II. Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):

Thermoplastic biodegradable polymer blend containing 1,4-benzenedicarboxylic acid, dimethyl ester, polymer with 1,4-butanediol and hexanedioic acid (CAS No. 55231–08–8), 1,4-benzenedicarboxylic acid, polymer with 1,4 butanediol and decanedioic acid (CAS No. 28205–74–5) and Starch (CAS No. 9005–25–8), and 1,4-dioxane-2,5-dione, 2,6-dimethyl-(3R,6R)-polymer with rel-(3R,6S)-3,6-dimethyl-1,4 dioxane-2,5-dione and (3S,6S)-3,6-dimethyl-1,4-dioxane-2,5-dione (CAS No. 9051–89–2) and 1,2,3-propanetriol (CAS No. 56–81–5) (provided for in subheading 3913.90.50)

III. Other product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports

The subject polymer blend is used to produce various opaque bags, including generally higher gauge garbage, produce, customer carrier, and storage bags. These bags are biodegradable and are suitable for composting. The polymer blend is imported from Italy.

V. Technical comments

The suggested article description of this bill has been amended by striking and replacing vague "and/or" language used in the chemical nomenclature with the term "and" only. The HTS subheading of this bill defines a natural polymer, reportedly because one of its components is "starch." (Per Commission staff consultation with Dan Martens, Novamont North America, June 4-5, 2012.)
