BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH: THE REV. DR. SUZAN-D. JOHNSON CODK

Suzan D. Johnson Cook, a native New Yorker, is the senior pastor / of Mariners' Temple Baptist Church, the oldest Baptist Church in New York City. In 1983, at age 26, she became the first African-American woman ever to be elected senior pastor of an American Baptist congregation in its 200-year history. She is the executive director of the Multi-Ethnic Center NY, and the first female NYC Police Department Chaplain, appointed in 1990 by former Commissioner Lee P. Brown and Mayor David N. Dinkins.

Under her leadership the church was revitalized, growing from an active membership of 60 to more than 1,000 persons in two different congregations. Serving a predominantly African-American congregation, she has been instrumental in building interracial/ ethnic cooperation. Bilingual in Spanish and English, several bicultural worship experiences have occurred. Amongst the innova-tive and progressive programs created under her administration are: Lunch Hour of Power, a weekly worship service for more than /500 business persons; a media broadcast; a children's ministry. which includes the Multi-Ethnic Learning Center, an after-school program stressing excellence in education: a multi-staff ministry and outreach to the NYC Police Department personnel.

An extensive traveler, she has lived in West Africa and Spain; has spoken in national and international settings which include: Havana, Cuba; American Baptist Churches, USA, 1989 Biennial; and the Urban Consultation, Ruschlikon, Switzerland in 1991. She also served as official interpreter for a musical delegation to Cuba.

A graduate of Boston's Emerson College, receiving her B.S. Degree at age 19, she received her M.A. from Teachers College, Columbia Univ., 1978, and M.Div. from Union Theological Seminary, NYC, She completed her doctoral studies at the United Theological Seminary. Dayton, OH, where she was a Sam Proctor Fellow, receiving her D.Min., May, 1990. In October, 1989 she began a sabbatic leave to serve as a President's Administrative Fellow. Harvard Univ., The Divinity School, Cambridge, MA. She now serves there as a visiting professor in urban studies and homilatics.

prolific writer, she has several published works. Her book, Wise Women Bearing Gifts: Joys and Struggles of their Faith, released by Judson Press in 1988, is in its third printing. In 1992 her second book, Preaching in Two Voices, was also released by Judson Press. Active in community affairs, she serves on the board of the Hamilton-Madison Settlement Houses; is an officer of the New York Coalition of 100 Black Women: is advisor to corporate leaders and elected officials; was elected to the National Board of the American Saptist Churches of the USA: and was appointed to the Steering Committee, African American Burial Ground, New York, NY.

Suzan is married to Mr. Ronald Cook. They have one son, Samuel David.

Sara Rosenbaum, J.D. is a Senior Research Staff Scientist at the George Washington University Center for Health Policy Research and an Adjunct Associate Professor of Health Care Sciences at the George Washington University School of Medicine and Health Sciences. She has held teaching appointments at the Georgetown University Law Center and the Johns Hopkins University School of Public Health.

Ms. Rosenbaum played a major role in the design and enactment of federal health law reforms for low income children and families over the past decade.

Ms. Rosenbaum has served on policy advisory boards for several federal agencies, including the United States Congress Office of Technology Assessment, the United States Public Health Service, and the Health Care Financing Administration within the United States Department of Health and Human Services. She also holds positions on technical and expert advisory boards for numerous national foundations and organizations. Ms. Rosenbaum is the public member of the American Board of Pediatrics.

Ms. Rosenbaum has been named one of America's 500 most influential health policy makers and is a recipient of the Health Care Financing Administration's Beneficiary Services Award for distinguished national service on behalf of Medicaid beneficiaries.

William A. Galston is Deputy Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy. He is on leave from the University of Maryland at College Park, where he is a professor at the School of Public Affairs and a senior research scholar at the university's Institute for Philosophy and Public Policy. He received his B.A. degree from Cornell University in 1967 and, after serving in the U.S. Marine Corps (1969-1970), earned a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in 1973. He taught at the University of Texas at Austin for nearly a decade before moving to Washington, D.C.

Dr. Galston is the author of five books and numerous articles on political philosophy, American politics and public policy. His most recent book, <u>Liberal Purposes</u>, was published by Cambridge University Press in 1991. From 1985 to 1988, he directed a series of studies and focus groups probing public attitudes concerning issues, candidates, and political institutions and processes.

Dr. Galston's political experience includes service as chief speechwriter for John Anderson's independent presidential effort, as Issues Director in Walter Mondale's presidential campaign (1982-1984), as an advisor to Sen. Albert Gore, Jr. during the contest for the 1988 presidential nomination, and as an advisor to Governor Bill Clinton's presidential campaign, as well as consultant to candidates for state and local office.

William A. Galston is Professor, School of Public Affairs, University of Maryland at College Park and Senior Research Scholar, Institute for Philosophy and Public Policy. He is currently on leave serving as Deputy Assistant to President Clinton for Domestic Policy. His scholarly interests include political philosophy, American politics, and public policy. His most recent books include <u>Liberal Purposes</u> (Cambridge University Press, 1991) and <u>Virtue</u> (NYU Press, 1992).



EXECUTIVE ORDER 12859

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE DOMESTIC POLICY COUNCIL

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, including sections 105, 107, and 301 of title 3, United States Code, it is hereby ordered as follows:

<u>Section 1. Establishment.</u> There is established the Domestic Policy Council ("the Council").

- Sec. 2. Membership. The Council shall comprise the:
- (a) President, who shall serve as a Chairman of the Council;
- (b) Vice President;
- (c) Secretary of Health and Human Services;
- (d) Attorney General;
- (e) Secretary of Labor;
- (f) Secretary of Veterans Affairs;
- (g) Secretary of the Interior;
- (h) Secretary of Education;
- (i) Secretary of Housing and Urban Development;
- (j) Secretary of Agriculture;
- (k) Secretary of Transportation;
- (1) Secretary of Commerce;
- (m) Secretary of Energy;
- (n) Secretary of the Treasury;
- (o) Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency;
- (p) Chair of the Council of Economic Advisers;
- (q) Director of the Office of Management and Budget;
- (r) Assistant to the President for Economic Policy;
- (s) Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy;
- (t) Assistant to the President and Director of the Office of National Service;

- (u) Senior Advisor to the President for Policy Development;
- (V) Director, Office of National Drug Control Policy;
- (w) AIDS Policy Coordinator; and
- (x) Such other officials of Executive departments and agencies as the President may, from time to time, designate.
- Sec. 3. Meeting of the Council. The President, or upon his direction, the Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy ("the Assistant"), may convene meetings of the Council. The President shall preside over the meetings of the Council, provided that in his absence the Vice President, and in his absence the Assistant, will preside.
- Sec. 4. Functions. (a) The principal functions of the Council are: (1) to coordinate the domestic policy-making process; (2) to coordinate domestic policy advice to the President; (3) to ensure that domestic policy decisions and programs are consistent with the President's stated goals, and to ensure that those goals are being effectively pursued; and (4) to monitor implementation of the President's domestic policy agenda. The Assistant may take such actions, including drafting a Charter, as may be necessary or appropriate to implement such functions.
- (b) All executive departments and agencies, whether or not represented on the Council, shall coordinate domestic policy through the Council.
- (c) In performing the foregoing functions, the Assistant will, when appropriate, work with the Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs and the Assistant to the President for Economic Policy.
- <u>Sec. 5. Administration</u>. (a) The Council may function through established or ad hoc committees, task forces or interagency groups.
- (b) The Council shall have a staff to be headed by the Assistant to the President for Domestic Policy. The Council shall have such staff and other assistance as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this order.
- (c) All executive departments and agencies shall cooperate with the Council and provide such assistance, information, and advice to the Council as the Council may request, to the extent permitted by law.
