Dear Mr. Lake:

Less than two weeks ago, the American Cable Association ("ACA")¹ raised concerns about its ability to comply with the Commission's procedural mandates in the above-referenced docket in accessing, analyzing, and submitting comments in response to the large amount of relevant data submitted in response to the Comcast Information Request² and the NBC Universal Information Request.³ On June 14th, Bloomberg, L.P. ("Bloomberg") expressed similar concerns in filing a Request for Extension of Time to File Petitions to Deny and Comments.⁴ ACA agrees with Bloomberg insofar as it raises practical concerns about the difficulty of incorporating data and analysis based on the data provided by Comcast Corporation and NBC Universal, Inc. (together with General Electric Company the "Applicants") in response to the Commissions' Information Requests given the short amount of time between receipt of the data and the current June 21, 2010 Petition to Deny and Comment filing deadline, particularly in the light of the Commission's expressed request

that all arguments be made within the formal pleading cycle. The ACA urges the Commission to address this issue in a manner that allows parties sufficient time to access and analyze the large amount of data submitted and incorporate it into their analyses of the potential public interest harms of the proposed transaction.

We reiterate those concerns especially in light of the fact that the Applicants have not produced data and information responding to the Commission's requests in a format that is easily accessible to parties to the license transfer review proceeding, thus hampering their ability, as a logistical matter, to work with the data. Given these logistical difficulties, the ACA suggests that the Commission clarify the Applicants' obligation to submit data in an accessible format to interested parties to the proceeding. The ACA believes the Commission should deem the term "accessible" to mean, at a minimum, that Applicants must provide the data to eligible parties at their counsels' premises in the exact same format that such data was provided to the Commission.

In sum, the ACA requests that the Commission clarify the language in its March 18th Public Notice concerning the filing date for parties wishing to "raise new issues based on new facts or newly discovered facts" to file "within 15 days after such facts are discovered." The ACA suggests that the Commission grant parties wishing to raise new issues or supplement existing issues raised in their June 21 filings based on new facts or newly discovered facts disclosed in the Applicants' June 11th data submissions an additional 60 days from the date that the Applicants certify to the Commission that the data has been made accessible to all eligible parties of record to file their supplemental comments.

This clarification, based on the practical and logistical difficulties associated with accessing and analyzing vast amounts of data in a short period of time, is consistent with the Commission's desire that all substantive issues regarding the Application be considered in as timely and efficient a manner as possible that is fair to Applicants, interested parties and the Commission itself.
