A BILL

To extend the temporary reduction of duty on yarn of carded cashmere 19.35 metric yarn count or higher.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. YARN OF CARDED CASHMERE 19.35 METRIC
- 4 YARN COUNT OR HIGHER.
- 5 (a) In General.—Heading 9902.03.02 of the Har-
- 6 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to
- 7 yarn of carded cashmere of 19.35 metric yarn count or
- 8 higher) is amended by striking the date in the effective
- 9 period column and inserting "12/31/2015".

- 1 (b) Effective Date.—The amendments made by
- 2 subsection (a) apply with respect to goods entered, or
- 3 withdrawn from warehouse for consumption, on or after

4 the 15th day after the date of enactment of this Act.

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
