


County Compensation by Industry: Rocky Mountain Region

■ The Rocky Mountain region accounted for 3 percent of the nation's total compensation in 2010. Of the 170 counties in the nation with at least \$10 billion in total compensation, 7 were in the Rocky Mountain region and accounted for 51 percent of the region's total compensation.



In the Rocky Mountain region in 2010:

- Total compensation increased in 159 of 216 counties. The largest growth occurred in Richland County, Montana at 16.4 percent, while the largest contraction occurred in Routt County, Colorado at -9.4 percent.
- Increases in health care and social assistance and federal government were the largest contributors to the growth in total compensation.
- Metropolitan county compensation increased in 38 of 45 counties. The largest growth occurred in Gilpin County, Colorado at 11.4 percent, while the largest contraction occurred in Juab County, Utah at -9.2 percent. Non-metropolitan county compensation increased in 121 of 171 counties.
- The local government sector accounted for the

largest share of total compensation at 9.8 percent.

• Average annual compensation per job increased in 180 of 216 counties. Butte County, Idaho had the highest average compensation at \$90,757, while Garfield County, Montana had the lowest average compensation at \$30,807.
