The Answer Corner

Recruiting volunteers directly from the communities in which you serve is among the first steps in creating a sustainable volunteer program. Building a strong inclusive volunteer climate can seem a bit challenging, but taking the time to create an effective volunteer recruitment plan will make the task seem less daunting. Once a plan is created, not only will you improve the likelihood of involving all members of your community, but you can develop a great volunteer-base with this new volunteer pool in mind.

Reaching out to include a diversity of volunteers in your program means thinking differently and creatively about how you recruit. Try some of the following ideas:

- Recruit at neighborhood agencies and community centers in diverse areas.
- · Partner with specific culturally-based associations in your area such as:
- 1. Asian/Pacific Islander Based Fraternal Organizations
- 2. ASPIRA Association Inc. a national non profit dedicated to the leadership and empowerment of the Latin community.
- 3. Try contacting your local Chamber of Commerce who will have a list of local ethnic newspapers, associations and businesses in your area.



- Pick up local publications geared towards an ethnic audience. Not only can you advertise, but you can find new sources of many multicultural businesses and activities. Based on this information, create a database and use this to develop community partnerships.
- Express your interest in diverse volunteers in your ads, such as this: "To expand our support throughout the Crown Heights area we are especially interested in recruiting individuals with knowledge and experience of different cultures and languages, different abilities, and those from rural communities."
- Make sure your program materials are available in other languages besides English.
- Examine the photos of people in your ads. Do they reflect the diversity you seek?
- Connect with religious centers. They are important in many multicultural communities.
- Place ads on Spanish-language radio stations.
- Be aware of important religious/cultural holidays when scheduling volunteer orientation or other activities.
- Develop a statement of your organization's commitment to multiculturalism.
- Create an inclusion committee to assess your organization's commitment to diversity in all aspects.

September 24: Moving Volunteers from Service to Civic Engagement

You'll be introduced to the concept of reflection and how intentionally combining reflection and meaningful service can deepen the civic commitment of your volunteers.
