


What is the National Archives?



Leavenworth Penitentiary

- About 70,000 prisoners from all over the United States arrived at Leavenworth Penitentiary between 1895 and 1952
- Name index, 1895-1931, on our website
- Most files contain mugshot, information on sentence, background of prisoner, medical records, record of letters sent and received, work record, etc.

One of four men sentenced to life for robbing a mail train in Richardson County, Nebraska in 1909, Frank Grigware escaped and fled to Canada. Identified 24 years later, he was never extradited.



DESCRIPTION: White, age 23 (in 1909), height 5 feet 8% inches in bare feet, weight 161 pounds, fair complexion, light brown hair, blue eyes, light brown beard. Scar % inch oblique inner at 3d phalanx left 3d finger front. Small scar of % inch vertical at 2d phalanx right thumb rear. Pit scar at % inch below right eye; 2d and 3d toes of each foot web.

RECEIVED November 19, 1999, from Omaha, Nebraska, under sentence of life for robbing U. S. mail train. Occupation, carpenter. Residence, Spokane, Washington.



Federal Court Records


- We have thousands of Federal court cases.

Federal Land Records

- Cancelled land entry files for some Kansas and Nebraska land offices (early 1900s)
- Kansas and Missouri land tract books
- Some Kansas land office records



Bureau of Indian Affairs

- Records vary widely in date range and content
- Name indexes do not exist for most series
- Extensive finding aids have been created by staff to assist researchers

United States Indian Service, Standing Holk soney. December 14, 1800. Lund, Bull Head or Show Head, Front River, "Hawk Freder I believe that the time his arrived for the arrest of Setting Bull and that it can be made by the Litera Palice without much risk, - I therefore want you to make the arrest before day light Comorrow morning and try and get book to the Sitting Bull road corosing of oak crelk by daylight tomorrow morning ar as soon after as Jossible, The Cavalry will leave here tonight and will reach the Sitting Bull crossing an oak creek before dayligh tomarrow (monday) morning, rukere they will reman with
