

## Key Facts and Figures

**Mission:** NATO-KFOR's mission is to contribute to maintaining a safe and secure environment as mandated by United Nations Security Council Resolution 1244. In carrying out its mission, NATO cooperates and assists the United Nations, the European Union and other international actors, as appropriate, to support the development of a stable and peaceful Kosovo. To date, KFOR has also supported the development of the Kosovo Security Force (KSF) as an all-voluntary, professional, multi-ethnic, lightly-armed force which possesses no heavy weapons. Its basic missions are set out by the law on KSF and include crisis response, assistance to civilian authorities in responding to natural and other disasters and emergencies, Explosive Ordnance Disposal and civilian protection. KFOR also supports the development of professional, democratic and multi-ethnic security structures in Kosovo.
