# TO THE PROTOCOL ON COOPERATION AND EXCHANGES IN THE FIELD OF CONSERVATION OF NATURE

# BETWEEN THE DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND THE STATE FORESTRY ADMINISTRATION OF THE PEOPLE'S REPUBLIC OF CHINA

In accordance with Articles 2,3 and 8 of the Protocol on Cooperation and Exchanges between the Department of the Interior of the United States of America and the State Forestry Administration of the People's Republic of China (hereinafter referred to as the Parties) signed in Washington, D.C. on November 19, 1986 and extended for five-year periods in 1991, 1996, 2001 and 2006, representatives of the Parties met in Washington April 7-8, 2011 to review the results of activities carried out during 2007-2010 under Annex 10 and adopt a program of cooperation for 2011-2013. The subjects and lead agencies for those programs are appended to this document, together with a list of the members of the U.S. and Chinese delegations.

During the Joint Committee Meeting, Dan Ashe, Deputy Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, met with Deputy Director General of the Department of International Cooperation Ms. Zhang Hongyan of SFA and members of the Chinese delegation. The Parties noted with satisfaction the outstanding accomplishments of 25 years of cooperation in the field of nature conservation between the two countries, including increased exchange of information and experience, in-depth dialogue, and closer friendship between management staff, technical specialists and practitioners engaged in nature conservation from China and the U.S. through active implementation of various programs. The year 2011 marks the 25th anniversary of the signing the Protocol, and the Parties agreed to extend the Protocol for another five years, enabling cooperation to continue.

Building on 25 years of collaborative efforts, the Parties agreed to expand the scope of activities, increase the depth of exchange and enhance the quality of cooperation. It is the common wish of the Parties that the U.S. and China continue to strengthen long-term and in-depth collaboration in areas related to nature reserve management; wildlife conservation and habitat protection (including forests, wetlands and other types); climate change; public education and outreach; and other topics, through various means such as exchange of information and specialists; jointly convening workshops; training on practical techniques; and encouraging pairing between nature reserves and wildlife refuges.

Funding and detailed arrangements for the program will be discussed by the Parties through correspondence. The exploration of more flexible funding arrangements is encouraged.

The Parties agreed to hold the next Joint Committee Meeting in Beijing, China in the first half of 2014.

This Annex shall enter into force upon signature by both Parties, and shall remain valid for the duration of the Protocol.

Done in Washington on the 8<sup>th</sup> day of April 2011 in duplicate in the English and Chinese languages, both texts being equally authentic.
