

Summary. This regulation prescribing policy on the Army Accident Prevention Awards Program has been revised. This revision includes new awards for individuals and units making significant contributions in safety and establishes U.S. Army standard criteria for recognition of safe performance in flying and driving. Additionally, this regulation requires major Army commands (MACOMs) to establish safety award programs to recognize safe performance in mission- and unit-unique performance areas.

Applicability. This regulation applies to the Active Army, the Army National Guard (ARNG), the U.S. Army Reserve (USAR), and Department of Army (DA) civilian employees.

Internal control systems. This regulation is subject to the requirements of AR

11-2. It contains internal control provisions but does not contain checklists for coordinating internal control reviews. These checklists are being developed and will be published at a later date.

Supplementation. Supplementation of this regulation and establishment of command or local forms is prohibited without prior approval from HQDA (DACs-SF), WASH DC 20310-0200.

Interim changes. Interim changes to this regulation are not official unless they are authenticated by The Adjutant General. Users will destroy interim changes on their expiration dates unless sooner superseded or rescinded.

Suggested improvements. The proponent agency of this regulation is the Office of the Chief of Staff, Army. Users are invited to send comments and suggested improvements on DA Form 202B (Recommended Changes to Publications and Blank Forms) directly to U.S. Army Safety Center, ATTN: CSSC-PR, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363.

Distribution. Distribution of this publication is made in accordance with the requirements on DA Form 12-09-E, block number 3678, intended for command levels A, B, C, and D for Active Army, ARNG, and USAR.

Chapter 1 Introduction

1-1. Purpose

This regulation establishes the Army Accident Prevention Awards Program and prescribes policies, procedures, and qualification standards to implement the program.

1-2. References

Required publications and prescribed and referenced forms are listed in Appendix A.

1-3. Explanation of abbreviations

Abbreviations used in this regulation are explained in the glossary.

1-4. Responsibilities

a. The Director of Army Safety (DASAF) is responsible for overall supervision of the Army Accident Prevention Awards Program.

b. The U.S. Army Safety Center (USASC) is responsible for planning, directing, and administering the Army Accident Prevention Awards Program.

c. Commanders at all levels are responsible for establishing and implementing procedures for implementing the awards program.

1-5. Policy

DA policy is to recognize units and individuals for outstanding accident prevention efforts and acts.

1-6. Procedures

a. Commanders of MACOMs will establish Army Accident Prevention Awards Programs that recognize and reward subordinate elements and individuals for noteworthy contributions to accident prevention.

b. Awards will be made to individuals and units based on their overall safety record. The standard safety staff functions in AR 385-10 may be used to evaluate safety programs.

c. MACOM award programs will be an item of special interest during safety surveys conducted by the USASC.

d. Army accident prevention awards will be approved and presented in accordance with the criteria established in chapters 2 and 3. Augmentation of the Army Safety Awards Program with local safety awards is encouraged. These awards may be presented to individuals or groups within the limitations of ARs 672-1, 672-5-1, and 672-20.

e. It is contrary to DA policy to approve duplicate awards for the same event. Therefore, the party initiating the award must determine which would be the most prestigious—the safety award or some other form of recognition.

1-7. Award forms

a. Unit forms:

(1) Chief of Staff, Army, MACOM Safety Award Plaque. This plaque is awarded by the Chief of Staff, Army (CSA), to MACOMs for significant improvement in major accident areas. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 2-1.

(2) DA Form 5757 (Director of Army Safety Award). This award is presented by the DASAF to units for significant improvement in their safety record. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 2-2. DA Form 5757 is available through normal publication channels.

(3) Award of Excellence in Safety Plaque. This plaque is awarded by MACOM commanders to units for a 3-year, accident-free record. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 2-3.

(4) DA Form 5758 (Army Accident Prevention Award of Honor in Safety). This award is presented by MACOM commanders to units for a 2-year, accident-free record. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 2-4. DA Form 5758 is available through normal publication supply channels.

(5) DA Form 5775 (Army Accident Prevention Award of Accomplishment in Safety). This award is presented by MACOM

commanders to units for an accident-free year. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 2-5. DA Form 5775 is available through normal publication supply channels.

(6) DA Form 5776 (Commanding General's Special Safety Award). This award is presented by MACOM commanders to units for exemplary safety performance. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 2-6. DA Form 5776 is available through normal publication supply channels.

b. Individual forms:

(1) Chief of Staff, Army, Award for Excellence in Safety Plaque. This plaque is awarded by the CSA to individuals who make significant contributions to the Army accident prevention effort. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 3-1.

(2) DA Form 5777 (United States Army Safety Guardian Award). This award is presented by the DASAF to individuals for extraordinary action in an emergency situation. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 3-2. DA Form 5777 is available through normal publication supply channels.

(3) DA Form 5778 (Army Aviation Broken Wing Award). This award is presented by DASAF to individuals in response to an aircraft emergency situation. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 3-3. DA Form 5778 is available through normal publication supply channels.

(4) Director of Army Safety Special Award of Excellence Plaque. This plaque is awarded by the DASAF to individuals who demonstrate superior safety leadership and/or programs. Criteria, policies, and procedures are outlined in paragraph 3-4.

(5) DA Form 1119-1 (United States Army Certificate of Achievement in Safety). This award is presented by commanders to individuals for specific achievements in safety as outlined in paragraphs 3-5, 3-6, and 3-7. Appropriate individual promotion points will be given when this certificate, signed by a lieutenant colonel or above, is awarded to eligible enlisted personnel. The wallet-size DA Form 1119 (United States Army Certificate of Achievement in Safety) should accompany the DA Form 1119-1 when presented to an individual. DA Forms 1119 and 1119-1 are available through normal publication supply channels.

(6) DA Form 1118 (United States Army Certificate of Merit for Safety). This award is presented to individuals and units for outstanding achievement in accident prevention as outlined in paragraph 3-7. Appropriate individual promotion points will be given when this certificate, signed by a lieutenant colonel or above, is awarded to eligible enlisted personnel. DA Form 1118 is available through normal publication supply channels.

c. Plaques: Plaques may be ordered by the MACOM from USASC, ATTN: CSSC-M, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363. MACOMs are responsible for inscribing the brass plate on the plaque with the unit's designation and the award period, and for ensuring that the cost of inscribing the brass plate is met from proper funds.

Chapter 2 Unit Accident Prevention Awards

2-1. Chief of Staff, Army, MACOM Safety Award

a. Recipients: MACOMs.

b. Eligibility requirements: A MACOM must make significant improvements in at least two major accident areas when compared with its previous fiscal year's accident record. Major accident areas include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (1) Privately owned vehicle (POV) accidents.
- (2) Army motor vehicle (AMV) accidents.
- (3) Aviation accidents.
- (4) On-duty personnel injuries.
- (5) Off-duty personnel injuries.
- (6) Civilian injury and illness reduction program.

c. Initiator: MACOM commander, MACOM safety manager, or DASAF.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be forwarded to USASC, ATTN: CSSC-PD, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363, no later than 1 December each year.

e. Documentation: The nomination packet must include a detailed description of the following:

- (1) Successful accident prevention programs.
- (2) How the MACOM succeeded in reducing accidents (by category).
- (3) Statistical or other data verifying results.
- (4) Other safety initiatives developed and implemented.
- (5) Other significant safety successes for the period of time nominated.

f. Judging: The DASAF will convene a panel on or about 15 January of each year to determine recipients of this award. The panel will consist of at least four safety directors or safety managers from different MACOMs or installations.

g. Approver: CSA.

h. Award: Plaque.

2-2. Director of Army Safety Award

a. Recipients: Table of distribution and allowances (TDA) or table(s) of organization and equipment (TOE) detachments; company-size units, battalions, or equivalent; brigades or equivalent; and divisions, installations, or activities.

b. Eligibility requirements: A unit must make significant improvements in its safety record when compared with the previous fiscal year and must experience no class A, B, or C accidents (accident classes as defined in AR 385-40) during the fiscal year of nomination.

c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be forwarded through the unit's chain of command, with the units supporting safety office ensuring appropriate coordination, to the USASC, ATTN: CSSC-PD, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363, no later than 1 December of each year.

e. Documentation: The nomination packet must include a description of the unit's performance. The description should not exceed two standard-size, single-spaced pages and should include brief discussions of the following:

- (1) The unit, including mission, location, and type and number of assigned personnel.
- (2) Commander's support of MACOM and DA safety campaigns.
- (3) Methods used to effect or sustain accident reduction (for example, safety training or new initiatives).
- (4) Accident statistics.
- (5) Major accomplishments.
- (6) Objectives for the coming year.

f. Judging: The DASAF will convene a panel on or about 15 January of each year to determine the recipients of this award. The panel will consist of at least four safety directors or safety managers from different MACOMs or installations.

g. Approver: DASAF.

h. Award: DA Form 5757.

2-3. United States Army Award of Excellence in Safety (Air or Ground)

a. Recipients: TOE or TDA detachments; company-size units, battalions, or equivalent; brigades or equivalent; and divisions, installations, or activities.

b. Eligibility requirements: A unit must complete 36 consecutive months without experiencing a class A, B, or C accident in the appropriate category of ground or air award (accident classes as defined in AR 385-40). If a command considers an accident on its record to have been unpreventable, it may request an eligibility determination from the USASC. Subsequent awards for each additional year of accident-free experience may be the basis of an additional year award (e.g., 4th year, 5th year, etc.).

c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be submitted through the unit's chain of command to the MACOM commander for screening and verification of the unit's performance.

e. Documentation: Each level of command must endorse the request and verify that the unit is eligible for the award.

f. Judging: As determined by the MACOM commander.

g. Approver: MACOM commander.

h. Award: Plaque.

2-4. United States Army Award of Honor in Safety (Air or Ground)

a. Recipients: TOE or TDA detachments; company-size units, battalions, or equivalent; brigades or equivalent; and divisions, installations, or activities.

b. Eligibility requirements: A unit must complete 24 consecutive months without experiencing a class A, B, or C accident in the appropriate category of ground or air award (accident classes as defined in AR 385-40). If a command considers an accident on its record to have been unpreventable, it may request an eligibility determination from the USASC. Awards will not be approved for overlapping timeframes. For example, if an Award of Excellence in Safety is issued for the period 1 April 1984 to 1 April 1987, the unit may not receive an Award of Honor in Safety for the period 1 April 1985 to 1 April 1987.

c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be submitted through the unit's chain of command to the MACOM commander for screening and verification of the unit's performance.

e. Documentation: Each level of command must endorse the request and verify that the unit is eligible for the award.

f. Judging: As determined by the MACOM commander.

g. Approver: MACOM commander.

h. Award: DA Form 5758.

2-5. United States Army Award of Accomplishment in Safety (Air or Ground)

a. Recipients: TDE or TDA detachments; company-size units, battalions, or equivalent; brigades or equivalent; and divisions, installations, or activities.

b. Eligibility requirements: A unit must complete 12 consecutive months without experiencing a class A, B, or C accident in the appropriate category of ground or air award (accident classes as defined in AR 385-40). If a command considers an accident on its record to have been unpreventable, it may request an eligibility determination from the USASC. Awards will not be approved for overlapping timeframes. For example, if an Award of Honor in Safety is issued for the period 1 April 1985 to 1 April 1987, the unit may not receive an Award of Accomplishment in Safety for the period 1 April 1986 to 1 April 1987.

c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be submitted through the unit's chain of command to the MACOM commander for screening and verification of the unit's performance.

e. Documentation: Each level of command must endorse the request and verify that the unit is eligible for the award.

f. Judging: As determined by the MACOM commander.

g. Approver: MACOM commander.

h. Award: DA Form 5775.

2-6. Commanding General's Special Safety Award

a. Recipients: TOE or TDA detachments; company-size units, battalions, or equivalent; brigades or equivalent; and divisions, installations, or activities.

b. Eligibility requirements: A unit must achieve exemplary safety performance for a period of 1 year, or complete a major exercise such as REFORGER without a class A, B, or C accident (accident classes as defined in AR 385-40). MACOM commanders will establish specific criteria for an activity to qualify for this award.

- c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.
- d. Nominations: Nominations will be submitted through the unit's chain of command to the MACOM safety director.
- e. Documentation: As required by MACOM.
- f. Judging: As determined by the MACOM commander.
- g. Approver: MACOM commander.
- h. Award: DA Form 5776.

Chapter 3 Individual Accident Prevention Awards

3-1. Chief of Staff, Army, Award for Excellence in Safety

a. Recipients: U.S. Army military personnel, DA civilian employees, foreign national working for the U.S. Army, and foreign military personnel working with and under operational control of the U.S. Army. Full-time safety personnel are not eligible for this award.

b. Eligibility requirements: An individual must make significant contributions to the Army accident prevention effort. The following are examples of significant contributions:

- (1) A division commander, through personal emphasis on POV safety, reduces his or her division's POV accident and fatality rate by 35 percent.
- (2) A DA civilian supervisor of a Government-owned, Government-operated ammunition plant reduces on-the-job accidents by 50 percent in 1 year through his or her personal involvement in the plant's accident prevention program.

c. Initiator: Installation safety manager, brigade or higher commander, or MACOM safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be forwarded through the unit's chain of command to the USASC, ATTN: CSSC-PD, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363. Nominations must reach the USASC no later than 1 December of each year.

e. Documentation: A narrative description of the individual's achievements will accompany the nomination and will include the following:

- (1) Individual's name, rank or civilian grade, military occupational specialty (MOS) or civilian job series, and duty position or job title.
- (2) Individual's job description.
- (3) A brief discussion of the unit, including its mission, location, and number and type of assigned personnel.
- (4) Individual's achievements relating to safety and methods used to effect or sustain accident reduction.
- (5) Other pertinent data such as accident statistics.

f. Judging: The DASAF will convene a panel on or about 15 January of each year to determine the recipients of this award. The panel will consist of a minimum of four safety directors or safety managers from different MACOMs or installations.

- g. Approver: CSA.
- h. Award: Plaque.

3-2. United States Army Safety Guardian Award

a. Recipients: U.S. Army military personnel, DA civilian employees, foreign nationals working for the U.S. Army, and foreign military personnel working with and under operational control of the U.S. Army.

b. Eligibility requirements: An individual must, through extraordinary individual action in an emergency situation, accomplish one of the following:

- (1) Prevent an imminent danger situation.
- (2) Minimize or prevent damage to Army property.
- (3) Prevent injury to personnel.

Note: Emergency situations will not be considered for the award if they are self-induced, if they occur because of noncompliance with published regulations or procedures, or if it is determined that no emergency actually existed.

c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be forwarded through the individual's chain of command to the USASC, ATTN: CSSC-PD, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363.

- e. Documentation: Nominations will include the following:
 - (1) Full name, social security number (SSN), and duty being performed at the time of the act.
 - (2) Date, time, and location of act.
 - (3) Personnel and equipment involved, including dollar value, if applicable.
 - (4) Concise description of situation necessitating the act.
 - (5) Action taken by the nominee (specifically what he or she did).
 - (6) Lapsed time from the onset of the situation to termination.
 - (7) Drawings, other supporting documentation, and photographs, if available.
 - (8) A copy of the DA Form 285 (U.S. Army Accident Investigation Report), if applicable.
- f. Judging: The DASAF will convene a panel on a quarterly basis to screen nominations and make recommendations for the award. The panel will be composed of at least four MACOM or installation safety personnel and the Deputy Director of Army Safety or his or her representative.
- g. Approver: DASAF.
- h. Award: DA Form 5777.

3-3. United States Army Aviation Broken Wing Award

a. Recipients: U.S. Army military personnel, DA civilian employees, and contract aircrewmembers. Foreign national aircrewmembers are also eligible when they are performing authorized flight duties aboard U.S. Army aircraft.

b. Eligibility requirements: An aircrewmember must, through outstanding airmanship, minimize or prevent aircraft damage or injury to personnel during an emergency situation. Aircrewmember must have shown extraordinary skill while recovering an aircraft from an in-flight emergency situation. The aircraft must be owned or leased by the Army at the time of the emergency. Normally, only one person will be nominated to receive the award for a single in-flight emergency. However, if more than one crewmember materially contributed to successful recovery from the emergency, all those involved should be considered for nomination. An emergency will not be considered for award if—

- (1) It is self-induced.
- (2) It actually occurs during a simulated emergency requiring no added skill to land the aircraft successfully.
- (3) It occurs because of noncompliance with published regulations or procedures.
- (4) It is determined that no emergency actually existed.
- (5) In the committee's opinion, a lack of discipline or aviator judgment may have induced the emergency.
- (6) The aircraft was in a phase of flight with no unfavorable circumstances to prevent a safe landing.

c. Initiator: Unit commander or installation or unit safety manager.

d. Nominations: Nominations will be forwarded through command channels to the USASC, ATTN: CSSC-PD (Broken Wing Award), Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363.

e. Documentation: Nominations will contain the following information:

- (1) Full name, SSN, and crew duty (for example, instructor pilot, pilot, copilot, student pilot, or rated student pilot) of the person actually on the controls during the emergency.
- (2) Date, time, and location of emergency.
- (3) Mission type, design, and series of the aircraft involved.
- (4) Type of mission.
- (5) Phase of flight when the emergency occurred (for example, hover, takeoff, climb, cruise, descent, approach to landing, or autorotation).
- (6) Kind of terrain over which the emergency occurred (for example, water, hills, mountains, swamp, trees, snow, or ice).

(7) Obstructions, dimensions, type, and condition of the landing area.

(8) Altitude above ground level.

(9) Density altitude.

(10) Wind condition (direction and velocity).

(11) Gross weight of the aircraft when landing.

(12) Concise description of the emergency from inception to termination.

(13) Action taken by the nominee to cope with the emergency and what was done to recover from the emergency or minimize damage or injury. The circumstances surrounding the occurrence must be documented to show the skill, knowledge, judgment, and technique required and used in recovering from the emergency.

(14) Lapsed time from onset of emergency to termination.

(15) Drawings, other supporting documentation, and photographs, if available.

(16) Copy of the preliminary report of aircraft mishap (PRAM) message, if required and submitted.

f. **Judging:** The DASAF will convene a panel when nominations are received. The panel will consist of the DASAF or his or her representative and at least five aviators; it may include senior enlisted crewmembers when appropriate. At least one panel member will be qualified in the mission type and design of the aircraft involved in the emergency.

g. **Approver:** DASAF.

h. **Award:** DA Form 5778 and Broken Wing Lapel Pin.

3-4. Director of Army Safety Special Award of Excellence

a. **Recipients:** U.S. Army military personnel, DA civilian employees, foreign nationals working for the U.S. Army, and foreign military personnel working with and under operational control of the U.S. Army.

b. **Eligibility requirements:** An individual must demonstrate exemplary leadership in safety programs within the field.

c. **Initiator:** DASAF.

d. **Nominations:** Impact award, no nomination process required.

e. **Documentation:** Followup documentation is required after an individual receives the Director of Army Safety Award. Documentation required is as follows:

(1) Full name, SSN, duty position, title, and rank or civilian pay grade.

(2) Unit to which individual is assigned.

(3) Individual's achievement relating to safety.

(4) Any other pertinent data.

(5) Original documentation will be sent to Commander, USASC, ATTN: CSSC-PD, Fort Rucker, AL 36362-5363.

f. **Judging:** Award decision made by DASAF.

g. **Approver:** DASAF.

h. **Award:** Plaque.

3-5. United States Army Motor Vehicle Driver Safety Award

a. **Recipients:** U.S. Army military personnel, DA civilian employees, and foreign nationals who, as part of their routine duties, are required on a regular basis to drive Army motor vehicles.

b. **Eligibility requirements:** A nominee must complete the following without any "at fault" military or civilian on-duty vehicle accident or moving traffic violations:

(1) Twelve months or 10,000 miles of Army administrative vehicle operation.

(2) Twelve months or 3,000 miles of tactical vehicle operation.

(3) Twelve months or 1,500 miles of tracked vehicle operation.

(4) Twelve months or 1,500 hours of materiel-handling equipment operation.

(5) For tours of 13 months or less, the following eligibility requirements apply:

(a) Ten months or 8,000 miles of Army administrative vehicle operation.

(b) Ten months or 2,500 miles of tactical vehicle operation.

(c) Ten months or 1,300 miles of tracked vehicle operation.

(d) Ten months or 1,250 hours of materiel-handling equipment operation.

c. **Initiator:** Unit commander or representative.

d. **Nominations:** Nominations will be made in accordance with unit standing operating procedure (SOP).

e. **Documentation:** As required by unit SOP.

f. **Judging:** As required by unit SOP.

g. **Approver:** Unit commander.

h. **Award:** DA Forms 1119 and 1119-1.

3-6. United States Army Aircrewmember Safety Award

a. **Recipients:** U.S. Army military personnel and DA civilian employees who perform aerial flights as aircrewmembers.

b. **Eligibility requirements:** A nominee must complete at least 500 flight hours as an aircrewmember in U.S. Army aircraft without experiencing a human-factor-related class A, B, or C accident (accident classes as defined in AR 385-40). Subsequent awards will be in increments of 500 hours (for example, 1,000 hours, 1,500 hours, and so forth).

c. **Initiator:** Unit commander or representative.

d. **Nomination:** Nominations will be made in accordance with unit SOP.

e. **Documentation:** Nominations will include copies of DA Form 759 (Individual Flight Record and Flight Certificate—Army) and DA Form 759-1 (Individual Flight Record and Flight Certificate—Army). The unit aviation safety officer must verify safety records by checking the nominee's DA Form 759.

f. **Judging:** In accordance with unit SOP.

g. **Approver:** Appropriate aviation unit commander.

h. **Award:** DA Forms 1119 and 1119-1.

3-7. Other individual awards

Commanders at all levels will recognize safe performance displayed by individuals and units under their command through the use of DA Forms 1119-1, 1119, and 1118. These certificates will be signed by the unit commander and will include, at a minimum, the awardee's name and the contribution for which the award is given.

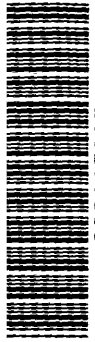
