

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
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

Americals neighborhood drug stores support those in Congress working to guarantee universal health care for all

We applaud the efforts of Rep. Gephardiand Sen. Mitchell, who recognize that health care costs can be reduced by bringing everyone into the system. They understand that universal coverage is a necessary element in any effort to straighten out our health care system. They also understand the need to bring fairness to the prescription drug marketplace.

Year after year, consumers continue to pay higher prices for prescription drugs because drug makers; who comprise one of the most profitable industries in this country, limit true competition in the marketplace.

America's 60,000 neighborhood drug stores dispense 9 out of every 10 outpatient prescriptions, yetidrug makers continue to deny them access to the significant discounts they offer hospitals, HMOs, and mail order vendors. leadership of President Bill Clinton has ONE bottom

line...UNIVERSAL COVERAGE...always has been,

always will be...UNIVERSAL COVERAGE. It is

though

critical that any bill crafted outline very specifically

how we as a nation will reach universal coverage.

At the same time, that universal coverage should be

a comprehensive benefit package and presented to the individual in several types of packages including fee for service and managed care. The comprehensive package should include preventive services, prescription drugs, mental health services, family planning, services for pregnant women. We hope to also see alternatives for the elderly and the disabled in long term care. Cost controls are an essential part of health care reform and we will continue to work with Congress on that issue. No family should ever have to worry about coverage

due to pre-existing conditions and in today's world where most individuals can be expected to change jobs multiple times in their work life, portability is a critical issue. As we fight for these principles we always have in mind that we are fighting to preserve what is right about today's health care - and there is a lot that is right - and to repair what is wrong with the system. But we MUST keep in mind what is really behind that statement about preserving what is right...the ONLY way it is preserved is to address the illnesses of the current system - run away

costs, insufficient preventive care, inadequate prescription drug coverage which means some people don't get the remedies needed to carry out a treatment program, burdensome administrative procedures for you and other health care providers, AND inconsistent pricing procedures by the drug manufacturers. We may not succeed in each and every point, but we must seize the moment to start the process in a meaningful way. We are prepared not to stop with the banging of the gavel in October

or November - or heaven forbid, December - closing this second session of the 103rd Congress. I again thank you for your support to date, I look all of forward with the remainder of the administration to working with you. Health care reform was a logical next step upon which then Governor Bill Clinton would embark following the signing of the Family Support Act of 1988, the last iteration of welfare reform for which Governor Clinton served as the lead Democratic governor for the National Governors' Association during the almost three

year process for passing that bill through Congress.

As we left the Rose Garden signing, where President Reagan signed that bill, Governor Clinton looked at me and said...serious work on child care, Rasco, and then health reform. Why did he say those things? Because throughout our work with the other governors, advocacy groups, client selfadvocates and Congress on welfare reform we came to know that more than anything, child care and health care were essential components of a truly reformed welfare system. We made serious

steps to begin those changes in the Family Support Act of 1988, we worked with the Congress through the National Governors' Association on further child care initiatives in the last years of the 80's and then as his final responsibility in the National Governors' Association, Governor Clinton served for two years as a lead governor on health care reform which formed the basis of our current work in the White House. What he realized on that day in 1988 was that while we had included within that welfare reform bill a transitional health care benefit,

we had not remedied the inequity of the many
workers that would be working side by side in
America...one who had never been on welfare and
still without family health benefits and one who was
coming from welfare with the needed transitional

health benefits to help make work PAY.

more attractive than work, and allowing parents to avoid responsibility for supporting their children. The President's plan basic values of work and responsibility, provide opportunity, and promote the family. To support work and responsibility, work must pay. Already, 70 percent of welfare recipients leave the welfare rolls within two years--but most eventually return. That's why we must use the Earned Income Tax Credit, guaranteed health care at work, and child care to make any job more attractive than welfare.

The EITC alone, will effectively make a minimum wage job pay \$6.00 an hour, helping to lift millions of people who work out of poverty. The combination of work opportunities, the EITC, health care, child care, and improved child support will make the lives of millions of women and children demonstrably better.

Under the President's plan, welfare will be about a paycheck, not a welfare check. To reinforce and reward work, our approach is based on a simple compact. Each recipient will immediately design a

personal employability plan designed to move her into the workforce as quickly as possible. Support, job training, and child care will be provided to help people move from dependence to independence.

But the first time limits ever imposed on welfare will ensure that anyone who can work, must work-in the private sector if possible, in a subsidized job if necessary.

From the very first day, welfare will be a transitional system leading to work. With child care and job search assistance, many people will move into the

workforce well before the two-year limit. And from the very first day, most teenage mothers will be required to live with their parents, stay in school, and attend job training or parenting classes.

Everyone will be moving toward work.

Our approach also correctly focuses on ending welfare for the next generation--teenagers who have the most to gain and the most at risk. By initially focusing our resources on younger recipients, we

will send a strong signal to teenagers that welfare as we know it has ended. They must get the message that staying in school, postponing pregnancy, preparing to work, and supporting their children are the right things to do. Welfare reform will include new measures to prevent teen pregnancy, and real incentives to ensure responsibility. To reinforce personal responsibility, the plan will take bold new steps to require full payment of child support. It sets up a new system of paternity establishment to enforce the

responsibility of both parents from the moment the child is born. It involves the IRS in tracking delinquent parents from the moment they start a new job to the point that child support is delivered to the family. And it sets up a computer system to be sure that parents don't avoid their responsibilities by crossing state lines.

Welfare reform will mean real consequences for people who don't play by the rules. The new system will require mutual responsibility. We will provide recipients with services and work

opportunities, but those who refuse to follow the rules will face tough, new sanctions. And attempts to cheat the system will be promptly detected and swiftly punished.

Responsibility and accountability must also extend to the welfare office itself. Unfortunately, the current system focuses too often on simply sending out welfare checks. We must change the culture of the welfare office to become a place that is fundamentally about moving people into the workforce. To do that we must reward performance,

not process. That means reducing paperwork and Welfare reform is also about changing focusing on results. Your leadership had asked me to comment on medicaid in welfare reform. As stated earlier, our welfare reform bill is built on the passage of health care reform. As you probably know, we introduced our welfare reform bill-The Work and Responsibility Act of 1994- in June. Hearings have been held in both the Senate and House and more will be held in the months ahead. We will continue to work

with Congress on the interplay between

welfare reform and health reform. The bottom line for welfare reform- work and responsibility - is a natural extension of the overall guiding principle for domestic policy development agreed upon by President Clinton and myself when I agreed to take this job: Every child shall be empowered to develop to her or his fullest potential. As stated earlier, every child deserves parents who accept and have the tools necessary to support their children. Jobs, the education and training necessary for those jobs, health care coverage...all

necessary components, all high priorities of this Administration.

We won't necessarily always succeed in obtaining all we want for the citizens of this great nation as we in the administration join with dedicated professionals and citizens like you to move this nation forward...we won't always be able to do everything you and even we would want....but I can promise you this: we will never relent in our effort to give every person a chance to develop---fully. None of these debates will be easy as we have

already seen.....because they are complex, because they affect so many citizens and in the case of health reform, EVERY citizen.

Some of you heard me in December talk about my ultimate test in all of this...there are many who say at the end of the day we all as human beings have to pass the mirror test....Can we stand in front of the mirror and say we have done all we could have done to care for our children and their future....I say the mirror I must use is the mirror of my children's eyes....can I look at Hamp Rasco and Mary-Margaret

Rasco and say: I DID MY BEST. And for all our children's sakes, I want each of us here today to be able to look at one another and say: We did our best.
