NOAA Fisheries Office of International Affairs Strategic Operating Plan - 2006-2011

January 12, 2006

This Strategic Operating Plan for NOAA Fisheries Office of International Affairs (NMFS F/IA) is an effort to improve organizational alignment, planning and coordination within NMFS F/IA, other NOAA Fisheries Line Offices, other offices within NOAA and with other interested agencies.

The Strategic Operating Plan consists of five parts:

- (1) Policy guidance and the resulting overarching priority areas;
- (2) Collaboration Table that identifies NMFS F/IA staff, other NMFS headquarter and regional staff, NOAA IA staff and staff from other agencies involved in specific marine conservation policy areas, and identifies lead responsibilities;
- (3) 2006-2007 Event Calendar;
- (4) Schedule of 2006 bilateral meetings; and
- (5) Organization-specific, NOAA Fisheries F/IA, Staff-Level Strategic Plan

These parts are explained below.

Part 1: Policy Guidance

This section provides a collection of relevant policy guidance from: *Department of Commerce Strategic Plan FY 2004 – FY 2009*; *NOAA Strategic Plan 2005-2010*; NOAA's International Affairs Council; the *National Marine Fisheries Service Strategic Plan for 2005-2010*; NOAA's PPBES process; and the Mission and Vision statements for NOAA Fisheries, Office of International Affairs as developed by its staff. Looked at individually and collectively, the following extracts and statements provide policy guidance for the kind of work NOAA Fisheries, and in particular, the Office of International Affairs, should undertake.

From the Department of Commerce Strategic Plan FY 2004 – FY 2009:

Strategic Goal 3: Observe, protect, and manage the Earth's resources to promote environmental stewardship.

"There is also a strong link between the economic necessity for environmental prediction and stewardship, and scientific necessity. Societal and economic decisions need to be strongly coupled with a comprehensive understanding of the environment. A major part of Commerce's mission is to ensure sustainable economic opportunities, and this requires managing the nation's marine and coastal resources, and predicting how changes in the

Earth's environment will affect those resources." (Department of Commerce Strategic Plan FY 2004 – FY 2009, p. 59)

From the NOAA Strategic Plan 2005-2010:

NOAA Vision: An informed society that uses a comprehensive understanding of the role of the oceans, coasts, and atmosphere in the global ecosystem to make the best social and economic decisions.

NOAA Mission: To understand and predict changes in the Earth's environment and conserve and manage coastal and marine resources to meet our Nation's economic, social, and environmental needs.

"A world with rapidly shifting political, cultural, and economic dynamics requires federal agencies involved in world affairs to cultivate fresh approaches and new services to maintain U.S. leadership. As the influence and use of Earth's oceans and atmosphere affect the economies and ecosystems of every nation, the domain of NOAA's activities naturally extends across national and continental boundaries. Whether leading worldwide collaboration in integrating global observations, guiding regional activities in managing marine and water resources, or simply collaborating in scientific endeavors, NOAA is a major player in international efforts to meet environmental and ecosystem challenges. Consequently, we recognize the value of our international partners, as we learn from their experiences and benefit by working together on common issues." (NOAA Strategic Plan 2005-2010, p. 16)

From NOAA International Affairs Council - "Statement of International Goals":

NOAA INTERNATIONAL POLICY GOALS

Internationally, we support and promote policies and interests in ecosystem-based management, climate science, Earth observation, water management, and weather forecasting. Our strategy is to foster the active leadership of interagency and international environmental programs and policies, consistent with our agency's goals. We work to leverage multilateral and bilateral relationships to take full advantage of the development and use of research, observations, environmental science, and ecosystems management.

OVERARCHING GOALS FOR INTERNATIONAL ENGAGEMENT

- Improve free and open exchange of data between countries.
- Improve stewardship of natural resources through international cooperation.
- Promote decision-making based upon science and observational data.
- Increase partnership in research and science.
- Increase exchange of expertise and knowledge between countries.
- Increase creative application of NOAA expertise in diverse contexts.

- Meet U.S. Government responsibilities under legislative and international commitments.
- Prepare and respond to natural resource emergencies abroad in support of U.S. foreign policy and at the request of foreign governments.
- Foster cost-sharing opportunities with other nations to carry out global scale science and stewardship programs.
- Exercise leadership and advance U.S. Government interests through multilateral and bilateral engagement.

INTERNATIONAL GOALS ATTENDANT TO NOAA MISSION GOALS

Work with other U.S. Government agencies, foreign partners, and intergovernmental organizations in support of the following NOAA Mission Goals and Crosscutting Priorities.

Ecosystem Goal

- Promote ecosystem-based management in multilateral and bilateral fora.
- Promote Large Marine Ecosystem as regional unit in multilateral and bilateral fora.
- Promote partnerships under White Water to Blue Water in Wider Caribbean and other regions.
- Form new international partnerships to enhance corals management.
- Foster, within all RFMOs, sustainable fisheries harvests and compliance with RFMO fishery management measures.
- Support research and surveys of and work to protect deep-sea coral communities.
- Promote international conservation of all protected species.
- Support integrated oceans management and the reduction of land-based pollution and marine debris.
- Integrate trade considerations with living marine resource management.
- Utilize the principles reflected in the Law of the Sea Convention to promote NOAA Objectives.
- Support the U.S. Ocean Action Plan by expanding the international application of the Sea Grant model.

Mission Support

- Support activities that ensure continuous observation of critical environmental conditions.
- Support activities that provide secure, reliable, and robust information flows with our international partners.
- Assure legally sound approaches to meeting U.S. international obligations and asserting U.S. international rights.
- Develop and coordinate consistent objectives for NOAA's international engagements at the bilateral, regional and/or global levels.
- Facilitate timely coordinated U.S. Government policy and program guidance to NOAA leadership in preparation of international meetings and visits.

• Ensure, as appropriate, NOAA access to foreign data from ships, aircraft, satellites, and platforms.

From NOAA's Planning Programming, Budget and Execution System

In line with the President's Management Agenda, NOAA is working to establish goals that are results oriented, accountable and transparent. As part of this process, NOAA uses the Program Planning Budgeting and Execution System (PPBES) to coordinate its activities, track its progress and allocate funds to the projects that most directly relate to our stated mission and goals. NOAA Fisheries, Office of International Affairs works to support "Mission Goal 1", also known as the "Ecosystems Goal."

Mission Goal 1 (Ecosystems Goal): Protect, restore and manage the use of coastal and ocean resources through ecosystem management approaches.

From the NOAA Fisheries Service Strategic Plan 2005-2010

Vision: The American people enjoying the riches and benefits of healthy and diverse marine ecosystems.

Mission: Stewardship of living marine resources through science-based conservation and management and the promotion of healthy ecosystems.

"NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) is responsible for stewardship of the Nation's living marine resources and their habitats within the United States Exclusive Economic Zone. We work to conserve, protect, and manage these resources to ensure their continuation as functioning components of ecosystems, while also affording economic opportunities and enhancing the qualify of life for the American public." (NMFS Strategic Plan 2005-2010, p. 3)

From NOAA Fisheries - Office of International Affairs:

Vision: All people benefiting from healthy and diverse marine ecosystems.

Mission: The stewardship of transboundary and other living marine resources and their ecosystems, through leadership and participation in domestic and international activities.

NOAA Fisheries Office of International Affairs works with a variety of partners within NOAA as well as other governmental agencies such as the Department of State, the Department of the Interior (Fish and Wildlife and Wildlife Service), the United States Trade Representative and the Department of Homeland Security (U.S. Coast Guard). With these other agencies and with our domestic and international partners, we seek to accomplish the following goals and objectives in support of our mission and vision.

- Promote Ecosystem-Based Fisheries Management
- Control Fishing Capacity
- Combat "IUU" Fishing
- Strengthen RFMOs
- Secure Equitable Access for U.S. Fishers to Shared Resources
- Increase Assistance to Developing States
- Food Security

To accomplish these goals F/IA undertakes a number of different activities. A sample of these activities is listed below.

How NOAA Fisheries F/IA Accomplishes Its Mission:

- Participates in Regional Fisheries Management Organizations
- Participates in multilateral and bilateral environmental agreements/foras
- Participates in Free Trade Negotiations
- Conducts workshops on marine living resources issues
- Builds partnerships to improve marine conservation

NOAA Fisheries F/IA and the PPBES:

The NOAA Fisheries F/IA is actively involved in the PPBES process and has selected the following performance measures to help us gauge the success of our strategic planning efforts.

PPBES Ecosystems Goal Team Performance Measures

Measure 1: Arrangements:

International/Regional arrangements to maintain or enhance conservation and management of shared fisheries resources such as Bilateral and multilateral agreements, treaties, conventions and international action plans.

Measure 2: Partnerships:

Partnerships with non-Federal entities, including foreign governments that implement and/or support international conservation and management of fisheries resources such as grants private sector committees, contracts, MOAs, consultations, GIFAs and permits.

Measure 3: Activities:

International education, outreach and information collection efforts that support rebuilding or sustainable management of shared fisheries resources and a safe and adequate supply of sea food in international trade such as printed and audio-visual materials, extension visits/presentations, capacity building, workshops and tradeshows.

Overarching Priority Areas for 2006-2011:

All actions of the office should be complimentary to the vision and mission and policy guidance provided by NOAA and NOAA Fisheries. Based on this collection of guidance, for the 2006-2011 period, the top cross-cutting priorities for NOAA Fisheries Office of International Affairs are as follows:

- Promote a science-based, ecosystem approach to management that accounts for all species and habitats as well as human components of the ecosystem¹
- Prevent, deter and control IUU fishing
- Ensure US access to marine resources as well as fair and equitable trade regimes
- Assist in capacity building in developing countries

These cross-cutting priorities are to be reviewed annually, and may be changed in the future. These priorities are used to develop organization-specific strategic plans, as explained in Part 2.

Part 2: Organization-specific Strategic Plans

This part allows for the development of F/IA staff-level organization-specific strategic plans, where the organizations to be considered include RFMOs, meetings of UN and related bodies and organizations and other major fora. Each organization-specific strategic plan will incorporate the four cross-cutting key objectives for 2006-2011 as noted in Part 1. For some organizations, one or more of the objectives may not be relevant. The plan also allows for organization-specific objectives. For each objective, the appropriate F/IA staff lead will assess the current situation for each objective on a Green, Yellow or Red scale based on criteria decided by the staff member, and will identify specific actions or steps the United States will take to make progress. Each plan also allows for consideration of leadership positions the United States should seek to acquire and whether the United States should seek to host a future international meeting. Finally, accompanying each plan is a tool to plan engagement with particular countries of interest and an optional planning calendar. Recognizing that each organization is on a different meeting cycle, the planning calendar should generally begin the month after the conclusion of the organization's annual meeting and end the month of the next annual meeting, with appropriate beginning and ending times for organizations that meet other than annually.

¹ An ecosystem approach to management includes: controlling and reducing bycatch and discards of juvenile fish, non-target species, associated and dependent species and species belonging to the same ecosystem; protecting and conserving endangered marine species; protecting the marine environment from destructive fishing practices as well as marine debris and marine pollution associated with fishing activities; and controlling fishing capacity and fishing effort to levels commensurate with the sustainability of fish stocks.

Part 3: 2006-2007 Events Calendar

The events calendar captures key international conferences, meetings and other fora where marine conservation and other topics related to the work of NOAA Fisheries Office of International Affairs will be addressed. The goal is to provide a 2-year overview of all international engagement so as to allow a "strategic" approach to achieving U.S. marine conservation objectives. The table identifies which Federal agency should exercise overall leadership to prepare for each meeting, which NOAA or NOAA Fisheries component exercises a similar role and identifies the staff member within F/IA, if any, which exercises "ownership" for each meeting. The calendar will be revised as new information comes in, and will be subject to periodic overall review.

Part 4: Schedule of 2006 Bilateral Meetings

The schedule of bilateral meetings for each year is designed to identify which major bilateral meetings the United States intends to engage in. Such meetings are looked at separately because of the significant staff time that such events demand and the need to take into account the availability of senior officials, including the Assistant Administration for NOAA Fisheries, the Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for OES and the Director, NOAA Fisheries, Office of International Affairs. This calendar will often be incomplete at the beginning of each calendar year, and will be developed in coordination with other agencies.

Part 5: Collaboration Table

The Collaboration Table identifies NOAA Fisheries F/IA staff, other NOAA Fisheries headquarter and regional staff; NOAA, Office of International Affairs staff and staff from other agencies involved in specific marine conservation policy areas, and identifies lead responsibilities in bold text. The table will be updated periodically to revise staff involvement and to add/edit marine conservation policy areas of involvement.
