The 2010 Census on Campus Initiative

The 2010 Census on Campus Initiative seeks to educate, engage, and mobilize college and university students, administration, and faculty so that in the 2010 Census, every individual is counted—once, and in the right place.

Required by the Constitution, the census is conducted once every 10 years. Census data affect political representation and direct the distribution of billions of dollars in annual federal funding. In your academic community, census data affect funding for critical services and help shape community decisions for the rest of the decade.

The census counts everyone residing in the United States, and people should be counted where they live and sleep most of the year. However, the highly mobile college student population has historically been hard to count. Consequently, if they are under-represented in the census, students and the academic communities they live in might not receive their fair share of funds and services.

As powerful grassroots organizers, students can have an influential voice in reaching others with the message of the 2010 Census.



With over a million students attending more than 300 academic institutions in New England, Upstate New York, and Puerto Rico, it is critical to engage this diverse and historically hard-to-count population to achieve an accurate count in 2010.

Students who participate in the 2010 Census awareness campaign, "Census on Campus," can become civically engaged in their communities and earn valuable resume-building experience.




Get involved!
