Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program Grant Announcement Fiscal Year 2005 (SL 000707)

June 7, 2005

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ), a component of the Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice, announces that funding is now available to States (including the District of Columbia and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico) and units of local government through the Fiscal Year 2005 Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program.¹

Funds are for States and units of local government with existing crime laboratories that conduct DNA analysis. The funds are to be used to analyze backlogged forensic DNA casework samples from sexual assaults, homicides, and kidnappings, whether in government-owned laboratories or through accredited fee-for-service vendors.

Funds also may be used to conduct postconviction DNA testing pursuant to a court order. All eligible forensic DNA profiles obtained with funding from this announcement are to be included in the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS), and National DNA Index System (NDIS) where applicable.

Please read this announcement carefully for important information on eligibility, funding amounts, and application instructions.

The deadline for applications is July 7, 2005, 8 p.m. eastern time. Applications must be submitted online through the OJP Web-based Grants Management System (GMS). Begin the process early by registering at <u>http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/fundopps.htm</u>.

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I. Funding for the Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program

In December 2004, President Bush signed the Department of Justice Appropriations Act, 2005 (Public Law 108-447, Division B, Title 1). The Act appropriated \$110 million for a DNA analysis and capacity enhancement program. A portion of that amount is being made available to eliminate casework backlogs for DNA analysis and to conduct postconviction DNA testing.

II. Eligibility and Program Description

Eligible applicants include States and units of local governments with existing crime laboratories that conduct DNA analysis, and either—

- Are accredited by a nonprofit professional association actively involved in forensic science that is nationally recognized within the forensic science community, such as the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB) or Forensic Quality Services (FQS), or
- Undergo external audits, not less than once every 2 years, that demonstrate compliance with DNA Quality Assurance Standards established by the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

Funding is allocated based on the number of forcible rape, murder, and non-negligent manslaughter offenses reported to the FBI for 2003 and the amount of unobligated funds as of March 30, 2005, under awards made to States as part of NIJ's Fiscal Year 2001–02 No-Suspect Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program. Funds are to be used to handle, screen, and/or analyze backlogged forensic DNA casework samples from sexual assaults,

homicides, and kidnappings and may be used to conduct postconviction DNA testing pursuant to a court order. All DNA analyses conducted using funding from this program must be performed (1) by a government-owned laboratory that is accredited or that currently undergoes external audits not less than once every 2 years that demonstrate compliance with DNA Quality Assurance Standards established by the Director of the FBI, or (2) through an accredited fee-for-service vendor.

Applications must meet the specific requirements set forth in this announcement (including those concerning permissible uses of funds) and must satisfy all other applicable requirements, including those that apply generally to NIJ and OJP grants. All awards are subject to the availability of appropriated funds.

III. Expected Results and Outcomes

Grantees receiving this backlog reduction funding should be able to demonstrate a reduction in the number of backlogged forensic cases awaiting DNA analysis as of June 7, 2005. All eligible forensic DNA profiles obtained with funding from this announcement are to be included in the CODIS, and the NDIS where applicable.

Award recipients will be required to submit quarterly performance metrics reports to NIJ documenting results and outcomes. These reports shall contain information detailing the reduction of the DNA backlog through the analysis of casework samples. Please see the "Reporting Requirements" in Section VII for details.

IV. Use of Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program Funds

A. Permissible Uses of Funds

Funds requested are to be used to handle, screen, and/or analyze backlogged forensic DNA casework samples from sexual assaults, homicides, and kidnappings and may be used to conduct postconviction DNA testing pursuant to a court order. Use of award funds for other purposes is not permitted. Expenditures from awards under this program may include the following:

1. Supplies. Funds may be used to acquire laboratory supplies for forensic DNA analyses (including postconviction DNA analyses pursuant to court order) and for other expenses directly attributable to forensic DNA analyses.

- 2. Overtime. Funds may be used for overtime of laboratory staff directly engaged in handling, screening, and/or analyzing forensic evidence that may contain DNA (including forensic evidence to be analyzed as part of court-ordered postconviction DNA testing). Any payments for overtime must be in accordance with the applicable provisions of the OJP Financial Guide, available at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/FinGuide. Appropriate pro-rating is required.
- **3.** Consultant and Contractor Services. Funds may be used to hire consultants and/or temporary contract staff to handle, screen, and/or analyze forensic evidence that may contain DNA (including forensic evidence to be analyzed as part of court-ordered postconviction DNA testing), or to contract with accredited fee-for-service vendors to conduct DNA analyses.
- 4. Salary and Benefits (Partial) of Additional Laboratory Employees. Funds may be used to hire additional full-time or part-time laboratory employees who will be directly engaged in handling, screening, and/or analyzing forensic evidence that may contain DNA (including forensic evidence to be analyzed as part of court-ordered postconviction DNA testing). NIJ funds may be used for a maximum of 75 percent of the approved salary and benefits for each such newly-hired staff member. To be eligible to use funds for this purpose, applicants for awards must provide—

(a) Documentation that the additional new full-time/part-time laboratory employees will be directly engaged in handling, screening, and/or analyzing forensic evidence that may contain DNA; and

(b) Documentation that the State or unit of local government will provide the funds for the remaining 25 percent (minimum) of the salaries and benefits for each newly-hired staff member.

Note: NIJ makes no assurance that funds will be available for this purpose in future grant announcements.

- **5. Travel.** Funds may be used for the reasonable expenses of travel to outsourcing laboratories to review procedures and practices prior to initial sample shipment and in an additional unannounced site visit. Travel expenses must comply with applicable provisions of the OJP Financial Guide.
- 6. Administrative Expenses. Up to 3 percent of the Federal portion of a grant awarded under this program may be used for administrative expenses directly related to the performance of the project.

B. Uses of Funds That Are Not Permitted

Federal funds awarded under the Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program may not be used for—

- 1. Construction.
- 2. Renovation.
- **3. Laboratory and Computer Equipment.** Funds may not be used to upgrade, replace, lease, or purchase laboratory equipment, instrumentation, or computer hardware or software.
- **4. Salaries and Benefits for Existing Staff.** Funds may not be used to pay salaries and/or benefits for existing staff, other than overtime as discussed above.
- 5. Administrative Expenses. Administrative expenses that exceed 3 percent of the Federal portion of the award are not permitted.

C. Supplanting Not Allowed

Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction funds may not be used to supplant State or local funds. Federal funds must be used to increase the amount of funding that would, in the absence of Federal funds, be made available from State or local sources for forensic casework DNA analyses.

V. Fiscal Year 2005 Application Process

A. Due Date for Applications

Complete proposals must be submitted through OJP's online Grants Management System (GMS) by 8:00 p.m. eastern time on July 7, 2005. Extensions to this deadline are not permitted unless specified by NIJ. NIJ will not accept faxed or mailed proposals. NIJ reserves the right to reject incomplete applications, those not responsive to the scope of this announcement, or those not complying with format requirements.

Eligible applicants who do not submit an application for the Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program by the deadline **will not** receive funds from the Fiscal Year 2005 program.

B. How to Apply

All applications for Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program funding MUST be submitted through OJP's Web-based Grants Management System (GMS). NIJ will not accept faxed or mailed proposals. The GMS system is intended to expedite and streamline the receipt, review, and processing of applications. Applicants may call the toll-free GMS Helpline at 1–888–549–9901 to receive technical assistance with the online application process. The GMS Helpline is open Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. eastern time. Begin the application process early by registering with GMS at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/fundopps.htm.

Applicants must possess a Dun and Bradstreet Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number to apply for funding using GMS. Please call 1–800–333–0505 to obtain a DUNS number if your agency does not already have one. Please note: A DUNS number may be requested online at <u>https://eupdate.dnb.com/requestoptions.html</u>, but the online process can take up to 30 days.

VI. Required Forms and Documents

Prospective applicants must complete the required application forms and related documents. Please use the following Checklist as a guide. The 12-month period begins October 1, 2005; (6) certifies that any funds remaining

(7) (for units of local government only) certifies the proportion of the State's total number of offenses of forcible rape, murder, and non-negligent manslaughter it reported to the FBI for 2003.

VII. Additional Requirements and Information

Records Maintenance and Access. Each State or unit of local government within the State that receives funding under this program must maintain adequate records relating to the receipt and use of the grant amount. The Attorney General and the Comptroller General of the United States (or designees thereof) will have access to these records for audit and examination purposes.

Reporting Requirements. Each State and unit of local government that receives funding under this program must submit quarterly performance metrics reports, quarterly financial status reports, and semi-annual progress reports. Each award recipient also must

submit a final report within 120 days of the end of the award period. The report must include a summary and assessment of the program carried out with the Fiscal Year 2005 grant, and shall cite the number of additional forensic cases that were analyzed and the reduction in the casework DNA analysis backlog as a result of the Fiscal Year 2005 grant.

These requirements supplement the general OJP grant administration and reporting requirements. Performance Measures. To ensure compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (Public Law 103-62), this announcement notifies applicants that program performance under this project is measured by the following performance measures. Award recipients will be required to collect and report data relevant to these measures on a quarterly basis to OJP.

Award Period. All awards will start on the same date of October 1, 2005. In general, NIJ will limit its grants under this program to a maximum period of 12 months after the start of the award (from October 1, 2005 to September 30, 2006).

Note: NIJ may, at its option, elect to extend an award for an additional 6 months (from October 1, 2006, to March 30, 2007) if the award recipient provides, prior to September 30, 2006, documentation that each of its DNA analysis laboratories is accredited by a nonprofit professional association actively involved in forensic science and nationally recognized within the forensic science community, such as the American Society of Crime Laboratory Directors/Laboratory Accreditation Board (ASCLD/LAB) or Forensic Quality Services (FQS).

Financial Audits. Applicant agencies that expend \$500,000 or more in Federal funds (from all sources including pass-through awards) during a fiscal year will be required to submit organizationwide audit reports. Audits must be performed in accordance with Office of Management and Budget Circular A–133. For more information, see chapter 19 of the OJP Financial Guide at <u>http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/FinGuide</u>.

National Environmental Policy Act. All awards are subject to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) (Public Law 91-190, codified at 42 U.S.C. § 4321 *et seq.*). To ensure NEPA compliance, NIJ may require award recipients to submit additional information. An environmental assessment may be required.

Confidentiality of Information and Human Subjects Protection. Award funds may not be used for research or statistical projects or activities as defined by 28 C.F.R. Part 22, or for research as defined by 28 C.F.R. Part 46.

Funds May Not Be Used to Lobby. Award recipients may not use any Federal funds, either directly or indirectly, in support of the enactment, repeal, modification, or adoption of any law, regulation, or policy, at any level of government, without the express prior written approval of OJP. Rights in Intellectual Property. The U.S. Department of Justice reserves certain rights with respect to data, patentable inventions, works subject to copyright, and other intellectual property associated with an award of Federal funds. See 28 C.F.R. § 70.36 and 37 C.F.R. Part 401.

Equal Opportunity for All Applicants. It is OJP's policy that faith-based and community organizations that statutorily qualify as eligible applicants under OJP programs are invited and encouraged to apply for awards. Faith-based and community organizations will be considered for an award on the same basis as any other eligible

applicants and, if they receive an award, will be treated on an equal basis with non-faithbased and community organization grantees in the administration of such awards. No eligible applicant or grantee will be discriminated against on the basis of its religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors or persons working in the organization.

Services to Limited English Proficient (LEP) Persons. Recipients of OJP financial assistance are required to comply with several Federal civil rights laws, including Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 ("Title VI") and the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 ("Safe Streets Act"), as amended. These laws prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, and sex in the delivery of services.

National origin discrimination includes discrimination on the basis of limited English proficiency (LEP). To ensure compliance with Title VI and the Safe Streets Act, recipients are required to take reasonable steps to ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to their programs. Meaningful access may entail providing language assistance services, including oral and written translation, where necessary. Grantees are encouraged to consider the need for language services for LEP persons served or encountered both in developing their proposals and budgets and in conducting their programs or activities. For example, researchers are encouraged to consider the need for language services of, or otherwise involved in, NIJ-funded research efforts. Reasonable costs associated with providing meaningful access for LEP individuals are considered allowable program costs.

VIII. Estimated Funding Amounts

In general, Forensic Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program funds will be awarded based on the number of offenses of forcible rape, murder, and non-negligent manslaughter reported to the FBI for 2003 (the most current year for which such data is available) and the amount of unobligated funds as of March 30, 2005, under awards made to States as part of NIJ's Fiscal Year 2001–02 No-Suspect Casework DNA Backlog Reduction Program. The number of qualifying State and local applicants will also affect grant amounts.

Units of local government that have existing DNA laboratories may apply directly to NIJ for a portion of the funds allocated for awards to their State. **Units of local government must certify the proportion of the State's total number of offenses of forcible rape, murder, and non-negligent manslaughter they reported to the FBI for 2003.** These figures will be used to allocate funds among the eligible applicants within a particular State. Any awards to American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands will be determined by a different method. The estimated aggregate amounts that NIJ expects to allocate to eligible applicants within each State are shown in the chart below. (Amounts shown do not take into account unobligated funds under Fiscal Year 2001–02 awards for DNA backlog reduction.)
