# Dear HandsOn,

My volunteers have expressed interest in working in local public schools. My organization has no experience in schools. How do we get started?

### **The Answer Corner**

HandsOn Schools, a program of HandsOn Network, strives to make schools the hub of vibrant communities by giving students, parents, teachers, and other community members the necessary resources to become driving forces of that positive change.

Founded on the belief that communities can make a positive change, HandsOn Schools applies an innovative approach to school revitalization. By uniting the collective resources of parents, communities, and corporations, HandsOn Schools aims to re-establish schools as the focal point of the community. Research indicates that schools with broad-based community involvement provide more dynamic learning experiences, resulting in higher student achievement. HandsOn Schools seeks to cultivate community, school, and civic collaboration to transform schools into dynamic learning centers that foster student achievement and community engagement.

One way HandsOn Schools engages community volunteers in the school is through one-day service events. These tips can help you build a successful partnership with your local school for a one-day service project.

Here are some tips to launch your partnership:

**Identifying a School** - Identify the strengths and resources that your organization brings to the table; this will help you identify a school that can benefit from your partnership. If you're planning to engage volunteers in a renovation-style project, for instance, look for a school that has clear physical needs. We recommend reaching out to schools that serve low-income children and communities. This site provides Title I and free/reduced lunch information for all public schools:

**Building a Relationship with a School** - Setting up a strong communication system with your partner school will prove absolutely vital. Provide clarity about your vision and goals for the partnership as well as concerns and questions. Meet with the school administration and/or supporting staff on a regular basis. Work with the administration to identify one teacher who can serve as a key contact; if you're planning to do a painting or renovation-style project, the custodial/maintenance staff can be your best friend!

Community Design Event - In order to execute a successful and meaningful project, it is important to hear from all key stakeholders. Invite a group of students, teachers, parents, and others together to brainstorm ideas. What types of improvements would they like to see for their school? Do they need a new library? Do the teachers want fresh, bright paint to enliven their classroom? Think about needed resources, as well. Besides volunteers, what other resources might be required? Invite local businesses and other corporate partners to join the meeting; they can be great sources of volunteers and potential donors. **Project Design/Planning** - Develop a detailed work plan outlining all needs in terms of personnel, infrastructure and physical materials for your project. Prioritize what steps should come before others; create a timeline and follow through on deadlines. Clearly outline each person's role and responsibilities, determine budgeting needs and opportunities for volunteers.

**Garnering Community Support** - Reach out to area businesses, faith organizations, and other groups in the school community. These groups can not only help fund your project, they can also be a great source of volunteers. Publicize the project. Send out a media release to let your local media know about the project and your partnership with the school.

Volunteer Recruitment - Projects at schools tend to be very popular among volunteers, so this is a great opportunity to expand your existing volunteer base. Challenge the students that participated in the Community Design Event to recruit two friends each to join them on project day. Are you working in an elementary school? Recruit additional student volunteers from the middle school in the same neighborhood. Reach out to parents and other family members; again, students are often the best recruiters. Are there any community centers, faith-based organizations, or businesses nearby? People with natural connections to the school can make committed, long-term volunteers. Amidst the recruitment, be sure to identify and train volunteers that can serve as volunteer leaders on

the day of the project. This will greatly ease the burden on you and your team.

**Project Execution** - The planning is done and the volunteers are recruited; project day has arrived! Make sure all of your tasks are prepared and organized ahead of time. Will volunteers be painting classrooms? Place the needed paint and other supplies in the rooms ahead of time. Will volunteers be rebuilding a library? Have all necessary furniture, tools, and other materials in the appropriate space. As your volunteers arrive, have them sign-in and receive their volunteer assignment. Place a volunteer leader or other staff member in each area of the school where volunteers will be working to help answer questions and guide the volunteers. Be sure to have plenty of food and beverages on hand to keep the volunteers energetic and happy!
