DECORATIONS, AWARDS, AND HONORS

BRIGADIER GENERAL JEREMIAH P. HOLLAND AWARD

Effective 1 December 1982

This revision deletes annual general inspection reports from evaluation criteria for the Brigadier General Jeremiah P. Holland Award and clarifies the types of units eligible for the award. Supplementation of this regulation is prohibited unless prior approval is obtained from HQDA (DAPE-HRE), WASH D& 20310.

Interim changes to this regulation are not official unless they are authenticated by The Adjutant General. Users will destroy interim changes on their expiration dates unless sooner superseded or rescinded.

1. Purpose. This regulation-

a. Prescribes policy and procedures for awarding the Brigadier General Jeremiah P. Holland Award to the most outstanding military police unit, company size or smaller, each year.

b. Sets forth the selection criteria for this award.

2. Applicability. This regulation applies to all military police units in the Active Army. It does not apply to the Army National Guard or the US Army Reserve.

3. Responsibilities. a. Chief, Office of Army Law Enforcement (COALE), Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel (ODCSPER). The COALE will-

(1) Select the design of the award, either as a trophy or plaque.

(2) Chair a Board of military police officers at HQDA level to consider nominations for this award.

(3) Approve the final selection of the winner of this award.

(4) Make the announcement of the winner of the award.

b. Commanders of major Army commands (MACOMs). MACOM commanders will select the top unit from assigned units for forwarding to the COALE for consideration for this award.

c. Commanders of military police units, company size or smaller. These commanders will determine if they want to submit nominations for

this award. Nominations will be made under paragraph 6 and appendix A.

4. Description. a. The Brigadier General Jeremiah P. Holland Award honors the most outstanding military police unit, company size or smaller, each year.

b. BG Holland, a military police officer, sponsored this award after his retirement in 1969, to promote esprit de corps and professionalism in military police units throughout the Active Armv.

5. Eligibility. a. Active Army military police units, company size or smaller, are eligible for this award. Military police units include those performing combat support, physical security, correctional, law and order, criminal investigation, or other military police duties.

b. These units consist primarily of the following:

(1) Enlisted personnel of career management field 95.

(2) Warrant officers of military occupational specialty 951 series.

(3) Commissioned officers of specialty code 31.

6. Selection. a. Selection will be based on accomplishments of the unit, taking in every activity bearing on mission accomplishment. Consideration will preclude the need for additional records, exercises, or inspections.

b. Selection will be based on the unit's signifi-

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cant accomplishments, records, and reports. The following records and reports are required:

(1) Command inspection report of inspections by headquarters higher than battalion (for example, corps, division, brigade, group, post, headquarters command, or division support command). If these reports are not available or are not appropriate for the type of unit being evaluated, another inspection report that evaluates the performance of assigned missions may be substituted. Annual general inspection reports will not be forwarded or considered in the award selection.

(2) Army Training and Evaluation Program (ARTEP) results.

- (3) Other inspections or tests.
- (4) Weapons qualification scores.
- (5) Skills qualification test (SQT) scores.
- (6) Reenlistment rate.

(7) Individual awards, decorations, and citations originating outside the nominated unit.

(8) Other major accomplishments, significant achievements, or extracurricular activities. 7. Procedures. a. Units will be considered on the basis of performance for the period of 1 October through 30 September.

b. Each MACOM reporting directly to HQDA level may submit each year one award nomina-

tion. Nominations will be sent to HQDA(DAPE-HRE), WASH DC 20310, to arrive not later than 15 November.

c. The nomination format will provide adequate descriptive data. Nominations will be forwarded by cover letter; they will include the following three inclosures:

(1) General data, to include the following information:

(a) Unit mission.

(b) Major functions performed by the unit.

(c) Organizational structure: table of organization and equipment, or table of distribution and allowances, and personnel strength.

(2) A copy of the latest command inspection report, or other inspection report that evaluates the performance of assigned missions. (See para 6b(1).)

(3) Unit descriptive data. (See required format at app A.)

8. Announcement and presentation. *a*. The award will be announced not later than 15 December. It will be presented in a local ceremony.

b. The Office of Army Law Enforcement, ODCSPER, will notify the selected unit's MACOM commander of arrangements for delivery of the award.
