RE: Proposed Gas Pipeline Project called "Via Verde"

Takahi (Greetings) Hon. Daniel José Galán Kercado,

The United Confederation of Taino People (UCTP) is submitting this communication to voice its opposition to the proposed Gas Pipeline Project called "Via Verde", and the licensing of large-scale gas development on Borikén (Puerto Rico).

The UCTP is aware that the preamble to the constitution of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico ensures the free participation of its citizens in collective decisions;" we note however that this multinational project ignores and tramples on the right of Borikén Taíno People as well as environmental and grassroots organizations to participation in collective decision-making.

Taíno indigenous people as well as grassroots community people who live in the areas that will be affected b this project, have told the Federal and national government of Puerto Rico, that they oppose the construction of the Gas Pipeline "Via Verde" because it threatens the lives, health, welfare, security, culture, Sacred Sites, food sovereignty and property of the People, and presents a threat to *Atabei*, Mother Earth, her environment, over 21 rivers, water, air, fish, agricultural lands, endangered species, and their habitats.

Borikén Taíno People, environmental and grassroots organizations have taken to the streets and marched to demonstrate that they are unconditionally saying no to the destructive gas pipeline project and are petitioning the Federal and Puerto Rican government to cancel all plans and permits related to this project.

With this in mind, the UCTP denounces the persistent failure of the Federal and Puerto Rican officials to respect the rights of Taíno People as one of the most egregious examples of their double standard with respect to human, constitutional and international rights and crass violation of the Taíno Peoples rights to consultation, free, prior and informed consent.

The proposed Gas Pipeline not only threatens Taíno People but all the Peoples of Borikén (Puerto Rico). According to the AEE plans, the pipeline route is 146 km long with a potential impact to over 100 meters wide and, would severely impact around 400 agricultural acres.

The UCTP therefore urges the Federal and Puerto Rican government to take action by immediately committing to stop the gas pipeline now, and to explore new sources of renewable and sustainable energy, with the intention of fully respecting, ensuring and upholding the rights of the Taíno Peoples of Borikén (Puerto Rico).

Consistent with UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous People, the UCTP calls upon the Federal and Puerto Rican Government to ensure that no further development takes place within ancestral Taíno Territory without consultation of, and obtaining the free, prior and informed consent of Taíno Peoples.
