

Summary of Klamath Project July 2012 Operations

The elevation of Upper Klamath Lake (UKL) decreased from 4,141.34 feet on July 1st to 4,140.02 feet on July 31st. The July 31, 2012 UKL elevation is 1.1 feet lower than the elevation at the end of July 2011 (4141.12). Total net inflows to UKL for July were about 18.5 Thousand Acre Feet (TAF), which is 53% of the Natural Resource Conservation Service average of 35 TAF for the month.

Releases from Link River Dam averaged 1,101 cfs during the month. Iron Gate Dam releases varied from 1,210 cfs on July 1st as they were ramping down from June to 1,010 cfs on several occasions in mid-July. The average Iron Gate flow for July was 1,035 cfs. Consistent with the Variable Base Flow Procedure (VBF), no VBF releases were made downstream of Iron Gate Dam during July since the UKL elevation did not exceed the threshold of 4141.8 feet during the month.
