ANA Mission: The Afghan National Army is responsible for protecting Afghanistan's territorial integrity, upholding and protecting the Constitution, defending national and Islamic values, and establishing a favorable environment for public welfare and progress.

Challenges:

- Attrition: Army 3.3% (SEP 11); Police 1.5% (SEP 11); ANSF Goal = 1.4%
- Leadership Shortfalls (%Fill vs. objective):
 - Officers: Army 103%; Police 124%
 - Non-Commissioned Officers: Army 82%; Police 73%
- Literacy: ~ 89,297 in training; ~ 135,922K completed some training (1st to 3rd Grade) (as of 8 OCT 11)
 - ANSF to achieve 50% overall literacy by January 2012 (currently 38%)

ANP Mission: The Afghan National Police is primarily responsible for maintaining civil order and law enforcement. The police will work with the people to actively combat crime and disorder (including terrorism and illegal armed activity); prevent the cultivation, production and smuggling of narcotics; and fight corruption. The police will ensure the sovereignty of the State and protect its borders.

Afghan Uniform (Civilian) Police (AUP) - (~ 96.4K total w/ Mol staff and enablers): (7) ANP Regional Zones, (34) Provinces, Traffic Police, and Fire and Rescue Department

Afghan National Civil Order Police (Gendarmerie) (ANCOP) – (~ 12.6K): COIN with military support; nationally deployable; (4) Brigades; (21) Battalions (Kandaks)

Afghan Border Police (ABP) - (~ 20.8K): Border Security Zone (up to 50Km into Afghanistan); Border Posts; Customs Operations

Afghan Anti-Crime Police (AACP): Investigative and Police Intelligence capacities


Afghan Public Protection Force (APPF) -protect key infrastructure, facilities, construction projects and personnel; assumes responsibilities from Private Security Companies (PSC) across Afghanistan

Afghan Local Police (ALP) – secure local communities; temporary capability; no arrest or investigative authority; cannot use in offensive operations; "neighborhood watch with guns"


