# The Answer Corner

Volunteer project leaders (or "volunteer leaders") can greatly expand the work of your organization. With proper matching, training, and support, volunteer leaders can help you organize more projects, reach more people in the community, engage more

volunteers, and achieve the mission of your organization.

A volunteer leader is a volunteer who

- Takes charge of a project by coordinating it and taking accountability for its successful completion
- Communicates the details of the project and serves as a resource for other volunteers
- Organizes, leads, and inspires a group of volunteers before, during, and after the project



May initiate new projects

Represents your program or organization to other volunteers and to the community

Is a great volunteer a great volunteer leader? This is true often, but not always. When thinking about how you can engage volunteers in leadership roles, consider the skills and attributes those leaders will need. A strong volunteer leader should be:

- Committed
- Knowledgeable
- Credible
- Organized
- Responsible
- A "people person"
- An excellent communicator
- Someone who exemplifies your program's values

What skills can volunteer leaders bring to your organization? What skills can they gain through their service? These skills might include:

- Marketing
- Budgeting
- Project management
- Strategy development

Understanding your volunteers' skills and interests can strengthen your volunteer leadership efforts. It will help you recruit the "right" leaders, match them to the best service opportunities, and support them as they work in the community.
