I am hoping we will have a chance to talk before the holidays, but in case I miss you tomorrow, the following is a description of the program we are planning for the Annie E. Casey Foundation Children and Family Fellowship seminar in Washington, D.C. in January.

The Children and Family Fellowship is aimed at developing the leadership skills of mid-career professionals committed to changing systems that serve children and their families. (We are faxing a description of the information.) The January seminar is designed to place leadership on children and family issues in a federal policy context.

On Friday, January 14, we are planning an informal panel discussion to provide the Fellows with an opportunity to meet some high level members of the Administration who are familiar with the Foundation. We are hoping that you will be available to join us for this session. We are asking each invitee to speak for ten minutes about how to raise children and family issues on the federal agenda, and their experiences working through the transition to a new Administration. For your information, we are also asking Bob Reich, Tom Payzant, and Mary Jo Bane to join us for this session. The session will be held from payzant. at the Capitol Hilton Hotel at 16th and K Streets, N.W. 4:00-5:30

In addition, on Tuesday, January 11, we will hold a panel discussion entitled "The Challenges to Intergovernmental Relations." We hope you can suggest someone from the Enterprise Board who might be able to speak to this topic. We have asked Jeffrey Watson, Bruce Vladek, and Peter Edelman to join us as well. This session will be held from 1:00 - 3:00 p.m. at the Family Impact Seminar, 1100 17th Street, N.W., 10th Floor.

The Annie E. Casey Foundation is a private philanthropic organization dedicated to improving life outcomes for disadvantaged children. The Foundation's primary mission is to foster public policies and human-service reforms that better meet the needs of today's vulnerable children. The Foundation believes that key institutions need to change if outcomes for disadvantaged children and families are to improve. A fundamental premise of many Foundation-supported initiatives is that improved, cost-effective interventions on behalf of children will require system-wide reforms that can make human services more flexible, preventive, family-focused, accountable and community-based.

Ultimately, the successful reform of youth- and family-serving institutions and systems will depend on the strategic vision, organizational understanding, planning capacity and communication skills of key leaders. To help foster these attributes, the Annie E. Casey Foundation has established the Children and Family Fellowship, an intensive 11-month, full-time program for outstanding mid-career professionals who aspire to assume leadership positions where they can help to shape the future of organizations and institutions that have an impact on children and families. Casey Fellows are individuals who have demonstrated leadership ability and a commitment to meaningful change. The inaugural class of ten fellows will begin in September, 1993.

THE CASEY FELLOW

Casey Fellows are chosen from a wide spectrum of public and private arenas, such as child welfare, juvenile justice, health, mental health, education, law, government, business, public policy, and communications. Ideal candidates:

- have at least 10 years of combined graduate education and work experiences at increasing levels of responsibility;
- have assumed leadership in and family issues;
- have made a difference in children and family services.

In addition, personal and intellectual qualities keyed to leadership abilities are considered. For example, ideal candidates:

- are dissatisfied with the existing performance of children and family service systems and believe they can be fundamentally improved;
- are risk takers and innovators willing to challenge the status quo;
- can see the big picture and bring order to complex situations;

 are capable of bringing together people who represent diverse interests and building consensus for change.

Because the Fellowship seeks to nurture future leaders representative of communities and people served by existing systems, the Foundation seeks Fellows from varied personal, ethnic and professional backgrounds.

THE CASEY FELLOWSHIP EXPERIENCE

The Casey Foundation's Children and Family Fellowship is an opportunity for talented professionals to augment their skills and experiences, broaden their perspectives and become part of a network of leaders putting innovative ideas into action. It is designed to provide the freedom and flexibility to explore some key challenges in the effective management of change within systems serving children and families. The Casey Foundation, through the Fellowship, is committed to providing the financial, personal and programmatic supports to allow Fellows to go beyond their own professional experiences and develop the interdisciplinary perspective essential for managing systemic change.

Fellows are supported in all facets of the program. Casey Foundation senior staff members, who are responsible for education and human service reform efforts, are paired with Fellows as Sponsors. The Sponsors assist Fellows in the design of the Fellowship year, including experiences (among which are an individual project, field placements, and opportunities to work with Casey staff) that address the Fellows' own career and learning goals. They link Fellows with people and opportunities to increase Fellows' exposure in chosen fields of interest and to the Foundation's work. Casey Sponsors are in regular contact with Fellows to discuss their experiences and to help them integrate new insights into Fellows' ongoing work.

The Fellowship year is planned so that Fellows have opportunities to work and learn as a group, as well as pursue individual interests. All Fellows participate in a series of seminars that serve as forums in which to explore relevant topics, share ideas and experiences and deepen leadership skills. Fellows also work on projects that are related directly to program aims of the Casey Foundation.

In addition to their group experiences, Fellows spend two three-month blocks of time in individually planned field placements where they can participate in efforts to change human service systems. To focus each individual's development, an independent project is completed to allow Fellows to explore in depth a topic of particular interest.

Field placement supervisors and seminar faculty members provide additional support and assistance to Fellows. Individually and collectively these people facilitate the growth of Fellows during the Fellowship.

Group and individual experiences combined offer Fellows the flexibility to explore professional interests and to pursue personal goals. These experiences include the following:

Seminar Series

The Robert F. Wagner Graduate School of Public Service at New York University coordinates the Fellowship seminar series. The seminars are the framework through which Fellows can examine their experiences; increase their management, organizational and policy knowledge; fine tune their leadership skills; and have an opportunity for meaningful exchange with each other, seminar faculty, nationally recognized leaders, and Casey Foundation staff.

Seminars are intended to develop and enhance critical skills within an adult learning environment that builds on the experience and expertise of Fellows. They are centered around four key themes: individual learning, which acknowledges the critical role of the leader in any organization's success; organizational learning, which focuses on articulating a vision, thinking in terms of systems and managing change; systems learning, which is tied closely to the Casey vision of developing more effective, flexible and integrated service delivery for children and families across systems; and societal learning, which focuses on creating a larger environment within which change of substantial magnitude can take place. Three "notes" are consistently played across each theme: reflection, renewal and the need to keep one's focus on real children and families.

Field Placements

Fellows spend two three-month blocks of time in field placements where they gain additional hands-on experience. Most placements are with individuals, organizations or agencies throughout the United States which are currently funded by the Casey Foundation. Examples of potential placements include: a governor's office which, in conjunction with the state's department of human services, is working to reform the child welfare system; a community collaborative that is working with local human service providers and state agencies to develop a new human service delivery system financing plan; or a partnership between state government and child advocates that is preparing a report card to highlight child and family outcomes.

As with other parts of the Fellowship, placements are driven by Fellows' personal goals. Some assignments expose Fellows to systems with which they are not familiar, while others allow Fellows to develop new perspectives through experiences at different levels in the service delivery system. Host organizations assign a high level staff person to support Fellows and to link them with additional opportunities in the host's community or state.

Independent Project

Fellows pursue a focused independent project that allows for in-depth examination of a particular topic. Individual projects are planned with Casey Foundation Sponsors, and Fellows prepare a final product that is intended to advance the work in the field of their chosen topic.

THE FELLOWSHIP YEAR AND CASEY FOUNDATION SUPPORT

The Annie E. Casey Foundation Children and Family Fellowship represents a full time commitment. The Fellowship year starts in early September 1993 and ends in late July 1994. A one-month orientation and two one-month blocks of time are spent in residence at the Casey Foundation in Greenwich, CT focusing on individual projects. Two three-month blocks are spent in field placements. Seminars occur periodically throughout the year.

The Annie E. Casey Foundation pays each Fellow a stipend that matches their current salary plus 10 percent up to a maximum of \$80,000. Additionally, program-related travel and lodging costs are reimbursed by the Foundation. The Foundation also reimburses Fellows health insurance premiums.

THE SELECTION PROCESS

The Casey Foundation Children and Family Fellowship seeks to attract emerging leaders who aspire to influence organizations and institutions which have an impact on children and families. The Casey Foundation utilizes a diverse national panel to nominate candidates for the Fellowship. The Foundation selects Fellows only from candidates nominated by the panel. Nominators are encouraged to suggest candidates from the public, private and non-profit sectors.

All nominees receive a Fellowship application. During the application period, Fellowship staff gather additional information about candidates from nominators and others who are familiar with their work. Completed applications are due in mid-March.

Casey Foundation staff and a selection committee review applications, and a limited number of applicants are interviewed for final consideration. Up to ten Casey Children and Family Fellows are notified of their selection in late-May.

ABOUT THE ANNIE E. CASEY FOUNDATION

The Annie E. Casey Foundation was established in 1948 by Jim Casey, one of the founders of United Parcel Service, and his siblings. The Foundation was named in honor of their mother. The seminars are the framework through which Fellows can examine their experiences; increase their management, organizational and policy knowledge; fine tune their leadership skills; and have an opportunity for meaningful exchange with each other, seminar faculty, nationally recognized leaders, and Casey Foundation staff.

Seminars are intended to develop and enhance critical skills within an adult learning environment that builds on the experience and expertise of Fellows. They are centered around four key themes: individual learning, which acknowledges the critical role of the leader in any organization's success; organizational learning, which focuses on articulating a vision, thinking in terms of systems and managing change; systems learning, which is tied closely to the Casey vision of developing more effective, flexible and integrated service delivery for children and families across systems; and societal learning, which focuses on creating a larger environment within which change of substantial magnitude can take place. Three "notes" are consistently played across each theme: reflection, renewal and the need to keep one's focus on real children and familles.

Field Placements

Fellows spend two three-month blocks of time in field placements where they gain additional hands-on experience. Most placements are with individuals, organizations or agencies throughout the United States which are currently funded by the Casey Foundation. Examples of potential placements include: a governor's office which, in conjunction with the state's department of human services, is working to reform the child welfare system; a community collaborative that is working with local human service providers and state agencies to develop a new human service delivery system financing plan; or a partnership between state government and child advocates that is preparing a report card to highlight child and family outcomes.

As with other parts of the Fellowship, placements are driven by Fellows' personal goals. Some assignments expose Fellows to systems with which they are not familiar, while others allow Fellows to develop new perspectives through experiences at different levels in the service delivery system. Host organizations assign a high level staff person to support Fellows and to link them with additional opportunities in the host's community or state.

Independent Project

Fellows pursue a focused independent project that allows for In-depth examination of a particular topic. Individual projects are planned with Casey Foundation Sponsors, and Fellows prepare a final product that is intended to advance the work in the field of their chosen topic.

THE FELLOWSHIP YEAR AND CASEY FOUNDATION SUPPORT

The Annie E. Casey Foundation Children and Family Fellowship represents a full time commitment. The Fellowship year starts in early September 1993 and ends in late July 1994. A one-month orientation and two one-month blocks of time are spent in residence at the Casey Foundation in Greenwich, CT focusing on individual projects. Two threemonth blocks are spent in field placements. Seminars occur periodically throughout the year.

The Annie E. Casey Foundation pays each Fellow a stipend that matches their current salary plus 10 percent up to a maximum of \$80,000. Additionally, program-related travel and lodging costs are reimbursed by the Foundation. The Foundation also reimburses Fellows health insurance premiums.

THE SELECTION PROCESS

The Casey Foundation Children and Family Fellowship seeks to attract emerging leaders who aspire to influence organizations and institutions which have an impact on children and families. The Casey Foundation utilizes a diverse national panel to nominate candidates for the Fellowship. The Foundation selects Fellows only from candidates nominated by the panel. Nominators are encouraged to suggest candidates from the public, private and non-profit sectors.

All nominees receive a Fellowship application. During the application period, Fellowship staff gather additional information about candidates from nominators and others who are familiar with their work. Completed applications are due in mid-March.

Casey Foundation staff and a selection committee review applications, and a limited number of applicants are interviewed for final consideration. Up to ten Casey Children and Family Fellows are notified of their selection in late-May.

ABOUT THE ANNIE E. CASEY FOUNDATION

The Annie E. Casey Foundation was established in 1948 by Jim Casey, one of the founders of United Parcel Service, and his siblings. The Foundation was named in honor of their mother. With assets of more than \$900 million, it is the nation's largest philanthropy dedicated exclusively to disadvantaged children.

The Casey Foundation makes grants to enhance the effectiveness of the major institutions. serving disadvantaged children and to inform the public policy environment about the needs of children and their families and how they can best be served.

Among the Foundation's current major initiatives are the Child Welfare Reform: Juvenile Detention Alternatives initiative: KIDS COUNT National Data Book and State Grants: The New Futures Initiative; Family-to-Family: Reconstructing Foster Care: The Mental Health Initiative for Urban Children; Neighborhood Revitalization; and Plain Talk: A Community Strategy for Reaching Sexually Active Youth. The Foundation also provides quality family toster care through its Casey Family Services divisions in New England.
