Cadets win design challenge

A year of hard work paid off for a team of cadets May 6 when they won the Boeing CrewSystem 2035 chal-

CrewSystem 2035 was a yearlong design competition sponsored by Boeing. Teams from the U.S. Naval Academy, the U.S. Military Academy, and the Air Force Academy were tasked to design the cockpit of a future seventh generation fighter aircraft. Each Academy team was provided a set of 13 requirements and \$75,000 to guide their efforts. Over the course of a year, students progressed through the conceptual and detailed design phases, culminating in the creation and testing of a fullscale mockup.

"Working on it was both a blessing and a curse," said Cadet 1st Class Caroline Kurtz, Cadet Squadron 32. "It was very interesting to explore all this technology that you've never even thought of or never even seen and then work to figure out how to create the best performance possible."

"The Boeing requirements were very open and let us figure out what we wanted to do in the process, said Cadet 1st Class Ryan Zielinski of Cadet Squadron 04, another member of the team. "It was a challenge to define them for ourselves."

According to cadets, the majority of their time was spent in the design phase and the model itself was constructed over the last couple of months.

"This started for me when I was looking for a summer research project as a junior," Cadet Zielinski continued. "That summer we (the cadet team) traveled all over to see what the Air Force is working on in this field."

Cadets Zielinski and Kurtz agreed that the construction phase was the most fun and really pushed the team to get creative.

"We had to innovate: use coat hangers, rubber bands, hot glue, clay, monitors and spandex fabric to try to bring our point across because there was no other way to show what we were trying to show," Cadet Kurtz explained.

"It was cool to see how we could represent our ideas with the materials available to us," Cadet Zielinski said.

The Academy ran this competition as a capstone project through the Department of Systems Engineering and had a team of 15 seniors from six different majors, with Lt. Col. Carlene Perry, an assistant professor

in the Department of Behavioral Science and Leadership, as course director.

'We chose cadets through a careful selection process and thought about what the project would entail and what kind of academic majors would be useful to have on the team," Colonel Perry said. "Then we approached those departments, sold them on the project and asked them to submit their best cadets for the team. We chose our team from those groups."

After presenting their final design and demonstration to a panel of seven judges from Boeing May 3, it was announced that the Air Force Academy won the competition. The CEO and President of Boeing Defense, Space and Security, Dennis Muilenburg, along with other Boeing executives visited the Academy on May 6 to present a trophy to the team.

"The cadets did a lot of hard work over the past year, and today was the icing on the cake," Colonel Perry said.



Academy fire department named best in Air Force

The 10th Civil Engineer Squadron Fire and Emergency Services Flight was recently named the 2010 Air Force Fire Department of the Year.

The department competed against 175 other fire and emergency services flights and will be recognized by Air Force Civil Engineer Maj. Gen. Timothy Byers, at the Department of Defense Fire and Emergency Service Conference later this year.

Each contender for the award submitted detailed information on customer service, departmental recognition, innovations and initiatives.

The Air Force Academy fire department's award package high-lighted several of their responses in 2010, including life-saving actions at a parachuting accident, rapid mitigation of several major fires and responses to more than 300 incidents along Interstate 25.

In addition to their emergency duties, the department was also recognized for their outstanding efforts on the installation, in the local community and throughout the DoD. In particular, as the only DoD fire agency to be accredited for more than 10 years, the Academy fire department provides leadership and mentorship to both DoD and civilian fire departments. Their

efforts within the community included the donation of hundreds of hours to assist local charities while also providing a public fire education program described by outside evaluators as the "best seen to date."

"We are thrilled to be named the Best Fire Department in the Air Force for 2010," said Ernst Piercy, Academy fire chief. The teamwork and professionalism of our firefighters has given us the ability to make a positive impact on base, in the DoD and around the world. The department's hard work and extraordinary efforts were the clear catalyst that led to this prestigious honor."

The 10th Mission Support Group commander, Col. Timothy Ferguson added, "This award is a tremendous achievement. This recognition complements the hard work the USAFA Fire Department personnel puts in 24/7, 365 days a year."

The Academy Fire and Emergency Services Flight will now compete at the DoD level against the best fire departments from the Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Defense Logistics Agency and Coast Guard.

The DoD Fire Department of the Year will be announced in August at the Fire Rescue International conference in Atlanta.



F-15 pilot receives Jabara Award

Capt. Michal Polidor, center, a Pittsburgh native and 2004 Air Force Academy graduate, receives the Jabara Airmanship Award from Lt. Gen. Mike Gould, U.S. Air Force Academy superintendent, and William "T" Thompson, Association of Graduates president, at Mitchell Hall May 6. Established in 1967, the Col. James Jabara Airmanship Award is presented to an Academy graduate whose actions directly associated with an aerospace vehicle set him or her apart from contemporaries. Captain Polidor was the flight lead of an F-15E two-ship tasked Oct. 3, 2009, to support Coalition Observation Post Keating in the Nuristan province of Afghanistan. More than 80 Coalition soldiers were pinned down and taking fire from a wellorchestrated 360-degree attack of 250 Taliban insurgents in the Kamdesh Valley. During his 7.8-hour sortie, Captain Polidor coordinated and integrated 19 aircraft, orchestrating precision strikes on the enemy. He also arranged for additional tanker assets, ensuring continued air power over the battle area.



Enlisted heritage dedication

The gallery was created to display the broad depth of influence the enlisted corps has had on the Air Force Academy and its graduates since its very inception.

Graduation tickets available

Tickets for the Air Force Academy Graduation Ceremony are now available from the Athletic Ticket Office for Academy personnel, which includes cadets, contractors, civilians and permanent party military.

The tickets are free and will be available on a first-come, first-served basis, with a limit of ten tickets per staff member. Tickets are for reserved seats in various sections of the stadium. The Athletic Ticket Office is located in the Falcon Athletic Center (building southwest of the Field House) and is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Tickets cannot be mailed or held for "will call."

The graduation ceremony is May 25 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Falcon Stadium, and Secretary of the Air Force Michael Donley will be the guest speaker.

Falcon Stadium gates will open at 8 a.m. May 25, and ticket holders are encouraged to arrive no later than 9 a.m. Stringent security measures will be in effect, and stadium security staff will check tickets, IDs, and hand-carried items and will require attendees to be scanned by airport-style metal detectors.

No boxes, alcohol, weapons, firecrackers, beverage containers of any sort, backpacks, large handbags, coolers, or similar items will be allowed in the stadium. Food and drink are prohibited with the exception of clear, unopened water bottles and medically necessary items with a doctor's order.

Cameras, video cameras and binoculars are permitted; however, please be prepared to remove camera lenses for security inspection at the stadium gates. Diaper bags will be allowed when a child is present, but strollers are not permitted.

Refreshments will be available from vendors throughout the stadium, and seatbacks will be available for rent. Please note that there are no elevators in the stadium, and handicapped-accessible seating is very limited.

Uniform for the Graduation Ceremony is: Military: Service Dress with flight or service cap (platform guests will wear wheel hat). Ladies: Dress or Jacket with Skirt or Slacks; Gentlemen: Coat or Suit and Tie.

Once the ceremony begins, attendees will not be allowed to leave the stadium until after the Thunderbirds' performance at about 1 p.m.

No tailgating parties will be permitted in the stadium parking lots. RVs or vans may be parked in the stadium lots, but no open fires or charcoal/wood grills are permitted.

As the Air Force Academy graduation ceremony is conducted in an outdoor stadium, guests should be prepared for any kind of weather. Medical personnel will be available for individuals who may experience illness or other medical emergencies.

General public and staff ticket holders will not be allowed to attend the graduation ceremony if it is moved indoors due to dangerous weather or heightened security. Notification will go out by 8 a.m. the morning of graduation, via base message boards and local media, if the ceremony venue is changed.

Deployment networking adds strength for families

The Army claims in its ads that there's strong and then there's Army strong.

Master Sgt. Lisa Taylor thinks the Air Force Academy has a unique brand of strength, too. The model she instituted at the Academy to ease the stress of deployment has caught on with Airmen at her home base and is being widely emulated throughout the military.

Sergeant Taylor's program is called Deployment Networking — Strengthening the Mission. When she was hired as the readiness NCO at the Airman and Family Readiness Center, she jettisoned the welcome-back and sendoff events.

"This should be done at the unit level, where it is more personable," Sergeant Taylor said. "I then began the Deployment Networking event, and it has taken off. Granted, USAFA's numbers are not a lot, but the concept is what truly matters."

And that concept is starting to spread. At the end of May, Sergeant Taylor delivered a presentation at the Department of Defense/USDA Family Resiliency Conference in Chicago. An audience of more than 2,000 people listened to her describe the novel approach the Academy is taking to deployment preparation.

The centerpiece of the concept is the biannual deployment networking event. It aims to accomplish three objectives: inform service members and families about deployment and the resources available to them; develop ties between on-base and off-base organizations; promote base cohesiveness and the wingman concept.

One such event in April, just prior to Sergeant Taylor's departure for Chicago, had an attendance of 72. People at the event wore different-colored name tags that represented the various countries where service members were deployed and also deployment status.

Activities and services were designed to involve servicemembers' entire familv and meet them on their turf. Academy agencies ranging from finance to Youth Services to the Health and Wellness Center came together with off-base agencies that included the United Service Organizations SO, the YMCA and the American Red Cross.

"The deployment fact sheets are a huge hit with service members and families alike, especially the children," Sergeant Taylor said. "It not only educates them but it also gives them a sense of closeness to their parent while

deployed."

The bedrock principle underlying the Air Force Academy's program is that in the absence of a strong and easily accessible support network, the negative emotions brought on by deployment can become unbearable.

By using what Sergeant Taylor calls "purposeful networking," the Academy shows its personnel and their families what an extensive support network they have at their disposal. And the beauty of the concept is that it is broadly applicable, benefiting both large and small organizations.

Sergeant Taylor said her presentation attracted the attention of several Air

Force bases, Army posts and Naval stations. Representatives of these military installations expressed interest in supplementing their current deployment programs with the Deployment Networking model.

Colleges and universities are getting in on the act as well.

"Many universities are taking the different-colored-name-tag concept to customize networking for their current functions," Sergeant Taylor said. "This is a great icebreaker for any event."

Now, one new convert at a time, Americans are learning how to become Air Force Academy strong.



A fun ride is a Safe ride

Proper planning for the road can decrease risks for motorcyclists



Spring is here and people are excited for the warmer temperatures. Motorcyclists are especially excited to hang up their winter coats and pull out their motorcycles for the thrill of "hitting the road."

The month of May usually begins peak riding season and has been tabbed as Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to remind all drivers and riders to be mindful of their safety.

As the temperature rises, motorcycle fatalities increase as well. Several factors can contribute to motorcycle mishaps. In all seven Air Force fatal or permanent total disability motorcycle mishaps this year, experience, training, failure to appreciate one's own limitations, alcohol, or a combination of the aforementioned factors contributed to these mishaps and will increase your risk dramatically if not taken seriously.

Motorcycles are much smaller and more agile than cars and trucks, so for other drivers on the road they can be tougher to spot and keep track of. This is especially true at intersections and in slow or congested traffic. The first step in preparing you for a safe ride is to apply risk management. This should be done prior to hitting the road and continue during the ride. Proper planning allows you to take appropriate actions (i.e. inspect and service your motorcycle, map out your ride, wear adequate safety gear, counteract exposure to the elements, avoid fatigue) before you get on your motorcycle.




HELPFUL MOTORCYCLE TIPS

- Position yourself in a lane where you will be most visible to other drivers and never ride in the "No Zone" or blind spots.
- Maintain proper distance from other motorists.
- Get plenty of rest prior and stay hydrated.
- Avoid riding in bad weather.
- Wear protective gear, it can help save lives.Use hand and turn signals together to draw
- more attention to yourself when turning.
- Obey the general safety rules of the road.
- Always apply both the front and the rear brakes at the same time when slowing down. The front brake can supply as much as 70 percent of your stopping power.
- Ride in a staggered formation, never side by side, and never weaving in and out of traffic.
- Don't Drink and Ride!

All riders have limits. Without knowing your limits, you place yourself at an increased risk of serious injury or death. Knowing your limits, the limits of your motorcycle, the limits of your riding environment, and the limits of those you ride with, is critical in minimizing your risk. Consider these limitations every time you ride and adapt appropriately to achieve an accident-free ride.

Another key in minimizing the risk is taking a motorcycle safety course. Your awareness and skills are lost over the winter months and if not refreshed or practiced may lead to a mishap. Continued motorcycle safety training provides an excellent source for renewing your awareness and basic riding skills in a controlled environment.

Riding a motorcycle is one of the most exhilarating feelings one can have; "hitting the road" is not. With proper safety gear, knowing your limitations, adapting to your environment, and continued training and preparation, your fun ride can be a safe ride.



Academy Airmen carry all-AF b-ball teams to victory

The all-Air Force men's and women's teams took different paths to victory in the Armed Forces Basketball Tournament at Marine Corps Base Camp Pendleton, Calif., April 17.

The men's team, which had several former Air Force Falcons on its roster, destroyed its competition, sweeping its way to an unbeaten record and its sixth-straight gold medal. The women's team, in contrast, clawed its way back to the top after facing elimination in the second round of the playoffs.

Both teams had two things in common: Air Force Academy Airmen fighting for their service's victory, and gold medals at tournament's end.

TENACITY

The women's team won their first round-robin match against the all-Marine Corps team, 65-58, April 11. But a string of painful defeats followed: 53-47 to Navy and 66-62 to Army in the round-robin games, followed by a 44-36 loss to Army in the first round of the playoff.

"There was no expectation we would win," said Melissa Fletcher, a mental health NCO assigned to the Academy's Peak Performance Center.

Instead of giving up, Fletcher said, the team persevered.

"We all supported one another," she said. "There was no drama. That was the cool part about the team: there were no individualists. We all contributed."

Fletcher's own background illustrated the team's spirit: the single mother of four tried out for the all-Air Force women's team in 1998, 2005 and 2006, but she was turned down each time. She finally made the cut for the all-Air Force Europe women's team in 2007 while stationed at Aviano

Air Base, Italy. She prepared for this tournament by getting up at 5 a.m. to run 5 miles in the morning, then lifted weights in Fairchild Hall's fitness center annex in the early evening. And she played through to the first final game even while nursing the arch of her left foot, which was on the verge of collapse.

"If you're adamant about doing what you love to do, don't let anything stop you from doing it," she said. "How bad do you want it?"

The women's team decided they wanted the gold enough to come back from the bottom of the pile. They defeated Navy 55-51 in the second round and beat the Marine Corps 64-48 in the third round, to advance to the championship.

However, because they had been in the losers' bracket, the Air Force women would have to defeat Army twice to take home the gold. They did exactly that, defeating Army 67-51 in the first championship game and outlasting Army 71-65 in the tiebreaker.

"Of all the teams I've played on, the two best were the all-Air Force Europe team and this team," Fletcher said. "Our coach, (Darryl) Carpenter, was a very, very good coach. And Tiffany Guthrie was a phenomenal player. I bow down to her -- she was awesome." Fletcher also had kind words for her leaders and co-workers at the 10th Medical Group and the Commandant of Cadets staff, who released her from duty at the Academy to play in the tournament, and for Bradley Isom, who helped take care of her daughters while she was out-of-state.

DOMINANCE

Three Academy Airmen -- Tyron Wright, Thomas Bellairs and Grant Parker -- are among the five former Air Force Falcons men's basketball players who were named to the team

by the Air Force Services Agency March 4.

Bellairs, now a Falcons assistant coach, picked up basketball in middle school as an "in-between" sport: something to keep him active after football season ended and before baseball started. The Colorado Springs native played basketball exclusively once he started high school, and Air Force recruited him on a basketball scholarship his senior year.


"I didn't know anything about the service academies before that," he said. "It was just a unique opportunity that presented itself."

Wright, an academic adviser with the Academy's Registrar Services office and a native of Columbia, S.C., coached the team this year after playing on the team in years past. "We had a lot of good players," said Wright, a native of Columbia, S.C. "Going undefeated was a credit to them and to the goal they set. They went out and executed every day."

Wright, who coaches the Academy Preparatory School's Huskies basketball team, described leading the all-Air Force team to its sixth-consecutive gold medal as a pleasure.

"I actually played on the team that won the first (gold medal)," he said. "To be on the coaching end is a new rewarding experience. I just appreciate the opportunity that the Air Force gave me."

Wright will coach the all-Armed Forces team at the Council of International Military Sports tournament in Rio De Janiero July 12-25.
