

VINCENT A. MULLOY
Counsel to the Inspector General

Vincent A. Mulloy was appointed to his present position in September 2000, and comes to the staff of the OIG from the U.S. Department of Justice's Justice Management Division. After receiving his J.D. in 1986 from the University of Arkansas' School of Law, in Fayetteville, Mr. Mulloy accepted a position with the Legal Services Corporation, a Washington, D.C. based government corporation that makes federal grants to organizations that provide legal aid to the indigent. As a compliance attorney in the Office of Monitoring, Audit, and Compliance, Mr. Mulloy conducted legal reviews and assisted in litigation to withdraw funding from Legal Services Corporation grantees.

In 1988, Mr. Mulloy joined the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, a federal agency that monitors civil rights enforcement and presents policy recommendations to Congress. As an attorney in the Office of General Counsel, Mr. Mulloy analyzed legal developments in civil rights law, interviewed legal and policy experts, organized Commission briefings, and drafted reports on affirmative action, discrimination in medical care, and police misconduct. In 1991, Mr. Mulloy accepted a position with the Civil Rights Division in the U.S. Department of Justice. On behalf of the United States, he investigated and prosecuted cases of employment discrimination against state and local governments.

Mr. Mulloy left government service in 1993, and entered private practice with a principal focus on labor and employment law issues. From 1996 to 1998, Mr. Mulloy worked as a counsel and technical advisor to a Fairfax county technology firm, U.S. Inspect, a provider of home inspection reports to real estate brokerage houses.

Mr. Mulloy was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and is admitted to practice in the courts of the District of Columbia and the state of Arkansas.
