Meeting

As background for today's Interagency Council on the Homeless meeting, the following provides information on the President's FY 1995 homeless budget request and appropriations action to date. The attached table provides additional information on the funding level of homeless assistance programs within each agency.

I. CLINTON ADMINISTRATION HIGH PRIORITY ON HOMELESSNESS

The Clinton Administration's high priority on addressing the needs of homeless families and individuals is clearly shown in the President's budget requests in FY 1994 and 1995. The following are highlights:

- <u>FY 94 Budget Funding Increase</u>. The Clinton FY 94 budget proposed more than \$1.4 billion (+34 percent over FY 93). Congress provided more than \$1.3 billion (+25 percent over FY 93).
- <u>PY 95 President's Budget Funding Increase</u>. The FY 95 President's budget requested over \$2.1 billion for all Federal homeless spending -- an increase of approximately 60 percent over FY 1994 and double FY 93. This is the most ever requested for targeted homeless assistance. For HUD alone, the President's budget proposed \$1.764 billion -- a \$942 million increase over the FY 94 HUD enacted level (more than double the 1994 level).
- Components of HUD Funding. HUD's FY 95 budget funding included three key components:
 - \$1.12 billion to reorganize HUD McKinney Act programs. Funds would be initially allocated by formula to communities with a comprehensive plan prepared by the locality. The plan would show the link to mainstream

programs and partnership with local providers. In the Housing authorization bill now pending on the Hill, the House and Senate have accepted key elements of this proposed consolidation.

- S514 million for 15,000 Section 8 rental vouchers for homeless families. This voucher funding would provide a vital link to permanent housing in the continuum of care.
- \$130 million to continue the Emergency Food and Shelter Program administered by FEMA.
- Other Increases. Other agencies with targeted homeless funding increases in the FY 95 President's budget include Education, USDA (Food and Consumer Service), and Veterans Affairs. Although HHS and DoL targeted homeless funding decreased slightly, the budget supported linking funding of homeless training and health needs with mainstream programs.
- Mainstream Programs. The above FY 95 budget increases are in addition to the mainstream Federal assistance provided through programs like Food Stamps, AFDC, and CDBG, and through surplus Pederal equipment, food, and real property provided to homeless persons. In addition, the Corporation for National and Community Service is a key source of support for the Administration's homeless assistance efforts.

II. STATUS OF FY 95 CONGRESSIONAL APPROPRIATIONS ACTION

For most of the targeted homeless assistance programs, the House and Senate have completed FY 95 action and we are awaiting conference action. Although we do not have funding information on all of the homeless assistance programs, here is a run-down of key Congressional action to date:

- House Funding Just Over President's Request. The House provided \$2.18 billion in budget authority for both McKinney and non-McKinney assistance, \$20 million over the \$2.16 billion President's request. House funding is 62 percent over FY 94 enacted level. (President's budget was 60 percent over FY 94 enacted level).
- Senate Funding Excludes Homeless Voucher Setaside. The Senate provided \$1.6 billion in budget authority -- \$514 million below the President's request. The Senate decrease was due to the Senate not earmarking \$514 million for 15,000 Section 8 vouchers for homeless families. The Senate level is 22 percent above the FY 94 enacted level.
- Progress on HUD Consolidation. Appropriators have generally accepted HUD grant consolidation. So far, we have made less progress on efforts to consolidated HHS programs.

• <u>Conference efforts</u>. We are now working with the conferees to achieve the President's request funding and policy proposals. Agencies should continue to push for these priorities in their efforts with the conferees.

III. NEXT STEPS

Agencies are now in the process of developing FY 96 budget requests which will be submitted to OMB in the fall. The following issues relate to preparation of the FY 96 budget:

- FY 96 Budget Preparation. The FY 96 budget will continue to make homeless assistance a high priority. However, outlay caps will continue to put severe constraints on spending. We will all have to continue to think creatively about how to get the most from the dollars that we have.
- Performance Measures. As we consider homeless funding in the FY 96 budget and beyond, there will need to be increased focus on developing performance measures to evaluate relative performance of programs and to monitor progress. It is particularly difficult to develop such measures for the homeless assistance programs. Nevertheless, we will need to improve in this area in order to make meaningful progress towards the Administration's stated goals.
- Review of Mandatory Proposals. In addition to annually reviewing discretionary programs through the budget process, we all need to continue to review proposals on the tax side. This is particularly important given discretionary budget caps.


