Type of Review:

The facility is always kept very clean and the atmosphere inside this facility seems to fit the mold of a college dormitory than an actual jail. If and when a problem arises at this facility the individual is moved out of the unit to a holding cell where they await a meeting with the Detroit DRO Staff.
