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## PREFACE

The information and projections contained in this publication are based on a broad range of labor market information and statistics that are collected and analyzed by the staff of the Labor Market Information (LMI) section.

The Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey of approximately 20,000 Kentucky employers provided the occupational employment data used in the study. The data obtained from the Current Employment Statistics (CES) and the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) programs were used to project industries to the year 2018. Staff utilized data from all programs to create the 2018 occupational outlook publications for each of the ADDs below:

The U.S. Department of Labor (USDOL), Employment and Training Administration (ETA) provided funding for the publication and projections. The national industry and occupational projections developed by the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), were used in conjunction with state and regional trends to project Kentucky's industries and occupations. The Bureau of Labor Statistics and the U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis, provided additional statistics necessary in the projection process. The Utah Department of Economic Security developed the personal computer-based model used for the projections. Special thanks to Kentucky employers who completed the questionnaires that provide the employment information necessary to complete this project.

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## INTRODUCTION

### Purchase Area

Which jobs will be in demand? Which occupations will provide the largest number of job openings? Which are likely to grow or decline? The *Purchase Area Occupational Outlook to 2018* offers answers and insight regarding these often-asked questions. Students, job seekers, counselors and others will find this information beneficial.

Tables listing the 50 occupations with the largest number of annual job openings and the 50 fastest-growing occupations are included. They also provide occupational employment projections, the number and percentage of expected change and the average number of annual job openings for the period 2008 to 2018.

Please note that the estimates and projections are subject to limitations that are a part of any effort to determine future conditions. Long-term job trends offer insight into the occupational growth or decline in the area. The projections are carefully prepared using accepted methods within a framework of national, state and area assumptions. However, they will be modified in future publications if long-term changes occur in the area's economic outlook or as more current information becomes available.

The estimates in this report reflect only the demand for labor from 2008 through 2018. The supply, or the number of educated or trained workers available to fill future job openings, is beyond the scope of this report.

The development and utilization of our human resources is always a priority for those concerned with employment training. It is crucial that education and training planners, business, labor, government, and job seekers have the necessary occupational information to aid them in the development of education and training programs. This publication was intended to assist in these efforts.

**NOTE:** Prior to 2000, the Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) codes were used to classify occupations. The 2008-2018 projections use the Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system. Because of this change, the titles and content of major occupational groups and many detailed occupations are substantially different from those used before 2000. Several major groups have been renamed, combined or reorganized. Some individual occupations have been renamed, reclassified, or are no longer listed. Many newer occupations may be listed for the first time. Because of these changes, the 2008-2018 projections are not comparable to those completed before 2000. ## **PURCHASE HIGHLIGHTS 2008-2018**

- ✓ Employment is projected to grow from 96,976 to 102,325, a gain of 5.5 percent.
- ✓ Total annual job openings are expected to be about 2,946.
- ✓ Growth in employment will create about 697 job openings annually.
- ✓ Approximately 2,249 annual job openings will result from separations from the labor force due to retirement or those who transfer to other jobs.
- ✓ Twenty-four percent of job openings will result from growth; the remaining 76 percent will result from separations from the labor force.
- ✓ The greatest number of annual job openings will be in Sales and Related Occupations (405), followed by Office and Administrative Support Occupations (336) and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (330).
- ✓ The two occupations with the largest projected number of annual job openings are Retail Salespersons (123) and Cashiers (118).
- ✓ The highest growth rates among occupational groups are likely to be in Occupational and Physical Therapist Assistant and Aide Occupations (26.2%), followed by Nursing, Psychiatric, and Home Health Aide Occupations (21.1%) and Fire Fighting and Prevention Worker Occupations (20.0%).
- ✓ Some specific occupations with the largest percentage change are Network Systems and Data Communications Analysts (44.0%), Home Health Aides (39.2%) and Environmental Engineers (33.3%).

## USER'S GUIDE TO OCCUPATIONAL OUTLOOK STATISTICS

When looking at an occupation, what key outlook data should you review?	<p><b>1)</b> Total average annual job openings, and <b>2)</b> employment change expressed as a percentage.</p> <p>The total number of job openings estimates the likely annual demand for workers in each occupation. The percentage of employment change shows how much each occupation is likely to grow or decline.</p>
What creates job openings?	<p><b>1)</b> Employment growth (new jobs), and <b>2)</b> employment separations (job vacancies created by persons separating from an occupation).</p>
What causes employment change?	<p><i>Industrial growth or decline</i> has the greatest influence. This occurs when the demand for goods and services rises, thus the demand for workers increases. <i>Technological change</i> may raise the demand for some skills while eliminating the demand for others. <i>Self-service, out-sourcing, or 24 hour operations</i> can also affect employment change.</p>
What about employment separations?	<p>Employment separations are still important when evaluating the potential outlook for an occupation. Job openings are created when employees separate from occupations because of retirements, promotions, career changes, death, etc. The number of separations can exceed new jobs.</p>
Do workers tend to leave one occupation more than other occupations?	<p>Every occupation has a different rate of employment separation. Occupations requiring more education and training and/or having a high percentage of full time workers tend to have low separation rates. Those requiring little education and/or training tend to have higher separation rates.</p>
What factors affect the number of job openings for an occupation?	<p><b>1)</b> The number of workers who are currently employed, <b>2)</b> the number of job vacancies created by worker separation, and <b>3)</b> the rate of change, i.e., how fast the occupation is growing or declining.</p>
Which factor is more important?	<p>The size of employment and separation rate is more important than rate of change.</p>
What is the best way to compare one occupation with another?	<p>Look at the total average annual job openings, not just openings resulting from growth. A large number of openings indicates it should be relatively easy to find a job in that occupation. Also, consider the rate of employment change. A high percentage increase denotes there may be excellent chances for advancement and for earnings increases because demand is likely to remain strong for some time.</p>

## Educational/Training Classifications

Occupations are classified into 11 categories and listed according to these principles:

An occupation is placed into the category that best describes the education or training needed by most workers to become fully qualified.

Postsecondary awards, if generally needed for entry into the occupation, take precedence over work-related training even though additional skills or experience may be needed for a worker to become fully qualified.

The length of time an average worker generally needs to become fully qualified through a combination of on-the-job training and experience is used to categorize occupations in which a postsecondary award generally is needed for entry.

### Postsecondary awards

**(1) First professional degree.** Completion of the degree usually requires at least three years of full-time academic study beyond a bachelor's degree.

**(2) Doctoral degree.** Completion of a Ph.D. or other doctoral degree usually requires at least three years of full-time academic study beyond a bachelor's degree.

**(3) Master's degree.** Completion of the degree usually requires one or two years of full time academic study beyond a bachelor's degree.

**(4) Bachelor's or higher degree, plus work experience.** Most occupations in this category are management occupations. All require experience in a related non-management position for which a bachelor's or higher degree is usually required.

**(5) Bachelor's degree.** Completion of the degree generally requires at least four years, but not more than five years, of full-time academic study.

**(6) Associate's degree.** Completion of the degree usually requires at least two years of full-time academic study.

**(7) Postsecondary vocational awards.** Some programs last only a few weeks while others may last more than a year. Programs lead to a certificate or other award, but not a degree.

### Work-related training

**(8) Work experience in a related occupation.** Many occupations requiring work experience are managers of service, sales and related, production, other occupations, or are management occupations.

**(9) Long-term, on-the-job training.** More than 12 months of on-the-job training or combined work experience and formal classroom instruction are needed for workers to develop the skills necessary to be fully qualified. This category includes formal and informal apprenticeships that may last up to five years. Long-term on-the-job training also includes intensive occupation-specific, employer-sponsored programs that workers must successfully complete. These include fire and police academies and schools for air traffic controllers and flight attendants. In other occupations, like insurance sales and securities sales, for example, trainees take formal courses, often provided on the job site, to prepare for the required licensing exams. Individuals undergoing training generally are considered to be employed in the occupation. Also included in this category is the development of a natural ability - such as that possessed by musicians, athletes, actors, and other entertainers - that must be cultivated over several years, frequently in a nonwork setting.

**(10) Moderate-term, on-the-job training.** Skills needed to be fully qualified can be acquired during one to twelve months of combined on-the-job experience and informal training.

**(11) Short-term, on-the-job training.** Skills needed to be fully qualified can be acquired during a short demonstration of job duties or during one month or less of on-the-job experience or instruction.
