- 1,698 applications were received for the Investing in Innovation Fund (i3) competition.
- 23% of the total addressed Competitive Preference Priority 5, to improve early learning outcomes for high-need students who are young children (birth through 3rd grade) by enhancing the quality of early learning programs.
