



AHCCCS at Native Health

- Available for anyone; first time enrollment, maintaining eligibility, and redetermination for coverage
- What you need:
 - Photo Identification
 - Social Security Card
 - Proof of Citizenship
 - Tribal Enrollment Identification/Certificate of Indian Blood (CIB)
 - Proof of all Income/Expenses
 - Proof of Residency (Utility bill)
 - Proof of Pregnancy (if applicable)

Behavioral Health

- The behavioral health division at NATIVE HEALTH aims to help individuals and families maintain balances of lifestyle by providing professional, confidential, and culturally appropriate services and resources.
- NATIVE HEALTH Behavioral Health Division is Arizona Department of Health Services Licensed as an outpatient treatment center and for misdemeanor domestic violence offender treatment and DUI Screening, along with education and treatment



Mental Health Services

- Individual, family, and group counseling along with parent/youth counseling.
- Address depression, couple/marital issues, grief and loss, stress management, self-esteem enhancement, dating and domestic violence, sexual assault, referrals and counseling.
- Traditional Services
 - Talking Circles, cultural empowerment, traditional problem solving, blessing and smudging.

- 16-20 hours of treatment (AHCCCS may cover the cost)

Domestic Violence Offender Treatment

- State licensed Misdemeanor Domestic Violence Offender Treatment Program
- 26 week program for treatment services (AHCCCS may cover the cost)
- Each person must complete an initial intake and screening

Anger Management Treatment Group

• Learn to:

- manage anger effectively
- Stop violence or the threat of violence
- Develop self-control over thoughts and actions
- Receive support from others
- Designed to meet court ordered anger management classes
- 12 week program (AHCCCS may cover the cost)

Youth Programs

Youth Substance Abuse Program

- Structured treatment for youth ages 13-18
- Encouraging personal wellness, family support, improved communication, and coping skills
- Individual counseling for 12-14 weeks
- Free to all Native American youth
- Anger Controlled Teens (ACT)
 - 12 week, group counseling
 - Building anger management skills and effective communication and problem solving
 - AHCCS may cover the cost

Youth Social Group

 Weekly social group activity for youth enrolled in substance abuse or anger management

Gender Identity vs. Sexual Orientation

- **Gender Identity**: A person's internal sense of being male, female, or something else. Since gender identity is internal, one's gender identity is not necessarily visible to others.
- **Gender Expression:** The manner in which a person represents or expresses their gender identity to others.
- Sexual Orientation: A person's emotional, sexual, and/or relational attraction to others. Sexual orientation is usually classified as heterosexual, bisexual, and homosexual (i.e. lesbian and gay).

Some LGBTQ Terms and Definitions Bigender: A person whose gender identity encompasses both male and female genders. Some may feel that one identity is stronger, but both are present.

Transgender: A person whose gender identity and/or expression is different from that typically associated with their assigned sex at birth.

Some LGBTQ Terms... Transgender Man:(FTM) is used to identify a person, who transitions from the assigned sex at birth female, but lives and identifies as being male. Transgender Woman: (MTF) A person who transitions from male-to-female, meaning a person who was assigned the male sex at birth but identifies and lives as female.

• **WSW:** An acronym used to identify women who have sex with women.

• **MSM:** An acronym used to identify men who have sex with men.

• **Bisexual-** A person who self-identifies as having an emotional, sexual, and/or relational attraction to men and women.

- **Cross-dresser-** A person who dresses in clothing typically worn by people of the opposite gender, but who generally has no intent to live full-time as the other gender.
- Drag king- A woman who dresses as a man for the purpose of entertaining others at bars, clubs, or other events
- **Drag queen** A man who dresses as a woman (often celebrity women) for the purpose of entertaining others at bars, clubs, or other events.

- **Transition-** A term used to describe the period during which a transgender person begins to express their gender identity.
- **Passing-** A term used by transgender people to mean that they are seen as the gender with which they identify. For example, a transgender woman (assigned the male sex at birth) who people see as a female might say that she is passing as a woman.
- **Outing-** The act of exposing information about a person's sexual orientation and/or gender identity without their consent.


- Queer- A term usually used to refer to specific sexual orientations (e.g., lesbian, gay, bisexual).
- **Coming out-** The process through which a person identifies, acknowledges, and decides to share information about their sexual orientation and/or gender identity with others.
- Gay- A man who self-identifies as having an emotional, sexual, and/or relational attraction to other men.
- Lesbian- A woman who self-identifies as having an emotional, sexual, and/or relational attraction to other women.

Native American LGBTQ

- Two-Spirit- Some Native/First Nations people who are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or gender nonconforming identify as Two-Spirit.
- Traditionally Native life is lived, not male or female, but with varying degrees of each, that makes a circle of individual identity.

Pine Leaf (Crow) 1800s Dressed as female; warrior, medicine 4 wives



Running Eagle (Piegan) 1800s Warrior woman; men's society; spiritual vision forbid her marrying a man; woman partner



Lozen- Apache 1850s-1889 Dressed as male, prophet; healer, warrior; vision to live as a man; could detect movement of enemies

Some Other Traditional Roles

- Entertainers
- Care takers
- Mediators
- Fulfillment of social roles within the tribal communities is more the defining feature than sexual preference or behaviors.

 Impacts of Historical trauma influenced negative behavior and increase violence towards LGTBQ

 Homophobia was created and carried out in many Native Communities.

WSW/Lesbian Health Issues

• Heart Disease

• Depression

- Cancer
- Obesity
- Injury to violence
- 17.5 % higher than general population
- 54% report intimate partner violence

- Post Traumatic Stress
- Higher Suicide attempts and thoughts
- Higher levels of drinking alcohol and tobacco use

MSM/Gay Men Health Issues


• Heart Disease (all men)

• Depression and anxiety

- Cancers- colon, prostate, testicular, anal cancer, HPV
- Injury caused by violence
- Partner or criminal violence

- Suicide attempts, especially in youth
- Higher levels of alcohol, tobacco and illegal drug use
- STI's, HIV, HPV, Hepatitis


• Anorexia and or bulimia



In 2010, 225 "new" HIV infections among American Indian/Alaskan Native. 119 were American Indian/Alaskan Native MSM.

Bisexual Health

- Similar to MSM and WSW
- Noted differences are binge drinking, especially for bi-sexual youth.



Transgender Health Issues


- Victimization to murder and violence
- HIV/AIDS and STI's
- Substance Abuse, including tobacco use
- Lack of Health Insurance
- Suicide Ideation
- Depression

- Widespread Injection silicon use, unsafe
- Discrimination from professionals
- Internalized discrimination
- Insensitivity and hostility towards transgender people.

Suggestions for Improvement of Services

- Safe and welcoming environment.
- Post Patient Bill of Rights
- Inclusive materials in the waiting room
- Inclusive health messages
- Uni-Sex bathrooms







Suggestions to Improve Services

- Patient visitation rights include same sex couples (hospitals)
- Avoid assumptions
- Name preference
- Adding "MTF" or "FTM"

- Notes on chart
- Appropriate dialog between professionals

• Sexual partner options

Suggestions for Native American Community

"But gay people, being both male and female, were seen as both warriors and caregivers. Gay people could do anything. They were like Swiss Army knives!
