National Summer Learning Day — July 10, 2008



During the months of summer, many American families enjoy enriching activities such as trips to museums, parks, and libraries, and camp for their children.

However, when school doors close, scores of other children struggle to access educational opportunities, and even basic needs such as healthy meals and adequate adult supervision.

Research has shown that young people experience learning losses when they do not engage in educational activities during the summer. In the fall, teachers typically spend six weeks (or more) revisiting material that students covered the previous year, just to bring them up to speed.

Two-thirds of the achievement gap between lower- and higherincome youth can be explained by unequal access to summer learning opportunities. As a result, low-income youth are less likely to graduate from high school or enter college.

To help counter the effects of "summer slide," parents can structure a summer vacation that balances work and play, and can plan to celebrate Summer Learning Day on Thursday, July 10.
