I want to share with each of you today the programs and processes we are undertaking within the Clinton Domestic Policy Council and a little about the primary principle on which our work is based.

Pres. Clinton: 5 major goals outlined for the cabinet/staff at the Camp David Retreat

1. Economic package
2. Health Care Reform
3. National Service
4. Welfare Reform
5. Campaign Finance/Lobbying Reform

Domestic Policy has a finger in each of these pies:

1. Econ. pkg.-emphasis on children/families: economic council (new)
2. Health Care Reform: you have a panel tomorrow on this so I'll save the war stories for them to share. However, I don't want to gloss over it without saying we have some very fundamental decisions to make as a country- and this issue when you stop and think about it is one of the few we can undertake that is so intensely personal to each and every person.
3. National Service: You heard earlier from Eli; two Domestic Policy staff members have worked tirelessly with Eli on the National Service piece as well as the companion student financing reform components.
4. Welfare Reform: working groups; Mary Jo Bane and David Ellwood; paradigm shift- from WORK IN EXCHANGE FOR WELFARE to WORK INSTEAD OF WELFARE. We will here get into child support as well as child care issues.
5. Campaign Finance/Lobbying Reform issues: introduced recently. Two staff members working on this.

Other projects: Education which is involved in all the others.
Goals 2000. Empowerment zones: collaboration.

But what is really the underlying theme of this Domestic Policy Council:

Every child shall be empowered to develop to her/his fullest throughout her/his life. If we are truly serious about a better economy, competitiveness, etc. for our country, we have not a child to waste....and each of those children must be empowered to become the very best she or he can. This means we will be committed at the top here in DC but it also means the empowerment of parents, neighborhoods, communities and voluntary organizations across this country to work together for the greater good.

Margaret H. Belknap
Shorewood, Wisconsin

Margaret H. Belknap, 33, is a Permanent Associate Professor in the Department of Systems Engineering at the U.S. Military Academy. A 1981 West Point graduate and a Captain in the United States Army Signal Corps, she served in a variety of tactical and strategic communications positions in the Pacific, including company command. Captain Belknap earned a M.S.E. in operations research from the University of Michigan in 1989 and will continue to pursue her Ph. D. in 1994 after serving on the Army Staff at the Pentagon. Last summer she deployed to Kuwait where she served in the emergency post-war recovery operations as a project engineer. Overseeing a 7.8 million dollar contract for the Army Corps of Engineers, she received several awards from the Department of Defense and Kuwaiti government. Along with her husband, Howdy, and their three sons, they continue to be active members of the West Point community, participating in cadet, fundraising, and religious activities.

Kurt M. Campbell

Kurt M. Campbell, 35, is Associate Professor of Public Policy and Assistant Director of the Center for Science and International Affairs at Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government. Previously, he served as Special Assistant for Soviet and European Affairs at the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Dr. Campbell was a Distinguished Marshall Scholar, a Council on Foreign Relations International Affairs Fellow, and is currently serving as a Navy Reserve officer in the Pentagon. He received his Bachelor of Arts in Science, Technology, and Public Affairs from the University of California, Certificate of Soviet Studies and Music, University of Erevan, Soviet Armenia and Doctorate in International Relations from Oxford University. Recently, he received a major grant from the Carnegie Corporation to study military matters in Russia. Dr. Campbell has written two books and numerous articles in the field of international relations. He is an active volunteer for the United Way, a frequent guest speaker to charitable and educational groups, and a member of several professional organizations.

Michael B.G. Froman
San Anselmo, California

Michael B.G. Froman, 30, is an international lawyer who has been directing the American Bar Association's *pro bono* legal assistance project in Albania. He received his Bachelor's degree at Princeton in Public and International Affairs in 1985. He then received a Fulbright Scholarship and a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship which enabled him to complete a doctorate in International Relations at Oxford in 1988. He earned a Juris Doctorate from Harvard Law School in 1991, where he was a Ford Foundation Fellow in Public International Law. While there he served as an editor of the *Harvard Law Review*. Froman formerly worked at international law firms in Washington, D.C., and in Tokyo, at the U.S. Department of State and U.S. Department of Defense, and at the Commission of the European Communities in Brussels. He has published a book and several articles on international relations, trade, and law. Froman served as president of an international youth organization and has been active in the Big Brothers Association and the Boy Scouts.

Steven L. Gill, 35, is a partner with the law firm of Bout, Cummings, Conners & Berry, and a member of the adjunct faculty at Belmont University. Active in developing opportunities for inner-city children, he has been Chairman of the YMCA's outreach programs and received the YMCA's Urban Services Volunteer of the Year award in 1990. 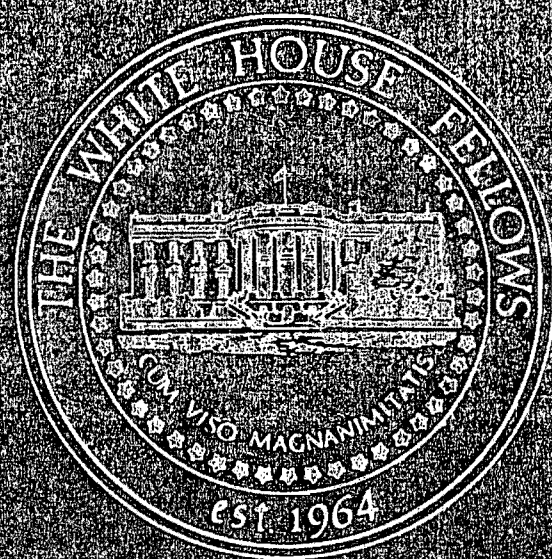
