pleased to present SPC Christopher Fimpel an Army Commendation Medal, and Specialists Justin Benge and Justin LaDow with Army Achievement Medals for providing critical first aid to a Marshall

Center student whose heart had stopped beating. Our Soldiers were also presented with GCMC coins by Dr. James MacDougall, deputy director of the Marshall Center. It is reassuring to know our MPs are professionals trained in emergency first aid and have AEDs (automatic external defibrillators) in their patrol vehicles.

On the topic of vehicles, beginning March 22 the lines at AAFES gas stations should move faster as pre-fuel purchase checks are being eliminated— no more dreaded registration and Esso fuel card checks prior to pumping. AAFES says this will significantly speed up fuel purchases at AAFES facilities across Germany. Customers are still required to show their vehicle registration, fuel ration card and military identification at the time of payment. A word of caution before you fill up, however: customers who exceed their authorized fuel rations or have an invalid or deactivated fuel ration card at AAFES gas stations will be charged German fuel prices found on the local economy which can easily be 100 percent more than AAFES fuel prices. You must know your monthly fuel ration status prior to pumping or it will cost you.

Within the past month three Soldiers or Family Members have been taken to collections for unpaid medical bills! If you are active duty or an active duty Family Member and you receive a medical bill, *do not ignore it*! Fax it to 0044-208-762-8105 or e-mail it to International SOS at LondonTricareClaims@internationalsos.com, or fax it to here on post at DSN 440-3539, or bring it to the TRICARE Office for action!

USAREUR Commander <u>Gen. Carter F. Ham</u> gained approval for an exception to current DoD policy that prevents non-service members who report sexual assault through military channels from filing a restricted report. A six-month pilot program began March 1 that gives adult civilian beneficiaries of the military healthcare system in <u>USAREUR</u> the option to file a restricted report for sexual assaults. According to DoD policy, restricted reporting allows victims to confidentially report the sexual assault and seek appropriate medical care and advocacy services without triggering a criminal investigation. Unrestricted reporting allows victims to still seek appropriate care and services while immediately initiating an official investigation of the sexual assault. 

In America, The Secretary of the Army created the Army Community Covenant in 2008 to build mutual relationships and strengthen bonds between Soldiers, Families and American communities. The ACC has been a valuable tool in fostering and sustaining effective state and community partnerships with the Army to improve the quality of life for Soldiers and their Families on home front U.S.A.

The ACC accomplishes two things by recognizing the selfless service and contibutions of community volunteers, and also shows Soldiers the compassion and support of the American public.

Much the same as the ACC in the states, Soldiers and Families who call Europe their home away from home enjoy fabulous friendship and selfless support from community leaders, business owners and average citizens in numerous German, Italian, Belgian and Dutch communities who empathize with the sacrifices of forward-stationed Soldiers and Families, and speak volumes through their deeds of support to them.

In my travels, I hear countless stories of the extent to which our European community partners strive to support our Soldiers and families before, during and after the many deployments, without the expectation of reward. These partnerships strengthen ties between our Soldiers and host nation hosts, and the bond of fellowship this develops certainly builds added resilience in our Families as they deal with numerous hardships.

The generosity of Europe's neighborhoods, towns, cities, and counties is astounding. Just as in America, every day communities surrounding our European Army garrisons devise new ways, both small and large, to demonstrate their appreciation for Soldiers and Families. Here are a few initiatives that give you an idea of the scope of this support:

- Adults, children, and organizations support Family Readiness Groups in supporting efforts to support deployed Soldiers from the local area.
- Reduced-fee or gratis incentives provided by cities to families and Soldiers to attend host nation community, cultural and tourism events that enhance cultural understanding.
- Host Nation Visitation Tours for Soldiers and Families to German political centers to enhance understanding of host nation socio/political workings.
- Host Nation volunteers from the KONTAKT program at Germany garrisons, who donate thousands of hours annually to support events at garrisons that enhance the experience for Soldiers and Families.
- School exchanges/partnerships that encourage cross-cultural awareness, understanding and appreciation, and develop bonds of friendship

- The reliance of Army communities on critical life and safety support provided by host nation law enforcement, medical and fire first responders that safeguard our communities and, when called upon, selflessly risk their lives for our Soldiers and Families.

Garrison sports exchange programs and competitions that develop comradeship between sports organizations and enhance cultural understanding.

Access to host nation medical care facilities for Army families that ensures the health concerns and priorities of Soldiers and their Families are effectively addressed in a timely manner.

These examples of support on part of European nations are great examples of how foreign citizens and organizations directly enrich the lives of our Soldiers and Families and strengthen our resiliency.

When you eventually return to the U.S., the Community Covenant will pick up where your gracious European hosts left off, and I encourage you to familiarize yourself with the program at <u>http://www.army.mil/community</u>, where you can see the best practices of Soldiers, Family members, leaders, and community organizations in the states. Perhaps you will even discover something you can adapt to your European community, or see an opportunity to let me know about something that has worked for you overseas that we can use here in the U.S.

Relationships are everything, and I encourage you to take every opportunity to thank the members of your host nation community for their sincere and active caring for Soldiers and their Families in Europe. The Army is eternally grateful and thankful for their support.

St. Patrick -Ireland's Patron Saint

For more information please check: <u>www.stpatricksday.de</u> Patrick is said to have originated from England, came to Ireland as a slave and was the first writer in history to pen eye-witness accounts condemning slavery.

There are many legends and stories associated with St. Patrick. The legend goes that during his wanderings through Ireland he came to Dublin - a hill, gazed out over the landscape and said, "One day, this little village will flourish as a great, important city, growing ever wealthier, and one day it will house the seat of the kingdom."

In 1776, during the American War of Independence, St. Patrick's influence is even said to have helped the Americans to victory over the British. General George Washington's army was besieging the city which would later bear his name, and at the time was defended by the British army. Washington chose the password "St. Patrick" as a mark of respect to the many Irish in his ranks. And so it happened that on March 17th, the feast-day of St. Patrick, the British surrendered - without a struggle. As they left the city, an American band struck up the lively melody "St. Patrick's Day in the Morning".



The tune has been played in Washington on every St. Patrick's Day since that time.

Irish people all over the world celebrate March 17, the name-day of their patron saint, with parades, festivities, music and dancing. The numerous members of Munich's Irish community meet their German friends in a host of clubs, societies and groups to form a thriving Irish scene.

The Botanical Garden in Munich ~ Quite literally a growing attraction

With 14,000 plants from across the globe, Munich's Botanical Garden at Nymphenburg Palace is world-renowned



among botanists and nature-lovers alike. But, while it may be the city's only one, it is not the first. The seeds of the development were first sown in the early 19th century, when a garden was created in Elisenstrasse, near Karlstor, at the behest of the Bavarian Academy of Sciences. Officially opened in 1812, the garden boasted an impressive collection of tropical plants from around the world, spread across some 5.1 hectares. Yet, no matter how green-fingered the gardeners, back in 1850 there was one thing that was growing even faster than the plants—industry. In 1853 the Bavarian Government made a decision that would ultimately mark the end of the original botanical garden: to allow a giant greenhouse to be transformed into an exhibition center, the Crystal Palace, in preparation for a national industrial trade fair. Although replacement greenhouses were built on either side of Sophienstrasse, the garden's central core had been irrevocably damaged and, in the light of yet more industrial pollution from the ever-expanding railway station, it was finally decided, in 1908, to uproot the entire garden.

The first step was clearly to find a new site. Needless to say, the status attached to the garden prompted councils in many areas of Munich to offer their land. But it was finally agreed that the palace at Nymphenburg provided the ideal location: it was within easy reach of the city; was surrounded by chestnut trees, which offered protection from the elements; its location in royal grounds meant the chance of other building work being carried out in the future was slim; and it had a regular water supply from the Nymphenburg canal.

The next task, designing the garden, was put in the hands of the new director, Karl Immanuel Eberhard von Goebel, who was given just six years to complete the new development. But it wasn't long before he encountered problems. In 1909 any plans he had already made had to be scrapped and rethought because the city had decided to lay a new tram line to the garden. As soon as work began on the site, it became clear that the earth was anything but suitable for such an array of plants. Therefore some 130 cubic meters of more fertile soil had to be brought in from Moosach and Dachau before anything could be expected to flourish. Finally, in the winter of 1912, with the key earthworks complete, the first trees and plants were transplanted from the original garden.

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

Clearly, with Munich's northern European climate, greenhouses were necessary if the tropical collection of plants was to have a chance of survival. Construction work on these, and on the botanic laboratories and a museum, which no longer exists, got underway between 1911 and 1913, with most work completed in time for the official opening, on May 10, 1914.

Elsewhere in the world, of course, the troubled shoots of war were sproutingprompting the start of yet more difficult times for the garden. Not only was there a lack of money and shortages of fuel and staff, with many young gardeners called away to fight, but Germany's international reputation also meant links to countries that had been the sources of important plants were suddenly cut off. In fact, it was some 20 years before the situation improved, by which time, of course, World War II was already threatening. Again, similar shortages occurred, and in 1944 the Allies bombed the Botanical Garden, killing many valuable trees in the arboretum. Once the war was over, it was up to the new director, Karl Suessenguth, to do his best to repair damages. He gradually built up foreign contacts and started using the garden to grow vegetables and tobacco for employees, who suffered from the aftereffects of the war. Indeed it is this diversity that is the key to success of any garden. And although the original aims of creating a space for both scientific research and enjoyment have remained unchanged over the garden's 200-year history, its content has been influenced by changing social circumstances and the personal interests of its various directors. With high points ranging from an entire greenhouse devoted to Mexican cacti, to giant water lilies capable of supporting weights of up to 70 kg and temporary exhibitions on individual species, such as onions, roses or, as was the case this year, mushrooms, there is little doubt that Munich's Botanical Garden has enough variety to prosper and flourish for many years to come.





Once we arrive we recreate the Bier Hall Putsch exactly as it happened in 1923, have lunch, visit the site of the Munich Accords (where Czechoslovakia ceased to be a unified country) and visit other places associated with the



Nazi movement. This is an extremely interesting tour, somewhat like touring an urban battlefield. We cannot pretend that there is not a lot of walking, or that this is a short day. Most participants are exhausted after we storm troop our way from one end of Munich to another. However, no one has said shorten it! The cost of this extravaganza is only \$ 35.00! Pre-payments are required for this tour and limited to 35 participants. The last chance to pay is during the talk on **Friday 26 February.** Get your money in quickly.

The Partnach is a river that has been rushing down from the top of the Zugspitze for a few eons and, in time; it has managed to carve out a rather wonderful canyon or gorge that is well worth seeing. It normally takes about 90 minutes to walk all the way in and return to the parking lot. Before we do that however, we will talk a bit about the **1936 Olympics in Garmisch** and show people the stadium where the ski jumping event took place.

After our invigorating walk through the gorge, we visit the **Alpspitze Wellenbad** which is the town's largest swimming pool. (In fact, it is a complex of five pools!) It is also the best spa in the local area. Each Bavarian town in this part of Germany competes with every other town in the quality of their facilities and Garmisch is certainly able to maintain its own! There are three saunas, a steam bath, Jacuzzis, warm pools, cold pools, diving pools, water slides, Olympic pools, salt pools, salt treatments, eating and drinking areas, a bar, numerous lounging areas and just about everything you might want to experience during the **most relaxing day of your life**. There is one caveat; Germans are very much in to the FKK scene – which literally means – free body culture in translation. In short, it indicates that some areas of the complex are – textile free, as they like to say – so you do not have to worry about the fact that you did not remember your swimsuit! We make sure that everyone feels comfortable in an environment that many people are unsure about, and ensure that the experience is a good one! Most of the time you can be wrapped in a large towel and not look out of place. Your first visit to an FKK spa is just like



diving in to a cold pool – once the original shock has passed, it is all great fun!

Date is **Saturday 10 April**. Meet at the **Marshall Center Dining Facility** at 12:30. If everyone has bikes, which is the method we will use to get to the pool. If there are cars, we may employ them too! Otherwise, we will walk people over to the appropriate bus stop. There we could board the city bus for the ride to the gorge. The cost is only **\$ 22.00**. The trip is not too structured and there will be time for you to make some interesting discoveries of your own.


