**RE:** RETREAT ON THE CLINTON PRESIDENCY

As some of you know, I have been charged with organizing a small all-day session with prominent academics and observers to help gain perspective on our work. Hopefully, your calendars are already marked, but we have reserved Saturday, November 6th for the formal session, which will run from 8:30 to 4. I have enclosed a brief agenda.

We have organized these sessions to help us gain some perspective on the work of the president. As you can imagine, there has not been a lot of time to step back to assess this political juncture, the character of this era and the emerging character of the Clinton presidency. We are looking for independent insights, informed by a sense of history and political economy.

It is our intention to keep this meeting small and informal, perhaps 25 participants, allowing an open exchange of ideas. The academic and outside participants include:

Alan Brinkley, History, Columbia University studies 20th century American history, author of Voices of Protest: Huey Long, Father Coughlin and the Great Depression.

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- David Mayhew, Political Science, Yale University studies Congress and political parties; books include Divided We Govern and Congress, the Electoral Connection.
- Michael Sandel, Government, Harvard University studies the changing nature of liberalism; books include Liberalism and its Critics and Liberalism and the Limits of Justice.
- Richard Neustadt, Kennedy School, Harvard University studies the presidency: author of Presidential Power, Presidential Power and the Modern Presidents and Thinking in Time: The Uses of History for Decision Making.
- William Julius Wilson, Sociology and Public Policy, University of Chicago studies race, inequality and inner cities; books include The Truly Disadvantaged: the Inner City, the Underclass and Public Policy, Power, Racism and Privilege and The Declining Significance of Race.
- John Mollenkopf, Politics, City Univerity of New York studies finance, race and politics in modern American cities; books include The Contested City and Dual City: Restructuring New York
- Theda Skocpol, Sociology, Harvard University studies the origins of the modern welfare state; author of Protecting Soldiers and Mothers: The Political Origins of Social Policy in the United States, The Politics of Social Policy in the United States and Social Revolutions.
- Robert Kuttner, economist and editor of American Prospect studies the politics of economic policy; author of The End of Laissez-Faire: National Purpose and the Global Economy after the Cold War, The Economic Illusion: False Choices Between Prosperity and Social Justice, and Revolt of the Haves.
- Kristin Luker, Sociology and Women's Studies, Princeton studies the relation between social issues, religion and gender; her books include Taking Chances and Abortion and the Politics of Motherhood
- Samuel Popkin, Political Science, University of CA, San Diego studies voting and public opinion, and U.S. intervention; books includes The Reasoning Voter. Communication and Persuasion in Presidential Campaigns, Chief of Staff: Twenty-five Years of Managing the Presidency.

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Charles Hamilton, Poltical Science, Columbia University

studies race and politics; author of Adam Clayton Powell: The Political Biography of an American Dilemna, The Black Preacher in America, and The Black Experience in American Politics

Samuel Huntington, Government, Harvard University

studies civil-military relations, American government and defense policy, and political change in less developed countries; his books include The Soldier and the State, The Dilemna of American Ideals and Institutions, The Crisis of Democracy, and The Third Wave: Democratization in the Late 20th Century.

Roger Noll, Economics, Stanford University.

studies regulatory policy and congressional politics; author of The Political Economy of Deregulation, Reforming Regulation and Comparative Economic and Political Issues: Japan and the US.

The invited party and administration participants are listed above. I do not presume that the First Family and Vice-President will attend, though they are certainly welcome. I think everyone else will find the day immensely helpful. We really have brought together an extraordinary range of academics with perspective on the presidency.

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
