## A BILL

To extend the temporary reduction of duty on 4-Propylbenzaldehyde.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, SECTION 1. 4-PROPYLBENZALDEHYDE. 4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Heading 9902.40.37 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to 4-Propylbenzaldehyde) is amended— 6 (1) by striking "Free" and inserting "4.2%"; 7 8 and (2) by striking "12/31/2012" and inserting 9 "12/31/2016". 10

- 1 (b) Effective Date.—The amendments made by
- 2 subsection (a) apply with respect to goods entered, or
- 3 withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after

4 the 15th day after the date of enactment of this Act.

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
