Nature of bill: Permanent duty-free treatment for all imports under HTS subheading 3913.10.00.

Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Alginic acid, its salts and esters (provided for in subheading 3913.10.00).⁴

Product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports:

Alginate products, which include alginic acid, its salts and esters, are derived from various seaweeds that are harvested from coastal areas around the globe. Alginate products are typically sold as white to yellowish-brown, essentially odorless, free-flowing powder. Alginates serve as excellent thickening, emulsifying, and stabilizing agents in various food products, including salad dressings and dairy products; in pharmaceuticals, as film forming agents; in toothpaste and cosmetics; for textile sizing; and in a variety of other specialty consumer applications. The subject products are imported principally from the United Kingdom, Japan, Norway, China, Chile,⁵ and France. The proponent imports from the United Kingdom and Japan. Import demand grew at an average annual rate of 22 percent per year during 2002-05.
