In recognition of Flag Day – June 14, 2007 – consider some of the following resources from the Effective Practices Collection that support our national ideal of civic engagement.

### Uniting college campuses to share civic engagement experiences

Establish a forum of nearby colleges to communicate the commonalities of their work involving civic engagement, with the hope of accomplishing more together than they could alone.

### Improving neighborhoods with web-based community mapping

Examples of both youth and senior community residents monitoring neighborhood conditions and mapping community assets to aid in beautification and crime abatement programs.

### Giving teens 100 ways to serve in the community

From something as simple as "walk a neighbor's dog" to the more structured "become a peer counselor" this list has something all members can relate to; it is sure to generate thought, discussion, and activity.

### Blending service-learning and character education to promote strong citizenship

Managing Spontaneous Volunteers in Times of Disaster

When disaster strikes a community, volunteers are essential in helping to rebuild lives and rebuild communities. It is important that volunteers are given meaningful and constructive opportunities to serve, while not overwhelming the affected community during the response and recovery. National service members can be a vital part of this volunteer effort by staffing volunteer reception centers (VRCs) after an incident. VRCs match

volunteers unaffiliated with disaster agencies to opportunities at organizations already involved in the response or recovery. This training will help national service participants understand the function of a VRC and how to manage spontaneous volunteers in times of disaster.
