A BILL

To extend the suspension of duty on staple fibers of rayon, carded, combed, or otherwise processed for spinning.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. STAPLE FIBERS OF RAYON, CARDED, COMBED,
- 4 OR OTHERWISE PROCESSED FOR SPINNING.
- 5 (a) In General.—Heading 9902.23.34 of the Har-
- 6 monized Tariff Schedule of the United States (relating to
- 7 staple fibers of rayon, carded, combed, or otherwise proc-
- 8 essed for spinning) is amended by striking the date in the
- 9 effective period column and inserting "12/31/2015".

- 1 (b) Effective Date.—The amendment made by
- 2 this section applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from
- 3 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after

4 the date of the enactment of this Act.

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
