III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The end use of these fibers is flocking. Flock has many different applications and adds a variety of colors, textures, and depths to substrates. The flock made from polypropylene fibers reduces buzz, squeak, and rattle problems in auto and marine equipment and is particularly useful to the battery industry. Compared with polyester, polypropylene has a lower melting point and is thus of inferior quality in industrial applications. China is the primary source for U.S. imports.

We have no position on the Higgins plastic bags for toys (HR 4455). We oppose the Manzullo polypropylene/polyester fiber bills (HR 4486 and HR 4487) as it is our understanding that Palmetto Synthetics produces those fibers and has sent in a letter of opposition.
