Mr. Chao's criminal defense practice has ranged from conducting internal corporate investigations to defending corporations and corporate officers in connection with a wide range of alleged violations. He successfully represented an individual prosecuted for cultivating 5,600 mature marijuana plants on a farm in Mendocino County, California, described by the authorities at the time of the arrests as the largest marijuana operation in Northern California history.

Mr. Chao currently serves as a member of China SF's advisory board; an adviser to the American Law Institute project to draft the Restatement of the U.S. Law of International Commercial Arbitration; president of the Northern California International Arbitration Club; member of the board of directors of Lex Mundi; North American jurisdictional member of the Inter-Pacific Bar Association; steering committee member of the ICC Arbitration Committee for the Northwest U.S.; and secretary of the board of directors of the Hong Kong Association of Northern California. He has been recommended as a leading lawyer by several publications, including *Chambers USA*, *The Best Lawyers of America*, and *Asialaw*.
