The Answer Corner

Volunteers always desire to have their efforts to be recognized. What better way of showing recognition to our volunteers than during the holiday season. There are many creative, inexpensive ways to say thank you to volunteers. Volunteers appreciate the smallest gifts of recognition when the most sincere, creative ideas are put into giving it. Here are a few ideas for recognizing your volunteers during the holiday season:

- Send a holiday card (e-cards are a great budget-friendly option!). If there is any group that deserves a holiday greeting, it is your volunteers. Put thought into your notes that matches their personality. Depending on the size of your staff, have all the staff sign the holiday greeting card.
- Host a holiday open house at the organizational office, where volunteers and staff can mingle. Set up a staff table with treats for volunteers. Have staff to serve volunteers their meals. It's a great opportunity for the organization to show appreciation by serving volunteers. Invite other high-profile community leaders such as your local city councilman.
- Provide inexpensive yet meaningful gifts. Some ideas are candy canes or green wrapped peppermint patties
 with a special note from the Executive Director or the CEO of the agency that states "You service is worth a mint
 to us."
- **Give volunteers pictures of themselves volunteering throughout the year.** What a great idea to capture great service moments with pictures! Volunteers can share those pictures with friends and family members for years to come.
- Create a booklet with staff and clients' quotes about how much volunteers mean to the organization and share it at an event or mail it. Volunteers spend countless hours serving communities. Ask recipients to write thank you notes or provide a small, inexpensive mementos from the recipients.
- . Acknowledge volunteers on organizational website or newsletter with a holiday heading such as "The

- Gift of Service." List the names of each volunteer who served with the organization during year.
- Partner with other community agencies to sponsor a volunteer celebration. During tough economic times, funds are limited. Partnering with another agency will provide more leverage with the supplies and food for the volunteer celebration.
- Solicit gift cards or discount coupons from local restaurants and businesses. Start now asking local restaurants and businesses to donate gift cards or discount coupons. Many businesses are looking for the last minute tax write-offs in preparation for next year's taxes.
- Plan service opportunities throughout the holiday season. Most likely, organizations have several volunteer
 projects occuring through the year. Providing service opportunities is a wonderful way for all volunteers to get to
 know each other and give back to the community at the same time. Create opportunities to give the gift that
 keeps on giving service opportunities.
